Mustangs muscle past Mules, 81-70

Out of necessity, and curiosity, Muleshoe brought out its Young Guns.

Denver City answered with its Big Guns, shooting down the Mules upset bid, 81-70, Tuesday at WJHS gym.

Tony McCray scored 22 points and Todd Carrillo added 21 as Denver City beat Muleshoe for the third time this season.

Unlike the last meeting, when Muleshoe was out of the game at halftime, the Mules kept the game against the senior-laden Mustangs (11-7) competitive deep into the fourth quarter with a rotation that included six underclassmen, including three freshmen.


"One of the bright spots was how the freshmen handled their first varsity situation," Muleshoe coach Ralph Mason said. "It was a good chance to get a look at some kids."

Freshman Dustin Cleavinger was playing in his third varsity game and classmates Carlton Lewis (3 points) and Matt McClanahan (6 points) were moved up because of absences and injuries.

Back-to-back baskets by Cleavinger (14 points, six rebounds) pulled the Mules within 59-58 at the end of three quarters. The game was tied at 42 at halftime.

But Denver City ripped off an 11-2 run at the start of the fourth quarter.

"For three quarters we played really well, then we started putting up some quick shots, Continued on page 5

Muleshoe storms to Sudan tourney title

SUDAN - It was the kind of win Muleshoe needed; a win over a team it wasn't supposed to beat.

A win that proves to both themselves and District 2-3A foes the Lady Mules are serious title contenders.

And a win that erases doubts leftover from last year's disastrous season, which included an 0-15 start.

Mandy Cleavinger had a monster game and Muleshoe made the plays down the stretch Saturday in a 44-35 upset of perennial state power Sudan in the championship game of the Sudan Booster Club Tourna-

"One of our goals was to win a tournament," said MHS junior guard Brandi Harrison, who had 10 points, eight rebounds and six assists and did a good job of handling Sudan's full-court pressure. "It's a key win before district."

"We talk about the importance of picking up the intensity and being sharp in the fourth quarter, even when we're tired," Harrison added.

After hanging in the game for three quarters despite 21 turnovers, Muleshoe (14-4) Sudan Tournament

made the big plays down the stretch.

Junior sixth-man Kristen Nichols put the Lady Mules ahead, 34-32, for the first time since they took a 4-0 lead to start the game when she swished a 15-footer from the baseline midway through the fourth quarter.

Two minutes later, Allyson Field (five points) scooped up a loose ball after a missed Sudan free throw and scored an uncontested layup despite a sprained ankle limited both her playing time and mobility.

Cleavinger made both ends of a one-and-one 19 seconds later after rebounding a Sudan miss, giving Muleshoe a 38-32

Local story's content creates controversy

The top stories for the final third of 1995 included the resignations of two prominent Muleshoe figures, an appearance by a city man on national TV and a failed bid to lure a new plant to the area.

· Hired as Muleshoe's Police Chief in October 1993 upon the death of Chief Wayne Holmes, Julian Dominguez resigned Nov. 17 amid allegations that he assaulted his wife.

The allegations are being investigated by Bailey County Sheriff's Department and the Texas Rangers. Dominguez is yet to be charged.


Muleshoe Assistant Police Chief Jay Livingston was appointed acting police chief.

Adair was forced by the MISD School Board to resign after four seasons in Muleshoe, following an 0-10 football sea-

his acquaintance with former Muleshoe resident Shelli Fried, an exotic dancer claiming to be a vampire.

The story, "The Vampire Strikes Back," drew criticism from some community members because it contained references to sex.

 Muleshoe's bid for oil mill included \$5.75 million incentive package including the donation of a 657-acre tract of land, \$1 million in cash, tax abatements and a non-annexation agreement. The bid failed.

· The boll weevil was perceived by some, including County extension agent Curtis Preston, as a potential threat in Bailey County.

