We may think ... when one of our neighbors buys a shirt, or a car, or a hot water bottle in the eity ... that it's nothing to us ... unless we happen to be trying to make a living in the shirt, or car, or hot water bottle business here in this community.

But . . . as a matter of fact . . . every time a dollar feaks out of local eirculation, it hurts everybody who lives around here.

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Because . . . financial anemia is a very contagious disease. Trede volume . . . the lifeblood of every community . . . when drained off to invigorate some other place . . . leaves us weaker, our schools and churches poorer, job opportunities fewer, our own businesses less profitable, our property worth less, our living standards lower, and important help and services less convenient to us.

On the other hand . . . Prosperity is also contagious.

Every single dollar that stays here at home turns over again and again as long as it's here . . . to account for two, three, or more times it's value in increased local trade volume . . . to keep every single one of us in better economic health.
