Six Nominated To Fill Two School Posts

Six men were nominated Saturday to fill two positions on the Board of Trustees of the Silverton Independent School District. The terms of W. E. Schott, Jr., and Edwin Dickerson are expiring.

Mr. Schott, who has served as president of the board, announced that he would not be a candidate for re-election after serving six years as a school trustee.

Nominated to fill the two vacancies were Robert Ledbetter, Norman Strange, Roy Mack Walker, Edwin Dickerson, Floyd Williams and Frank Hunt.

Dickerson was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Ray Teeple several months ago, when Teeple resigned from the board so that his sister could teach in the school system.

Remaining members of the board are Carman Rhode, J. E. (Doc) Minyard, Sam Lewis, E. A. Birdwell, and W. Arnold Brown, who was appointed to fill the vacancy created when Joe Fowler moved to Bovina.

D. H. Davis is a candidate for County Trustee, Precinct 3, and Walter Watters is a candidate for County Trustee, Precinct 1.

Wednesday was the deadline for filing for the school trustee election.

Lewis and Davis Buy Stephens Ford

Charles Durwood Lewis and Carl L. Davis have purchased Stephens Ford in Silverton and are operating as Lewis & Davis Ford. The agreement was reached late in January, and the business has been under the new management since February 1.

The brothers have been engaged in the operation of Lewis-Davis Used Cars in Amarillo for the past ten years.

Mr. and Mrs. Lewis have moved to Silverton, and are making their home in the Burson house south of the Norman Strange home. Durwood and Joyce have no children.

Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Davis are planning to move to Silverton from Amarillo this weekend or next week. Mr. Davis will also be associated with Lewis-Davis Ford. Mr. and Mrs. Davis are parents of six children, among whom are Durwood Lewis, Carl Davis, Mrs. John T. (Maebelle) Francis of Silverton and Mrs. Delton (Rose) Fisher of Halfway.

The A. H. Davis family are former residents of Quitaque.

Lewis-Davis Ford expects to be able to move to their new location at the Y-intersection of Highways 207 and 86 in Silverton in two or three weeks.

The Ford agency was established here four years ago by Mr. and Mrs. Homer Stephens, who had operated the business until the sale agreement was made. Mr. Stephens is building the steel building which will house the Ford agency.

March 7 Last Day To File For City Council

March 7 is the last day to file for three City Council vacancies. Five Silverton men were nominated Saturday as candidates for two places on the City Council, and one was nominated for Mayor.

Mayor Charles Whitfill had indicated earlier that he did not wish to seek re-election. Jimmie (Bud) House was nominated as a candidate for Mayor. Unless others file before the March 7 deadline, House will be uncontested on the ballot.

The terms of Councilmen Ray Thompson and J. B. Stafford are expiring. Thompson, Stafford, H. B. (Doc) Simpson, Charles Sarchet and O. M. Dudley have been nominated for the two places.

All who file at City Hall before March 7 will be listed on the ballot.

Burial was in the Silverton Cemetery.

Mrs. Burson died at 10:00 a.m. Sunday in a Plainview hospital.

Melissa Ann Burson was born March 16, 1877, near Winnsboro in Wood County, Texas, the daughter of the late R. F. and Dora Todd. She grew to womanhood in North Central Texas, where she was married to Jefferson Richmond Burson in Stephens County on April 24, 1895. They were united in marriage by Rev. A. B. Lane.

To this union were born ten children, four sons and six daughters, all of whom survive.

She came with her husband to Briscoe County October 31, 1897, and lived in a dugout two years before moving to Silverton. They made their home here until May 16, 1935, when they moved to Plainview, where Mr. Burson practiced pharmacy.

She was converted at the age of 18 and had been a member of the Baptist Church for almost 70 years.

She was preceded in death by her husband on June 7, 1953.

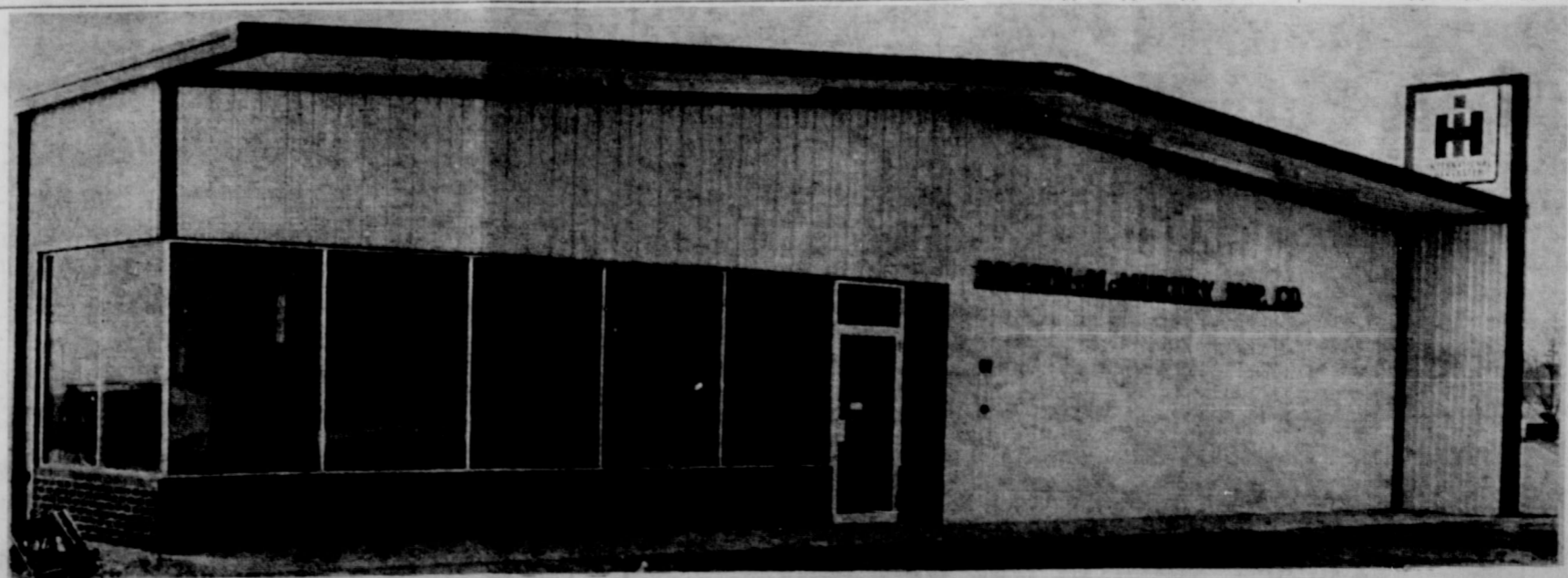

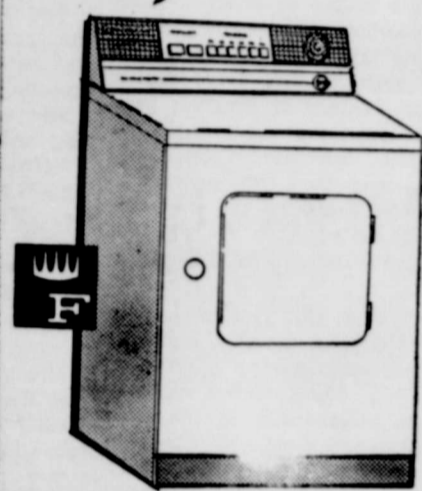
