

BOLL WEEVILS ON THE HIGH PLAINS



This diagram shows the extent of the boll weevils migration this year and the western limits of economic infestation in this area, reports Leon Grosdidier, Briscoe County Agricultural Agent. The economic damage in Briscoe County was along the extreme eastern and southeastern edge of the county, but the weevils did migrate several miles west of Silverton. Cages containing weevils have been placed in several areas along the caprock in ideal hibernation spots to check the boll weevils' ability to survive the winter on the plains.

The Extension Service is planning a spring survey of earlyplanted cotton in an attempt to detect emergence of overwintered weevils. If weevils are present in early season, a chemical control program would be the most logical approach to control, says Rummel. This, combined with a fall spray program to reduce numbers before they enter diapause, will be recommended to prevent yield loss and provide control.