Experts say that one reason the High Plains has seen a tremendous increase in the population of the boll weevil is a series of five mild winters in a row.

Plains Cotton Growers Association overwhelmingly approved the Enhanced Boll Weevil Eradication Plan.

The initial phase of the eradication, which covers approximately 2.4 million acres of cotton in 22 High Plains counties, started in late September.

HEREFORD — Strategies to help assure growers of profitable production and marketing of crops will be the focus of "Integrated Crop Management of Vegetables" during the annual High Plains Vegetable Conference here Jan. 16.

The conference begins at 8:30 a.m. at the Hereford Community Center, 100 Ave. C at Park Avenue. Safe and Creative Photo Preservation Tips

The holiday season provides so many opportunities for creative photography, and preserving these cherished memories is very important. Lyn Johnson, consultant with Creative Memories from Belmont, CA., will be a guest on Creative Living on Tuesday, January 2nd at 1:00 p.m. and on Saturday, January 6th at 3:00 p.m. and will share some information on safe and creative photo

Thomas Davies, author and photographer once said, "In this age of disposable everything, we must be careful not to dispose of our past. It is no small task to find, organize, restore and preserve our photos but if it is not done, a valuable legacy will be lost. We must establish a new tradition of the family

Johnson agrees with this premise, and through her company, Creative Memories, she encourages people to preserve their families' special occasions, such as births, vacations, graduations, and those once-in-a-lifetime moments, through photographs and photo albums. She offers the following tips:

· Select photo-safe albums and adhesives. Scrapbooks with acid-free pages are best, as acid will destroy your photos. Album bindings should allow pages to lie flat, to keep photographs from bending and/or cracking.

· Instead of feeling overwhelmed by the task of sorting through years of photos, start with the most recent ones first. When you do tackle the rest, sort them by decades first, then break down by approximate years, and put them

· Keep one "family album" and one album for each child. What nicer way to send off a son or daughter to college or their first apartment?

. Document your photos. It's important to write in names, dates and events. It is just as important to write in feelings, humorous captions and appropriate quotes. Also, consider "photo-journaling." This is often the only way the details of our everyday lives are passed on to future generations.

 Trim pictures with too much sky, a thumb or camera strap. Use cookie cutters to trim photos into shapes: a heart, circle or Christmas tree. Be careful not to cut out things that define an era, such as the '79 car or hobby horse.

· Do not cut Polaroid prints.

· Be selective — mount only well-focused, varied shots.

· Include special momentos with your photos: Mikey's first hair cut photo with a lock of hair; family vacation photos with color brochures and post cards. Decorate the pages with colorful stickers and greeting card cut-outs.

Instead of using newspaper, make clear photocopies of news clips for your album and store originals in a cool, dry, dark, safe place. . Take at least one roll of black and white film per year - they outlast color

Do not store your negatives in the same place as your album. Always store your albums in an upright position; stacking them causes abrasion problems.

Lady Mules rule in fourth quarter

SUDAN — Judging from the way Allyson Field was limping during pregame warmups, a snail would have been an odds-on favorite to beat her in a foot race — until the game was on the line.

Field, ignoring a sprained ankle that left her with a noticable gimp, scooped up a loose ball and raced the length of the court for an uncontested layup that gave Muleshoe a 36-32 lead with two minutes left in the game.

The play propelled the Lady Mules to a 44-35 upset of Sudan Saturday in championship game of the Sudan Booster Club Tournament.

Field just laughed and shook her head when asked how she was able to outrun the Sudan defenders to the basket.

"I could hardly walk (Saturday) morning," said Field, explaining how she paced around the house trying to loosen up the stiff ankle.

"I was really pleased with hereffort," Muleshoe coach Jim Gruhlkey said. "I didn't even think she could play."

"It sets a good example for

the younger kids to see how being mentally and physically tough can make a difference," Gruhlkey added.

Field's gritty effort was just one of several big plays the Lady Mules made down the stretch.

