

All Around the Town

Our school is a source of pride for several reasons. One of the reasons is that so many of those who live and work together in the community are former students of the school and their alma mater stirs fond memories. Many of them have graduated from high school here and have returned after seeking higher education, job training and serving with the military to make their homes here.

Another reason for pride in the school is that of those who live in the Silvertown School District very few do not, or will not, have children, grandchildren, nieces, nephews, brothers, sisters or friends among the children attending school here. We are proud of the boys and girls who make up that group which meets nine months of every year and of the adults who are dedicated to leading them along paths of learning.

The school is built and maintained by taxes, assessed in proportion to the amount of property we own, and therefore is owned by each of us. If you pay school taxes you own a portion of it and we own a part of it which represents the taxes we pay. I am proud of my part.

City and country people share alike in the building of a school for their children to attend.

Our school is presently on the threshold of a new day of great achievement. Much has been done in the few short years we have called Silvertown our home toward improving and strengthening our school system. One can hardly note a single instance in which improvement has not been made in our school program. The state accreditation, which the school had been in danger of losing, has been fully restored after an intensive rebuilding, repairing and building program. This rebuilding has been accomplished through a more varied school curriculum as well as through the securing of the best-qualified teachers available.

Silvertown High School is now graduating students who are better prepared to enter colleges and universities and more capable of filling jobs in the community.

For as long as the school district is making an effort in the direction of improvement and progress the school will remain fully accredited.

With the increase in the population of Silvertown and the surrounding area, the student population is also on the increase. Only a few years ago one section of each grade was adequate to contain the students. Now there are two sections of each of the eight grades, and on the basis of this spring's scholastic census it appears that a third section of the first grade will be needed next year. Certainly by the next year the two sections of the first grade will be overflowing, tying the hands of gifted students completely, handicapping the others.

Four new classrooms, which house two sections of the third grade and two sections of the fourth grade, were ready for occupancy in October 1961. This building was done by the school district on a warrant basis, with the \$47,000 warrants handled locally through the First State Bank. The warrants were made for five years and the amount was paid in full last month.

For this accomplishment our Board of Trustees and school administrators certainly deserve the thanks they rarely get! The growth of our school has been gradual. In 1939 there were 12 school districts in Briscoe County in which were enrolled 1,164 pupils. The total attending the Silvertown school was 339. In 1949, there were 810 attending Briscoe County schools, 421 of whom were enrolled at Silvertown. The 1954-1955 Silvertown school census listed 454 scholastics and the 1962-1963 census lists 585 scholastics.

School trustees have managed to keep pace with the increase in school population very well, planning ahead for the anticipated numbers and providing, with the help of the taxpayers, classroom space. Now and then the teachers have found themselves with an extra load of pupils which hindered their teaching ability and the students' learning ability, but by planning ahead this can be avoided.

The Silvertown School faces this problem in school cafeteria and

Wheat Referendum Vote Fails

Wheat farmers across the nation joined hands on Tuesday of this week to say "no" to the Kennedy administration's new wheat control plan. To pass at least two-thirds of the votes would have had to be cast in favor and only about 42 per cent of the farmers and their wives voted for the 1964 wheat program.

Briscoe County farmers voted with the nation, 235 approving the program and 213 voting against it. There were 676 eligible voters in Briscoe County.

Congress has indicated that it probably will not pass further legislation regarding the 1964 wheat crop, and it now appears that farmers will raise their wheat crop next year without any help or hindrance from government agencies.

Some 37 persons and organizations, all personally dedicated to the task of saving the soil and other natural resources, received awards Friday night at the Region I Save The Soil and Save Texas Fort Worth Press Awards dinner.

The dinner, attended by approximately 125, was held in the Estacado Junior High School Cafeteria in Plainview.

