Regional Meeting Being Held

The measures proposed by President Johnson to eliminate rural poverty are being discussed at a three-day regional meeting of the Farmers Home Administration in Dallas this week, L. J. Cappleman, Texas state director for the federal agricultural credit agency announced today.

Regional Meeting Being Held

At the meeting the federal officials will also discuss steps being taken to help young farmers take over the farms of retiring elders, progress made in developing rural community water systems and the housing assistance given senior citizens in rural areas.

During the past three years under a vastly expanded program the agency has advanced \$2 billion for the strengthening of family farms and rural communities. The \$613 million loaned in the first 10 months of fiscal 1964 was nearly 100 percent greater than the amount loaned during fiscal 1960.

Washington officials attending the meeting will include Howard Bertsch, FHA Administrator, and Division Staff members.

State leaders of the agency participating in the conference are FHA state directors and staff members from Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Arkansas.

The Farmers Home Administration through a network of 1,500 county offices located throughout rural America provides credit assistance in farm and financial management to owners and operators of family farms and aids farmers and rural residents in improving rural housing and other rural community facilities.

The agency's funds supplement the credit provided by other lenders.

State directors and county supervisors of the agency serve as chairmen of RAD technical action panels organized to help rural communities develop their local economies.

During the past three decades the Farmers Home Administration and its predecessor agencies have loaned nearly \$7.4 billion. Approximately \$5.9 billion in principal and interest has been repaid. Interest collections far exceed the amount written off.

Woman Charged With Threatening President Johnson

A plump, thrice-married, gray-haired woman and former mental patient is in custody in Houston, charged with threatening the life of President Johnson.

Mrs. Johnnie Mae Hackworth, 59, an unsuccessful candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor, was arrested last Thursday by Secret Service agents. She was arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Ralph Fowler who ordered her held under \$25,000 bond.

Asst. U. S. Attorney Jerald Mize said the White House had received a letter from Mrs. Hackworth threatening Johnson's life about two weeks before her arrest.

He said agents arrested her at the Houston address on the alleged threatening letter. Although she calls Brenham her home she has lived recently in Houston.

Mize said the woman was arrested by federal authorities twice before—in 1955 and 1960—and charged with writing threatening letters to President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Mrs. Hackworth received only one Briscoe County vote in her bid for nomination as governor.
