## Owls Bring Home Win From Turkey

The Silverton Owls traveled to Turkey Friday night, and handed the Turks their third defeat of the season, 34-6. This was the first time in seven years that the Owls have triumphed over the Turks.

The first touchdown of the evening came before the Owls had made a first down. A Turkey punt was taken by Fred Stafford inside the Turkey 10-yard stripe. The Turks threw the Owls for a 6-yard loss on the last play of the first quarter. Stafford picked up 10 yards on the next play, and on the second play of the second quarter he went in for the score.

score on the second play from scrimmage.

As the final gun sounded the Owls owned the ball on Turkey's 19-yard line, and were in scoring position again.

Several Owl passes were completed only to be nullified by penalties which haunted Silverton from the first whistle. The Owls were penalized 90 yards, mostly for illegal procedure and backfield in motion, while Turkey was penalized 30 yards. The Silverton penalties were caused by inexperienced players who were nervous, it appeared.

Turkey completed one pass to Derrell Fuston and had 21 fall incomplete. Silverton completed three to Dennis Tomlin and one to Garner Garrison, and had nine fall incomplete. Two Owl passes were intercepted by Turkey.

Both clubs fumbled several times. Turkey recovered one of their own and two dropped by the Owls, while Silverton recovered four Turk fumbles.

Most of the Owls who weren't suffering from injuries saw action during the game, and one of the Silverton scores came with several of the reserves in the

lineup. Larry McWilliams was out of action part of the game after an old knee injury was revived, and Wayne Nance received a torn cartilage which required a cast on his leg. Robert Bomar was back in the game after having been out with a broken finger. Emmett Tomlin, Rocky Curby and Mitch McDaniel are sidelined with a broken arm, foot and fingers, respectively. Gary Grady is also unable to suit out.

The Owls will host the Happy Cowboys Friday night. The Cowboys defeated Turkey 13-0 earlier this season and were beaten by Claude 14-7. If the Owls can correct some of the mistakes which drew the penalties at Turkey, it may be a very good halgame.

## Wheat Growers Should Get Facts About Overseeding

Farmers were urged today to get all the facts about the results of overplanting their wheat allotments before completing their 1964 seeding plans.

Louie Kitchens, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Briscoe County Committee, said that apparently there is wide misunderstanding about certain provisions of the wheat program in years when marketing quotas are not in effect for the wheat crop. The Briscoe County ASCS Office, therefore, is making a determined effort to get accurate information to all wheat farmers this fall, so that their 1964 seeding plans may be made with full knowledge of continuing program provisions.

According to the Chairman, the provision causing the most misunderstanding is the one under which the farm allotment will be reduced in future years if the allotment is overplanted in 1964. The reduction in the future allotments results from the fact that the 1964 wheat acreage history for an overplanted farm will be established at a figure equal to the 1964 farm acreage allotment instead of the higher base acreage. (The base acreage is about 1½ times the farm allotment.)

This provision is spelled out in the law; it has been in effect since the legislation was enacted in April 1958.

The provision concerns acreage allotments, and it would still apply to the operation of the wheat allotment program whether or not marketing quotas were in effect for the wheat crop. The only difference would be that, under a quota program, the producer with a wheat acreage larger than his allotment would have an opportunity to avoid the reduction in the wheat acreage history by storing the excess wheat or delivering it to the Secretary of Agriculture. This cannot be done when quotas are not in effect since no farm marketing excess is determined for any farm.

Mr. Kitchens explained that provisions have been made for 1964 to continue giving producers who overplant their wheat allotment an opportunity to dispose of the excess acreage by the deadline date. In this way, such producers may benefit by being eligible for price support (available at 50 percent of parity, as directed by law) and receiving the base acreage as 1964 history credit in the determination of future allotments. The disposal dates for the 1964 wheat crop will be the same as for the 1963 crop, will be the same as for the 1963 crop.

Summarizing the program provision, the Chairman said that farms where the 1964 wheat acreage is kept within the farm allotment (of 15 acres or more) will receive their base acreage as history for future allotments. Farms with wheat acreage in excess of the farm allotment (of 15 acres or more) will receive their 1964 allotted acres as history.

ment would affect the 1966 and future wheat allotments; it would not affect the 1965 allotment since the 1964 acreage would not be available when such allotments were determined. Since the 1964 farm allotment is approximately 60 percent of the farm base, overplanting could have the net effect of reducing the farm allotment on such farm by six to seven percent beginning with the 1966 allotment.

divert the entire base. Other program diversion rates are one-fifth of the county price support rate for the minimum 20 percent diversion, and one-half the county support rate—that is, the maximum rate—for diversions between 20 and 40 percent. (Growers diverting between 20 and 40 percent would thus receive two rates of payment—the lower rate for the minimum diversion, and the higher rate for the 20-40 percent part of the diversion.)