Walter Humphrey, editor of the Fort Worth Press, sponsor of the program, made the award presentations. It was Humphrey who originated the idea of giving recognition for soil conservation efforts 18 years ago. The plan was originally limited to 13 counties of northeast Texas, but after the first year it was made statewide. Over \$200,000 in awards have been presented since that first year.

The Region I meeting and awards presentation was one of six held in the state this spring. Region I embraces 51 counties in the Panhandle and South Plains.

A highlight of the banquet was the presentation of a plaque to the Cottonwood Creek group of the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District for their outstanding achievement in the field of conservation.

Rain Covers Briscoe County

A general rain which began Tuesday and continued into the night dropped more than an inch of rain on the City of Silvertown this week. This brings the May total received in Silvertown to two inches with more rain predicted this week.

Blessing the rain-starved pasture grass, the moisture fell gently and a good soaking was reported in all parts of the county. Some of the reports were as high as an inch and a half.

Briscoe County missed the hail storm and flooding which was re-

ported from nearby areas. Crop prospects are considerably boosted, especially for the dryland farmers who had been waiting for moisture to plant.

The San Jacinto community received two light hail storms earlier this month. Gilbert Elms reported that on the evening of May 11 a twister came past their home place uprooting an evergreen, tearing off some shingles and loosening all four legs on their windmill.

The ice shower they received the following Tuesday covered the ground with small hailstones. Elms said that the sun was shining and not a drop of rain accompanied the hail.

Temperatures so far this May have ranged from a daytime high of 98 degrees to a nighttime low of 41 degrees. Moisture was reported on May 2, 5, 6, 11, 15, 18 and 21.

classroom facilities for the 1963-1964 school year. There is no room for the third section of the first grade which will be needed and every available classroom will be filled, leaving no room for a film projection room.

A plan has been developed by the School Trustees through which the building program can be continued. The architect for the plan is Bill Cox of Lubbock, who has been the school's architect for a number of years. A \$140,000 expansion has been proposed, but before it can be accomplished the voters must approve the bonds for the project.

The trustees cannot do this job for us. Each of those men has only one vote at the polls. It is the responsibility of each individual voter to express his opinion, and the will of the majority will rule.

The proposal includes a home-making department, classroom (which could be used for a film room), adequate cafeteria and kitchen facilities, and a classroom for

the new first grade section, in addition to a new office for the school nurse. This building would release three classrooms in the high school building for other occupancy while at the same time replacing out-dated facilities with new and modern ones which are designed to last the school, with its anticipated growth, for many years.

Considering the home economics department first, you have but to see the present department to realize that it is not adequate. The clothing lab, food lab, and classroom are combined with no room provided for entertaining, which is an important part of what is taught the girls.

In the new homemaking department, separate food and clothing labs would be provided as well as a living room in which the girls could entertain their mothers. (I'm sure to some of the men this sounds frivolous and unnecessary, but you must agree that the art of entertaining and gracefully pouring a cup of tea, coffee or punch, are skills that you hope your daughters will learn in home economics.) For many of the girls the homemaking skills they learn in their years in high school will

be all they will receive, and they will practice them the rest of their lives.

The need for a new and adequate school cafeteria cannot be denied by anyone who has visited there recently. If you do not have a child in school you may not be familiar with the schedule, the race against time, that goes on day after day in the present facilities. At 11:00 a.m. each day the first and second graders enter the cafeteria for lunch. (They are small and more of them can be crowded into the cafeteria than can the older students who are larger and occupy more space.) The first and second graders fill the room to capacity. Almost ten minutes are allowed before the third and fourth grades enter the cafeteria and the younger children must hurry through their lunches in order to be out of their way. This eight-minute allowance schedule continues until 12:30 p.m.

Some of us do bolt our food, but this is not a habit which we wish to encourage. The students can actually walk to town and get a sandwich sooner than they can stand in line and be served. School administrators believe that the number of lunches served at the cafeteria each day will be doubled with adequate facilities to speed up the serving operation.