Other clutch plays included: Junior Kristen Nichols

drilled a 15-foot baseline jumper to give Muleshoe its first lead, 34-32, since taking a 4-0 to start the game. Nichols also scored on an inbounds play later and made 1-of-2 free throws in the last minute.

Nichols didn't even realize the score was tied when she hit the jumper.

"I just took the shot," Nichols said with a shrug of her shoulders.

"She asked me earlier if she should have taken a shot she missed earlier in the game," Gruhlkey said. "I told if yes, because if she doesn't take that shot, she won't be in the game."

Senior post Mandy Cleavinger (18 poiunts, eight rebound, eight blocked shots) grabbed a clutch rebound and made both ends of a one-and-

one with 1:57 left in the game.

Junior point guard Brandi Harrison (10 points, eight rebounds, six assists) rebounded a missed free throw and scored to tie the game at 30, then scored on a drive 36 seconds later, tying the game at 32. Her two free throws with 50 seconds left helped seal the win.

In the first game between

the two teams (a 61-47 Sudan win) and the first three quarters of Saturday's games, it was two-time defending Class A state champion Sudan that made most of the big plays.

But Muleshoe made the plays that good teams make during crunch time Saturday, and it paid off with its biggest win of the season.

"This is really going to help us out," Muleshoe coach Jim

Gruhlkey. "Even though Weaver got hurt, we're still not supposed to win this game, playing them at (Sudan)."

Gruhlkey added that it was the type of game that would give the Lady Mules confidence they can handle the kind of pressure defenses they'll see during district play.


"That's all we talked about before the game," Gruhlkey said. "At least it brought us back down to earth."







I could hear him leaping around in glee doing cartwheels off the dashboard and pounding the hood.

"That's great!" I told him.

Then it occurred to me that if he'd made the same call and told me the same thing two years ago or four years ago or six years ago, I'd be sendin' him flowers and a sympathy card.

It sure don't take long for the wheel to come off the wagon. I trade a few ol' gummers every year. Seems like I went for quite a spell with them bringin' 50-60 cents after a summer's grazin'. Now they're down in the thirties.

Oddly enough I haven't noticed the price of a Big Mac goin' down or Big Ed's Steakhouse sellin' their prime rib for less. Supermarket prices are down some but not the 20 percent that live cattle prices have fallen. Everybody up the food chain from the packin' house to the fajita maker are keepin' a part of our loss for themselves.

We can gripe about it... and we do, but beef

My friend, Andy called from his car phone is getting more like wheat. The price of grain doesn't have much effect on the price of bread.

If the packin' house makes more money, the employees and managers get a raise. But when the price of cattle or hogs goes down, the employees and managers don't take a cut in pay to reduce the sale price of beef back to where it was. They hold back part of that savings.

By the time all the middlemen have whittled on the price decrease, there is often no noticeable savings left at the consumer level. The cowman takes the cut in pay for everybody up the line. Which leaves us asking, "So, what's

As a group, cattlemen do not have an organized marketing scheme., Each one pits himself against a small handful of buyers who are organized. However, there are individual cowmen who do have a plan.

Through genetics, selection and customer attention they have developed calves with a reputation for performance. And that's why Andy's steers brought so much above the market. The buyers knew his cattle.

Officials advise safety check for users of propane heat

AUSTIN - With cold weather gripping the state, homeowners who fuel furnaces and appliances with propane are recommended to contact their local dealer for a safety check of the propane tank and regulator.

Although it doesn't happen often, safety officials warn that

if the regulator vent ices over, or is clogged by insect nests or debris, high pressure gas can be released directly to home appliances. Homeowners should participate with their propane dealer in a regular safety inspection program each year, said the Texas Railroad

Commission.

Regulators on most home tanks are located under a protective metal dome on top of the tank, shielding them from the weather and insects. On some tanks however, the circular regulator is installed outside the dome cover.
