Due to increasing postal rates, the Briscoe County News will raise subscription rates effective February 1, 1963. The new rates will be: \$2.50 plus tax in Briscoe County, \$3.50 plus tax outside Briscoe County, and 10c per copy over the counter.

This is an increase of 50c each on the mail subscriptions, and 5c paying \$5.20 a year, and are encouraged to subscribe in order to take advantage of the lower bymail rate.

During the month of January, 1963 the old rates will be in effect. At present plans are to place subscriptions on special during one month each year, probably July or August.






