School Enrollment Totals 550 Here

Silverton Public Schools opened Tuesday, September 3, with a general assembly in the school auditorium.

Rev. Carl Nunn, pastor of the Silverton Methodist Church, made the address. The invocation was given by O. C. Rampley, high

school principal. Two selections were sung by Miss Sharon Weaver, and J. S. Hinds, school superintendent, gave the benediction.

High school classes went through a short schedule, while students in the elementary and junior high grades were enrolled.

Students were dismissed before the noon hour and buses delivered the rural students back to their homes.

A total of 543 were enrolled Tuesday and seven more were enrolled Wednesday, making a total white enrollment of 550. Of this

total, 136 are high schoolers. There are 62 first graders this year. The total enrolled in 1962 was 539.

New teachers are Mrs. Charles Payne, third grade; Mrs. Jack Mayfield, sixth grade; Mrs. Zobia Self, American history and junior high; and Troy Harrison, science.

Mr. and Mrs. Joe Ellison are teachers at the Carver Elementary School. They report 42 scholastics on roll there.

School Board Rejects Bids
First bids on the construction of a new school cafeteria, home-making department and nurse's office were submitted to the Board of Trustees by four construction firms recently. The first bids were rejected by the trustees as being too high. The construction costs, if accepted at the lowest first bid, would have eaten into the funds reserved for equipping the new unit.

Additional bids will be received by the School Board on September

17, 1963. It is hoped by school officials that additional construction companies will submit bids at that time. It is also hoped that the other firms will figure their bids closer and come up with lower bids this time.

Construction is scheduled to begin within 10 days after notification of acceptance of bid.

Missionaries To East Africa To Show Film

"African Crisis," a 30-minute color sound film, will be shown Friday, September 6, at the Assembly of God Church in Silverton, the Rev. M. E. Green, pastor, announced today.

Jimmy, Mary and Gregory Beggs are the Silverton Assembly of God Church's missionaries to East Africa. They will be guests in the local church for the showing of "African Crisis," and will bring a message concerning East Africa.

"We know there is no God. The Jesus Christ they talk about was an Englishman." This statement by Jomo Kenyatta, leader of the Mau Mau in East Africa, is typical of this movement of witchcraft, superstition and savagery. In spite of destruction such as the Lari massacre where 2,400 African Christians were murdered at one time by the Mau Mau, churches continue to be built and the Gospel spreads. The film, "African Crisis," is as Sir Edward Windley, Minister for African Affairs, put it, "a challenge to the church for greater missionary effort."

The showing of "African Crisis" will be at 7:45 p.m. The public is invited.

There will be no services Wednesday, September 11, because of a Sunday School Retreat at Floydada, Rev. Green said.

New Fire Alarm System Installed Here

Time is short for winter wheat producers to consider how their wheat plantings may affect their participation in the 1964 feed grain program, Chairman Louie Kitchens of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Briscoe County Committee reminded growers today.

The Chairman said that many wheat farmers in the county are also feed grain producers and as a result are eligible to participate in the 1964 feed grain program by diverting feed grain acreage out of production.

He noted the drop in 1964 wheat prices as reflected by the present wheat futures market. Currently,

the judgment of the market is a July 1964 Kansas City wheat futures price of around \$1.55 per bushel. This price, adjusted to a farm level, reflects a wheat price of about \$1.25 to \$1.30 per bushel.

A 1964 crop in excess of current disappearance of about 1.3 billion bushels for domestic and export use will undoubtedly put heavy downward pressure on wheat prices, probably forcing prices down to a feed price level as the supply seeks a consumption outlet.

Chairman Louie Kitchens pointed out that the 1964 feed grain program has been designed to reduce possible expansion of over-all grain acreage. The program provides an effective guide for farmers to follow in keeping their over-all crop acreages in 1964 reasonably in line with expected needs.

While the program provides flexibility in enabling farmers to shift acreages among crops not directly under the feed grain program, it also provides for maintaining soil-conserving acreage, including summer fallow and idle land on participating farms at 1959-60 levels. This will tend to limit over-all acreage expansion, particularly if substantial numbers of wheat-feed grain producers participate in the program.

At the same time, payments for diverting feed grain acreage to a conserving use, price support payments on the acreage seeded, and the availability of price support will help maintain income. An added incentive to keep over-all grain in check is the boost in the payments to be made for diversion of maximum acreages under the program.

The Chairman urged all farmers in Briscoe County who intend to seed wheat this fall and who also plant feed grains to look into the possibilities of participating in the 1964 feed grain program before they complete their seeding plans. Even though the feed grain sign-up will not be until early next year, farmers who plan to participate will need to keep their fall-seeded acreage in line with total crop acreage permitted on their farms under the feed grain program.

