



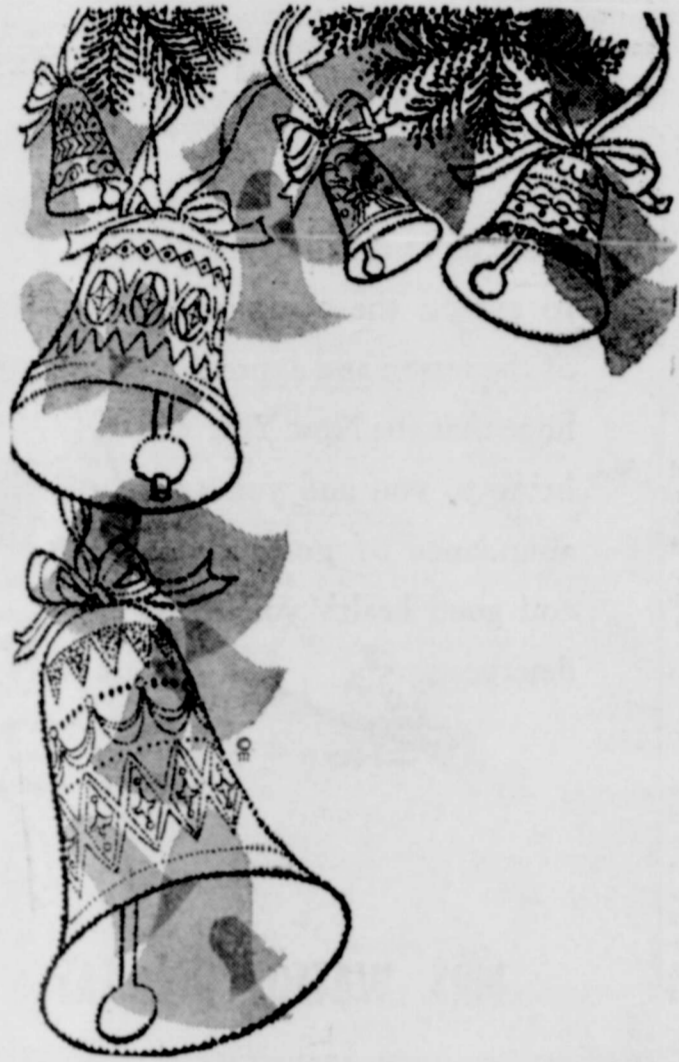

MISS NANCY HINDS WEDS MR. RICHIE IN FORMAL CHURCH CEREMONY

Miss Nancy Lou Hinds, daughter of J. S. Hinds and the late Mrs. Hinds, became the bride of Manning Hayden Richie, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Richie, jr., of Vernon, at 7:00 p.m. Saturday, December 22. The First Methodist Church in Silverton was the scene of the exchange of vows, officiated by the Rev. Weldon Rives, pastor of First Methodist Church, Meadow, Texas, cousin of the bride.

Miss Gloria Jean Kern, organist, played traditional nuptial selections and marches, and accompanied Mr. Billy Don Kern as he sang "Always," "Till," and "The Lord's Prayer." Both are cousins of the bride, from Vernon.

The double ring ceremony was performed by candlelight before a bany of greenery intermingled with small candles in hurricane lamps. The double windows were filled with greenery and tiered arrangements of candles in green cut-glass goblets. Large white satin bows marked the center aisle and completed the window arrangements.

Large baskets of stock, gladiolus, lily-of-the-valley and white poinsettias along with white pom-pom mums centered with Christmas balls completed the floral arrangements.

Lighted tapers held by circular and graduated candelabra were placed across the front of the

church and on either side. Miss Susan Anderson of Silverton was maid of honor, and bridesmaids were Misses Sharon Riley, Canadian; Suzane Bates, Amarillo; Ann Oberwetter, Paducah; Judy Hinds, cousin of the bride, Big Spring; Donna Richie, sister of the bridegroom, Vernon. Miss Mary Margaret Pyeatt, Hedley, was flower girl, and Master Daryl Rives, cousin of the bride, Meadow, was ring bearer.

The attendants wore floor length gowns of rose peau de soie fashioned with Sabrina necklines, elbow length sleeves, and bell skirts. The flower girl's dress was similarly styled in pale pink.

Their headpieces were satin roses with circular veils of pink illusion sprinkled with crystal dew drops. They carried satin muffs covered with pale pink carnations and clusters of sweetheart roses. Satin streamers of pale pink flowed from the muffs and each attendant wore a single strand of pearls.

