WILDLIFE COMPROMISE

Parks and Wildlife Commission compromised on applications for free shell-dredging access to oyster reefs in Trinity and Galveston bays. It permitted dredging within 30 feet of live oyster reefs, as opposed to the usual 1,500-foot in Amarillo Sunday. distance. But it denied dredging near five major reefs and one bird island.

Commission said in a statement, 'It is reliably estimated that these revisions in regulations will make available up to two years' supply of shell to relieve current emer-

Then it ordered a widespread study of shell and aggregate resources which contribute \$1,500,-000 a year or 25 per cent of the department's income. It concluded that without this important revenue the Commission, in all probability, would be forced to substantially increase fishing and hunting license fees."





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

Silverton Owls Almost Upset Undefeated Wildcats

The fighting Big Red of Silverton High School did their best to upset the Idalou Wildcats in a District 4-A clash at Idalou Friday night. The Owls scored first and had several good drives upset by the Wildcats. Early in the fourth quarter, the Owls trailed only 21-16. The final score was 34-16.

Leading gainers from the line of scrimage for the Owls were Max Garrison, 89 yards, and Fred Stafford, 74 yards. Other yardage gainers were Monty Smith, 31 yards; Greg Towe, 16 yards; Dennis Tomlin, 36 yards; Emmett Tomlin, 4 yards; and John Montague, 13 yards.

Silverton gained 12 first downs from the line of scrimage while Idalou made 15. The Owls attempted 13 passes, completed seven, and had four intercepted by Idalou. Passes were from Towe to Stafford, Towe to Dennis Tomlin, Stafford to Max Garrison, Stafford to Dennis Tomlin and Stafford to Towe.

Max Garrison intercepted one Wildcat pass and Idalou completed four out of six tries.

Idalou surprised the Owls by fumbling four times. The Owls stole the ball three times, and lost it by fumble only once.

Silverton was penalized 30 yards and Idalou had 10 yards stepped off against them.

The Owls received the opening kickoff at their own 35-yard line. Max Garrison received the handoff on the first play of the game and gained a first down to the Idalou 45. The Owls made two additional first downs before being halted inside the Idalou 20-yard line.

When Idalou gained possession of the ball they ran through two first downs to their own 33-yard stripe before fumbling to the Owls. Silverton took over and ran to the Idalou 25 on the first series of plays, and to the Idalou 9 on the next series. Fred Stafford carried the first touchdown from about the five-yard stripe and a

pass to Dennis Tomlin was complete for the conversion points. The Owls led 8-0 before a stunned Idalou homecoming crowd of about 1.500.

When the Owls kicked off to the Wildcats following the touchdown, Idalou gained only three yards before fumbling, and Gary Hunt pounced on the ball for the Owls. A Stafford to Tomlin pass moved Silverton to the Idalou 25 and Stafford and Garrison moved the ball to about the Idalou 20 before an Owl pass was intercepted at the goal line by Idalou.

The Wildcats poured on the steam and racked up four first downs before tying the score 8-8 with a fake kick and pass play in the second quarter.

Silverton's next drive was broken up at the Idalou 40 by a pass interception, as Cris Weems lived up to his reputation and snatched the ball away. At halftime the score remained 8-8.

The Wildcats moved out in front in the third quarter by passing for a touchdown from the Silverton seven-yard line. The kick for extra point was no good, and Idalou led 14-8. Early in the fourth quarter, Idalou scored from the Silverton 30-yard line and the extra point try was no good.

With Stafford quarterbacking the club the Owls came back to score on a 20-yard run by Max Garrison. A pass from Stafford to Dennis Tomlin was good for the conversion points, and Idalou led by a narrow margin, 21-16.

Later in the fourth quarter Idalou moved on a Silverton penalty and finally plowed into the end zone from two yards out to raise the score to 27-16. Silverton came right back, driving to the Idalou 20-yard line. At that point an Owl pass was intercepted by Idalou and they went all the way to score. The final count was 34-16 with 1:01 left in the ballgame.

The Wildcats continue their undefeated season with a 7-0 record, while the Owls are still trying for win number four.
