The rural traffic accident summary for Briscoe County from January through December of 1962 shows a total of 27 crashes resulting in two persons killed and 15 injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$21,930.00.

Savings Bonds Sales Go Over Top In '62

December Savings Bond sales in Briscoe County were \$1,934 according to Perry Whittemore, Chairman of the Briscoe County Savings Bonds Committee. During 1962 the citizens of this county

purchased \$96,738, which represents 121.0 per cent of the 1962 sales goal of \$80,000.

Sales in Texas during 1962 totaled \$143,146,965 which is 87.7 per cent of the state goal.

Bareback bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping, ribbon roping, barrel racing and two or three events for the youngsters will be sponsored. The stock will be donated by Morris Stephens. All proceeds will go to the Senior class of Quitaque High School and will be used for the annual class trip. For the convenience of those attending the rodeo, a concession stand will be open both days of the rodeo, and sandwiches, coffee, soft drinks, candy and gum will be available.

J. W. Brannon, jr., of Panhandle has consented to donate his time to announce the show, and Mrs. Brannon will be the timekeeper. Both are teachers in the Panhandle school, and have made a practice of assisting the Quitaque seniors.

The class has hauled in the feed that farmers and ranchers donated to feed the stock for the rodeo. Donations are now being taken for the trophies to be given to the winners of the five events. There will be more than \$1,000.00 worth of prizes given during the rodeo.

First place award in each event will be a \$75.00 sterling silver belt buckle with gold figures. Second place award will be a \$50.00 sterling silver buckle with gold figures. The cowboy having the highest number of points, entered in two or more events including one riding and one roping event, will be awarded a \$250.00 hand-tooled trophy saddle for being All-Around Cowboy.

There will be many a cowboy nodding his head and saying, "Let's have 'em," for this All-Around Cowboy saddle. Some will discover that there are easier ways to make a living, while some will take home these grand prizes.

The parents of seniors will sponsor a Rodeo Dance at the American Legion Hall Saturday, April 27. Starting time and musicians for the dance will be announced later.

Press Names Dan Blocker 1963 Texan Of The Year

Dan Blocker, a really "big" man, will be the recipient of the Texas Press Association's 1963 "Texan of the Year" award.

Announcement of his selection has been made by George Baker, president of the newspaper association and publisher of the Fort Stockton Pioneer.

The presentation to Dan Blocker, 300-pound co-star of the NBC-TV show Bonanza, will be made at TPA's Mid-Winter Meeting at the El Tropicano Hotel in San

Antonio on Saturday evening, January 26.

Blocker, known on TV as Hoss Cartwright, was born in Bowie County, Texas, on December 10, 1929. He grew up in the Texas Panhandle and received his education in Texas.

Weighing 14 pounds at birth, he pulled the scales to 105 pounds by the time he entered grade school. He became known among his friends as "The Big'n". At age 10 he worked alongside grown men at grain elevators and could whip any of the local toughs, regardless of their age.

Despite his extraordinary strength, Dan Blocker had other ideas than pushing his weight around as a strong man. When 12 years old he enrolled in the Texas Military Institute at San Antonio. At that time he weighed 200 pounds and stood six feet tall.

From the military institute he went to Hardin-Simmons University at Abilene for a semester, then to Sul Ross College at Alpine, on a football scholarship, to major in physical education.

He changed his major to drama before he was graduated in 1950. From Alpine he went to Boston for summer stock. Then as did most young men of his time, Dan Blocker received greetings from The President and went overseas for a whirl at Korea.

When he finished his army hitch he came home with the stripes of a first sergeant, to further impress Dolphia Parker, his college sweetheart. They were married on August 25, 1952. They now have four children, twin girls and two boys.

Blocker returned to Sul Ross

shortly after his marriage to work on his master's degree. He left classes for one year to teach in the high school at Sonora. Upon receiving his Master's degree in drama and English, he taught school at Carlsbad, New Mexico.

In 1956, he went to Los Angeles for graduate work at UCLA. Almost immediately he was chosen for a feature role in a Gunsmoke episode, where he made more money in four days than in a month of teaching.

Since that time his rise to stardom has been rapid. He has played in many significant TV roles and today has top billing with Bonanza.