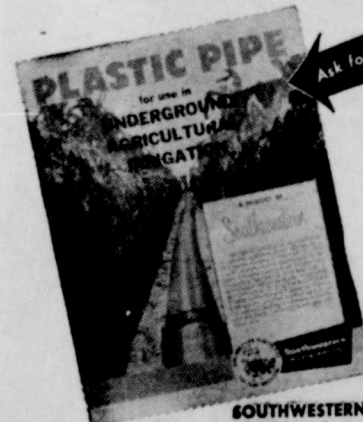

Rules on Sizes of Mail
 Effective January 1, 1963, there are limitations to the size of envelopes and post cards that can be accepted at post offices through the United States.
 People should remember this when buying their cards and stamps, especially if they are preparing to buy in large quantities. Postmaster reminds.
 Regulations are:
 Cards: Not larger than 5 9/16 inches, nor smaller than 3 by 4 1/4 inches. They

must be rectangular in shape. A ratio of width to length of not less than 1 to 1.414 is not recommended. In other words, they should be half again as long as they are wide.
 Envelopes: Less than 3 inches wide or 4 1/4 inches in length will not be mailable.
 Envelopes more than 9 inches in width or 1 inches in length are not recommended.
 Envelopes having a shape other than rectangular are non-mailable.
 Envelopes having a ratio of width to length of less than 1 to 1.414 are not recommended (half

again as long as they are deep.)
Average Value of Farms Increasing
 The average value per farm in Texas increased from 48,378 to 64,950 between 1959 and 1962, according to C. H. Bates, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.
 In this same period, the average size of farms increased from 631 to 710 acres. This year the land on the average Texas farm is worth \$59,302. Buildings are worth

an additional \$5,648. The average value for land and buildings is about \$91 per acre, he said.
 The rate of sales of farm land accelerated some during the last year also. The number of farm title transfers in Texas rose from 51.8 per 1,000 farms in 1960-61 to 58.2 in 1961-62.
 A study of the UDA's Economic Research Service shows the average value per acre of farm real estate reached a new high of \$123 per acre in the U. S. in 1962, five per cent higher than in the previous year. The average farm has 336 acres, and is worth \$41,400. About \$32,800 of this is accounted for by land, and the balance, \$8,600, by farm buildings, Bates said.

New Social Security
Rates January 1

New social security tax rates
go into effect on January 1, 1963,
according to Hal Geldon, district
manager of the Amarillo Social
Security office.

This is one of the regular tax
increases, provided in the law, to
cover the payment of retirement,
survivors, and disability benefits,
and all administrative costs of the
program.

For people working for wages,
the new 1963 rate will be 3 5/8%
on their first \$4800 in yearly earn-
ings. The employer will contribute
a like amount. For the self-emp-
loyed the new rate is 5.4% of the
first \$4800.00 in yearly net
earnings. Wages and self-employ-
ment earnings of more than \$4800.
a year are not taxable for social
security purposes.

Geldon noted that the new so-
cial security tax rate applies only
to wages paid and self employ-
ment income earned after Decem-
ber 31, 1962. The present rate
of 3 1/8 on wages is applicable
for wages paid in 1962 even
though they are not reported by
employers until early in 1963.
The current rate of 4.5% for the
self-employed is likewise applic-
able to self-employment income
earned in 1962 but not reported
until 1963.

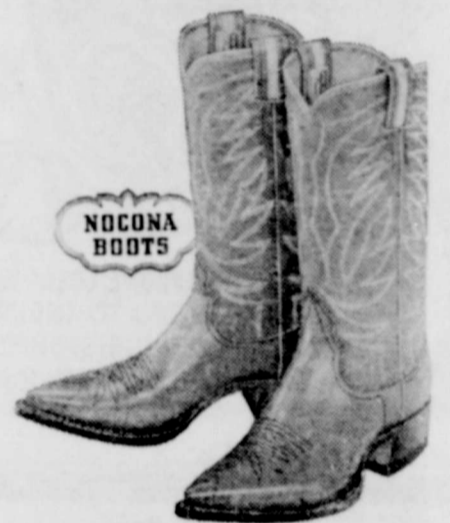

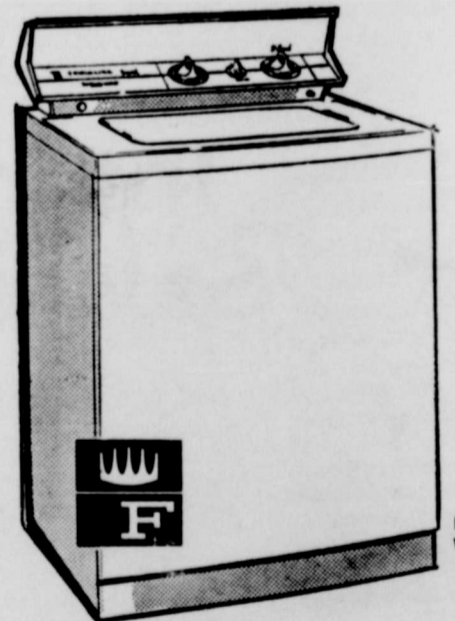