New Traffic Law Makes It A Violation To Drive Too Slowly

Col. Homer Garrison, jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, recently announced that the new speed law effective in August specifically makes it a violation to drive a vehicle so slow as to impede traffic.

He said that before enactment of the new law it was necessary for a police officer to warn a driver impeding traffic to speed up or get off the road before filing a charge.

"Under the new statute as we interpret it whenever a driver is driving slower than the normal and reasonable movement of traffic and thereby impeding that traffic he will be committing a violation for which he may be charged

in court," Garrison said.

The DPS Director also pointed out that under the new law official bodies having jurisdiction over various kinds of highways are authorized to zone roads for minimum speeds whenever they determine that slower speeds consistently impede traffic. Failure to comply with such minimum speed limits will be regarded as a violation, he added.

"Substantial compliance with these provisions should relieve congestion on highways and reduce considerably the differential between top speeds and lower speeds, thus reducing potential conflicts and increasing traffic safety."

Garrison reminded again in connection with the new maximum speed limits of 70 m.p.h. in daytime and 65 m.p.h. at night for passenger cars that these are dependent upon conditions existing on the roadway at the time. The Texas law requires a driver to operate his vehicle "reasonably and prudently" at all times, regardless of the posted limits," he said.

"We repeat that serious problems may develop with the new speed law unless the driving public accepts and applies them with a high degree of responsibility to themselves, their families and others."

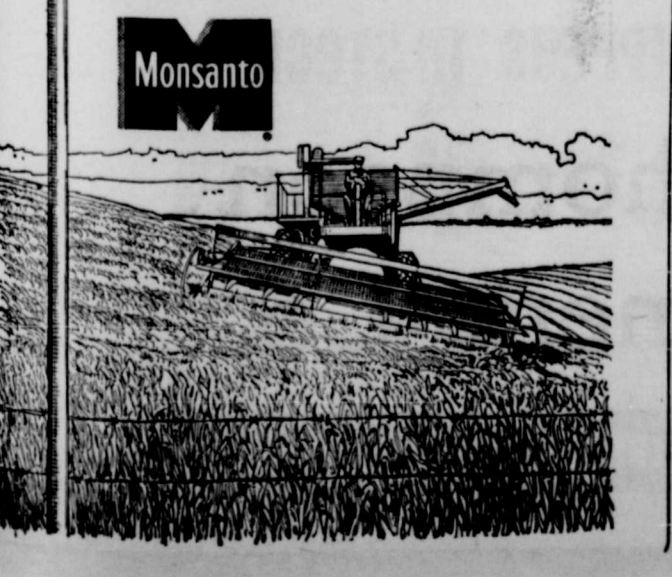

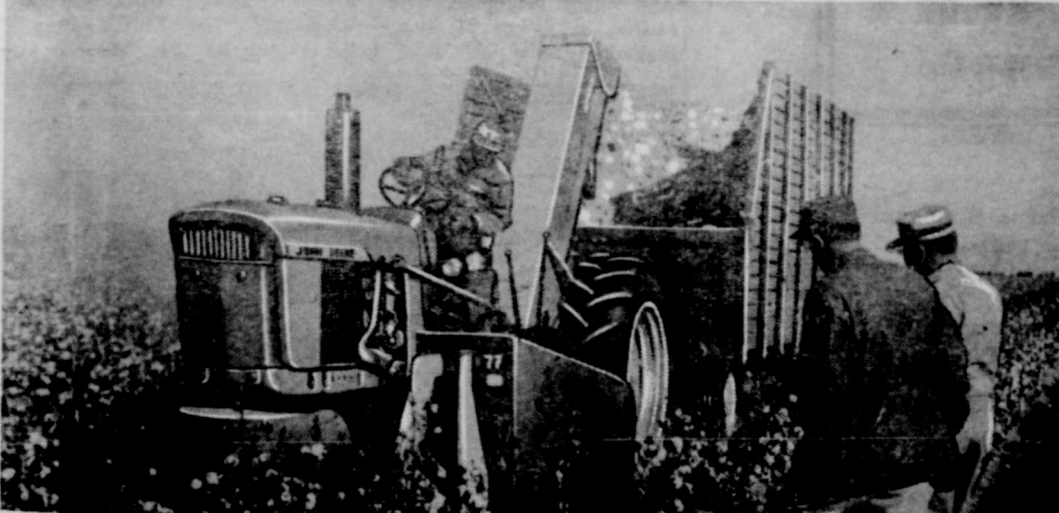