The Texas Press Association, on behalf of its 76 member dailies and 432 weeklies, has presented "Top Texan" awards on two previous occasions. In 1961 the honor went to Paul Richards of baseball fame, a native of Waxahachie, who at the time was manager of the top-ranking altimore Orioles. Last year the "Texan of the Year" award went to Van Cliburn, world renowned pianist from Kilgore, Texas.

Selection of the "Texan of the Year" is made from nominations by Texas editors and publishers. Nominees must be well known Texans, outside the field of politics, now residing beyond the borders of the state, but bringing fame to the state by outstanding accomplishments in their chosen fields of endeavor.

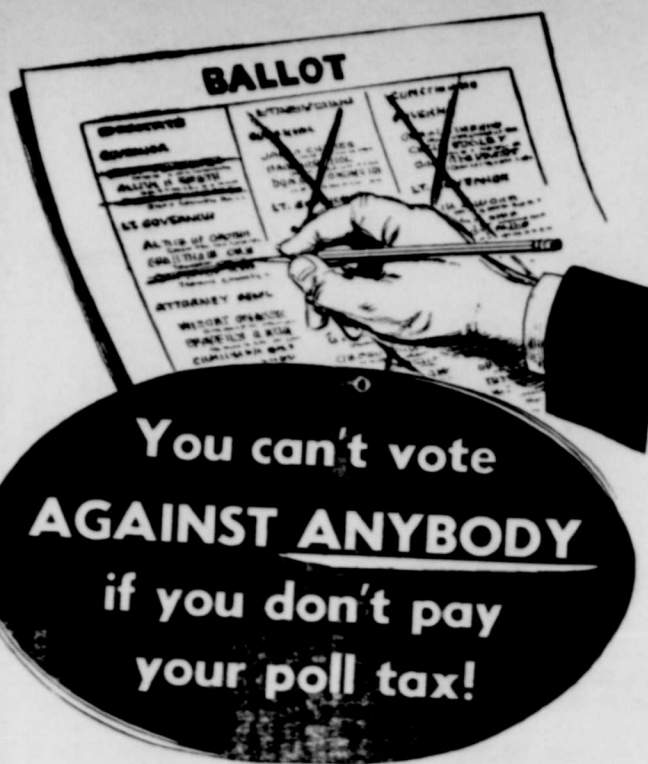

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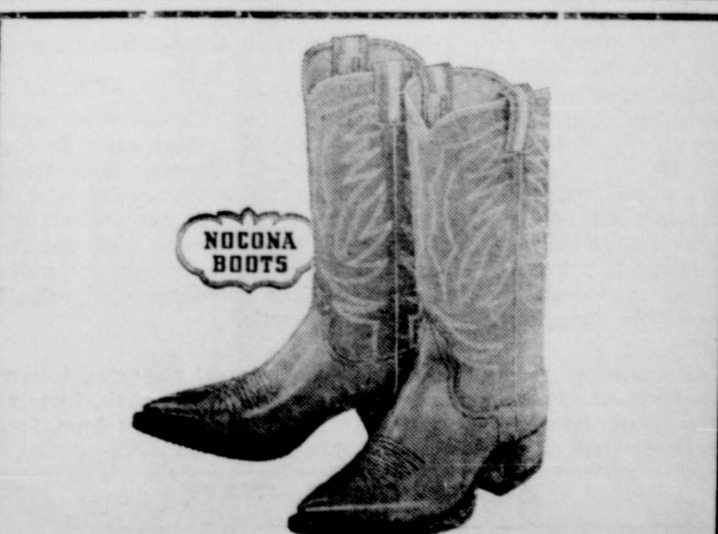

by Bess Streeter Aldrich

No American of recent years has gotten closer to the hearts of readers than Bess Streeter Aldrich. In "A Lantern In Her Hand" she wrote one of the most universally loved of all books. In "A White Bird Flying" she has written another story that possesses the same qualities, a sturdy American novel that is written with delightful straightforwardness.

"A White Bird Flying" is the story of Laura Deal, a charming girl, who is portrayed as full of ambitions and looking forward to a career of writing. About her are the members of her family and their friends in a small city in one of the great prairie states. There are suspense, romance and sentiment in her story and Mrs. Aldrich has shown with compelling reality the problem of the modern woman's life, where ambition and the wide world call to her on the one hand and the duties that follow on love and home life on the other.

Where in "A Lantern In Her Hand" the author portrayed the pioneer generation, in "A White Bird Flying" she shows also the second and third generations from the pioneers.