Members of the cafeteria staff have little room in which to work. In the proposed new kitchen adequate counters for meal preparation and serving are to be provided, and all are planned to serve the school's needs for years and years.

The architect has drawn 58 tables on the blueprint for the new cafeteria, and with these in the position shown, more than 350 could be seated comfortably. This has been no hasty, "grab a plan out of the bin" type of preparation. Several plans have been gone over laboriously and plans have been re-worked to best fit the needs of the Silverton Independent School District. Illustrating the Board's foresight, the extra classroom, which is planned as a film room, adjoins the dining room. The wall between the classroom and the cafeteria would be one which could be removed if in the future it is necessary to seat a larger number of pupils.

Another thing, which should not be overemphasized but which is certainly worthy of mention, is that the cafeteria could be used for community banquets. It would be available under the supervision of the school and one of the cafeteria supervisors would be on hand at all times.

The new unit would be located between the north end of the high school building and the primary building, close enough to the street that only a small lawn would have to be maintained and leaving as much playground space as possible away from the street. The new primary classroom and a janitor's workshop would be constructed on the west end of the primary wing.

The new addition could be ready for occupancy during the next school year.

Next week this newspaper will print the architect's drawing of the new unit.

The bond election has been set for Saturday, June 1. Taxpayers will be asked to cast their ballots in the way they believe best for the school. It has been pointed out that NO increase in taxes will be necessary to finance the project. A table is provided elsewhere in this issue of the Briscoe County News showing the dollars and

SOIL TESTING FOR PROFIT

Today many cropping and fertilization recommendations are based on soil testing information. And many farmers and ranchmen are making use of the three soil testing laboratories in Texas to obtain this information.

A new bulletin of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service explains just what soil testing is and how it can be used by the producer. "Test Your Soil for Profits" says that soil testing is a scientific method to determine the fertility needs of a particular field. It explains that chemical means are used to determine soil reaction (pH), organic matter, available phosphorus, available potassium, available calcium, and soluble salts. Soil salinity can also be determined by special testing techniques.







Lester Grabbe Accepted For Summer Training

Lester L. Grabbe of Silvertown is one of 35 high school students who have been selected from approximately 200 applicants to receive special training in biology this summer at The University of Texas.

The program, supported by the National Science Foundation, is designed to accelerate the educational development of high ability students.

Training beyond that normally available in high school courses will be offered to the students. They will hear lectures by University faculty members and guest

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NEW CHEMICAL INSECT CONTROL DEVELOPED
 Olin Mathieson announced the marketing of a new early season insect control on cotton. The new chemical, called BIDRIN (R) insecticide label, was approved by the United States Department of Agriculture for use on cotton April 1, 1963.
 Bidrin is a systemic insecticide. It kills some insects by contact, but its greatest asset is that it kills most sucking and chewing insects by systemic action. When Bidrin is applied to growing cotton, it is almost immediately absorbed into the plant. Its killing action to insects in the plant may last from one to two weeks. Since most of Bidrin applied to cotton plants is absorbed it is not available on the plant surface. Hence, beneficial insects develop in a normal way. In a 1962 cotton season, Bidrin was used with good results for thrip control on 1500 acres of cotton of lands of the Texas Prison Farm System.
 The new chemical (dimethyl Phosphate of 3-hydroxy N, N-dimethylcrotonamide) is a water-miscible product. For foliage applications, the correct amount of technical Bidrin is mixed with sufficient water to provide uniform coverage.
 For control of thrip, fleahoppers, aphid, spider mite and overwintering bollweevil, Bidrin is applied at the rate of 0.1 pound to 0.2 pound per acre of cotton. For control of lygus bugs on cotton, Bidrin is applied at 0.5 pound per acre.
 Bidrin comes packed in one quart containers, six per case. Each quart contains 1.8 lbs. of actual Bidrin and will treat 18 acres at .1 lb. per acre or 9 acres at .2 lb. per acre.