**Could Benefit Wheat Producer**  
Wheat growers who also produce feed grains should take a good look at how they can get the most benefit from participating in next year's feed grain program. Louie Kitchens, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Briscoe County Committee points out that major provisions of the 1964 feed grain program have already been announced, so that farmers may have the information in making their fall seeding plans. The program sign-up period for both fall and spring sown crops is planned for early 1964.

The chairman said that, in drawing up the 1964 feed grain program, careful consideration was given to ways in which the program could help maintain income from wheat while continuing progress in meeting the feed grain program objectives. However, even the improved program for feed grains with its cushioning effect on wheat prices will not prevent a drop in wheat income. Thus, the grower who diverts the maximum acreage under the feed grain program next year will receive the maximum rate of payment available under the program, and thus offset a possible loss of income from the 1964 wheat crop.

While the 1964 feed grain program is basically the same as the 1963 program, the important changes have been made to encourage producers to divert additional feed grain acreage and to increase their income. One change is that in 1964 the maximum percentage a producer may divert is increased from 40 to 50 percent of his total feed grain base acreage. And the other change is that those who divert 40 percent or more of their total feed grain base will receive diversion payments at the maximum rate of one-half the county's total price support rate for all acres diverted. A grower with a total feed grain base of 25 acres or less may still

If the wheat-feed grain grower also keeps his wheat acreage within the 1964 wheat allotment, he will also be eligible for the available 1964 wheat allotment, he will also be eligible for the available 1964 wheat price support. TEXAS HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT EXPANDS ANTI-LITTER CAMPAIGN



The Texas Highway Department has added two new methods to its continuing anti-litter campaign: a cartoon character printed on its Official Highway Travel Map and revised highway signs reminding drivers they can be fined from \$10 to \$200 for littering. The cartoon character, "The Litter Longhorn," pleads with the public to "Help Stomp Out Litter." The sign emphasizes that it is against the state law to litter. In 1962 the Highway Department had to spend \$1.4 million to pick up litter, an increase of about a hundred thousand dollars over 1961.

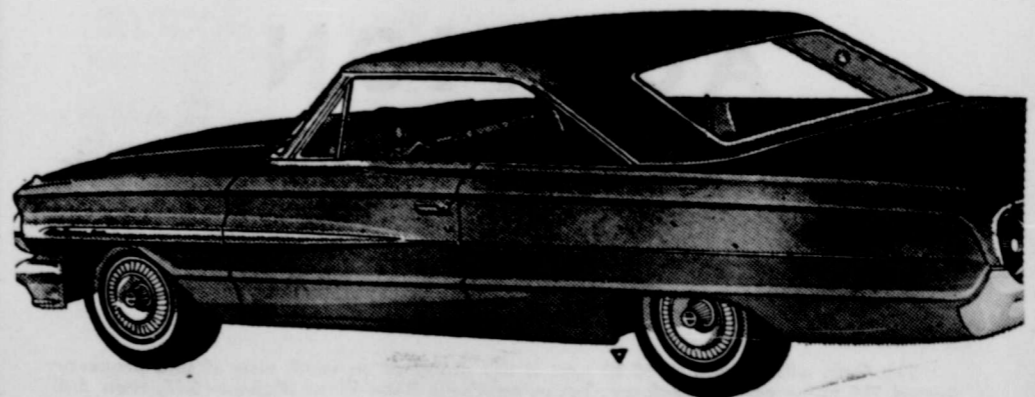

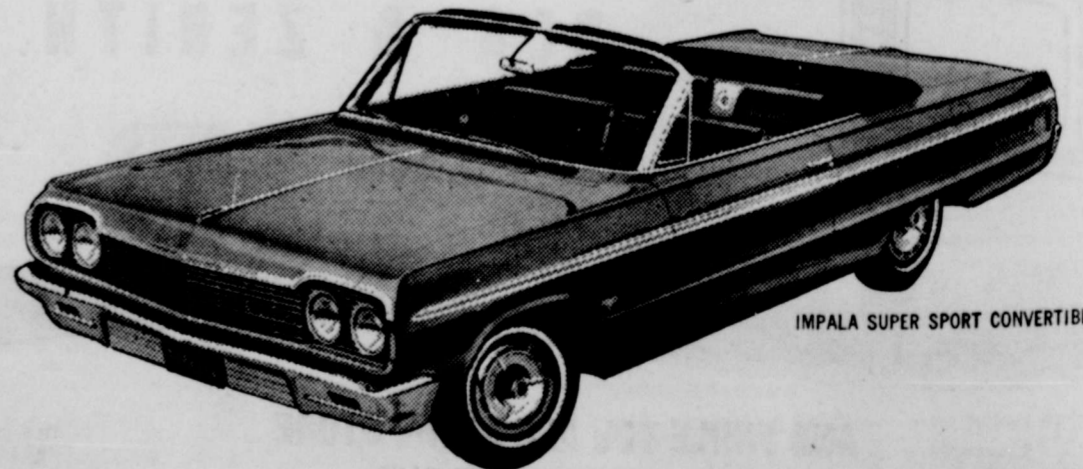
