

All Around the Town

A number of copies of the new creation by J. Evetts Haley, "A Texan Looks at Lyndon," have been circulating about town, and for several days I've been trying to think of nice enough language to make a few comments on the subject.

Last week Ben Ezzell, editor and publisher of the Canadian Record, had an editorial in his paper that went right to the point that I have been wanting to make. Ben is a Republican, but not the John Birch type or the extremist type. His thoughts made good reading on almost any subject.

He said: The latest J. Evetts Haley literary effort titled "A Texan Looks at Lyndon . . . a Study in Illegitimate Power," is possibly the most vicious bit of character assassination ever to roll off a press.

To those who know Evetts Haley, or who are familiar with his political career, this should come as no surprise, though it is nevertheless disagreeably shocking to have the nation's President made the target of this kind of slander.

In this masterpiece, Evetts Haley has accused President Lyndon B. Johnson of just about every crime on the books . . . not excepting murder and treason . . . by inference if not openly. He has apparently made use of every shred of gossip, of every rumor and half-truth and criticism ever directed at Lyndon Johnson which can be made to support Haley's case against him. This is not to say that there are not elements of truth in the documentation . . . of course there are. Lyndon Johnson has been a highly successful practitioner of the arts of politics, and his battles have left their scars. But neither is he a monster, or a murderer, or a traitor . . . and Haley would make him all of these.

One paragraph of this alleged documentation will serve to set the pattern for the whole. It concludes a chapter which reviews the old-told tale of Lyndon Johnson's 1948 election and paints him as a co-conspirator with South Texas Political Boss George Parr in a 15-year campaign for power. Here is Haley's conclusion:

"In its iniquity, public sanction of immorality, assassination and illegitimacy may seem a local if not a minor matter. But the malignancy spreads! What a strange coincidence that Lee Harvey Oswald, on his return from Mexico shortly before the Kennedy assassination, detoured from Laredo to stop and spend the night 'in search of a job' at Alice, in Jim Wells County, Texas, before proceeding to Dallas and his world-shocking deed!"

And so the web is woven, and J. Evetts Haley winds up his case against Lyndon Baines Johnson for conspiring with the Duke of Duval to assassinate President John F. Kennedy as the final step in Johnson's drive for power. This is as vicious, as unfounded, and as unjustified a slander as has ever been made against any man.

And this is the substance with which J. Evetts Haley builds his case against the President . . . who, by the nature of his office and the respect in which he holds it, cannot stoop to fight back. Mr. Haley is, in our opinion, beneath contempt.

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Dolph Moten recently made the following comments in The Bovina Blade: Have you noticed how frantically the extremists are digging for skeletons in President Johnson's closet?

With the election coming up in November they're grabbing at straws in attempts to "get something on" LBJ which might influence some unthinking voter against voting for him.

Sad part about all this skeleton-digging is that Lyndon B. Johnson, President, is the same individual who was Lyndon B. Johnson, Senator, and Lyndon B. Johnson, Vice President.

These posts are fairly important in our form of government. But these extremists who are so highly interested in helping America, they say, weren't interested in getting out propaganda on him when he was in one of those "lesser" posts.

They're just after the top man. That's all.

The point is: If a man is no good for public office, he's no good for any public office, not just the top one. Why didn't these people blast Lyndon previously. They

Silverton High School will be integrated this fall, and colored children will ride the buses with the white and Latin American children. Beginning with the 1965-1966 school term, grades one through twelve will be integrated and the Carver Elementary School will be closed.

All students who have not already registered and who have not previously attended the Silverton Schools are to enroll on Friday, August 28. All others in grades one through eight will register Monday morning, August 31. Regular classes will begin on Monday, August 31, and lunch will be served in the new cafeteria.

A student must be six years of age before September 1, 1964, in order to enter school this fall. There will be no general assembly this year because the student body is getting too large to be seated in the school auditorium.

For each community where elections are being held, three regular committee members and two alternates will be elected. The chairman, vice-chairman and regular member of the elected ASC Community Committee will also serve as delegate, alternate delegate and second alternate delegate, respectively, to the county convention where the ASC County Committee will be chosen. Generally, a farm owner, tenant or sharecropper may vote in the community committee election if he is taking part or is eligible to take part in one or more of the programs administered by the ASC committees. decisions may be made promptly to the county and to the State Committees.

It is also highly desirable that nominees be currently active farmers or ranchers who are qualified for community committee work and who will be representative of the various sections and types of agriculture in the community. 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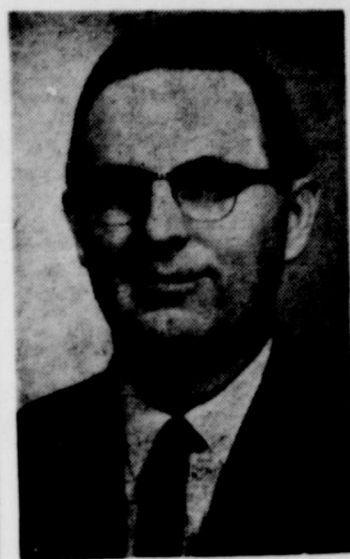
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## Adult Typing Class May Be Offered

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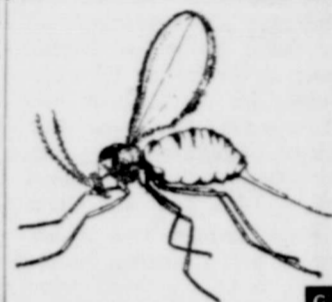
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### SORGHUM MIDGE CONTROL

Any sorghum producer who has suffered through a season of midge infestation is familiar with the stunted spikelets that result. In Texas alone, yield losses resulting from midge damage was estimated at 300 to 500 million pounds in 1963 by the School of Agriculture of Texas Technological College. A typical sorghum field planted to yield 4,500 pounds can lose as much as 1,500 pounds per acre to the midge.



Research work done at Texas A&M University and studies at Texas Technological College have both demonstrated that, when properly used, Diazinon insecticide provides effective control of the sorghum midge without danger of foliar burning of the plant. This work, together with residue data developed by Geigy Agricultural Chemicals, Division of Geigy Chemical Corporation, led to the recent label acceptance by the USDA for the use of Diazinon on sorghum.

Even when applied twice at the maximum recommended rate, Diazinon showed no tendency to "burn" the five most popular varieties of grain sorghum (Northrup-King 120, RS-501, RS-610, Producers Association Grain 665, and Lindsey 788). Because Diazinon does not burn the plant, as some organic phosphorus insecticides do, it can be applied twice with relative safety: first when 90% of the heads have emerged from the boot, followed by a second application four days later. As reported in Progress Report 2206 from the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Texas A&M, an 80% increase in sorghum yield was achieved by using a double treatment with Diazinon.

Another feature of Diazinon is that it can be applied to sorghum up to 14 days before harvest or feeding to livestock.

Diazinon is used on a wide variety of crops, including fruits and vegetables as well as feed and forage crops. It requires no protective equipment or special clothing during application.

For the control of sorghum midge, Diazinon is available in two formulations: Diazinon 50 W, which is 50% wettable powder, and Diazinon AG 500, which is an emulsifiable solution containing four pounds of technical Diazinon per gallon. Application should be made at the rate of 1/2 to 1 pound per acre of Diazinon 50W, or 1/2 to 1 pint of Diazinon AG 500, per acre. Sufficient water should be used to assure thorough and even coverage of all sorghum heads.

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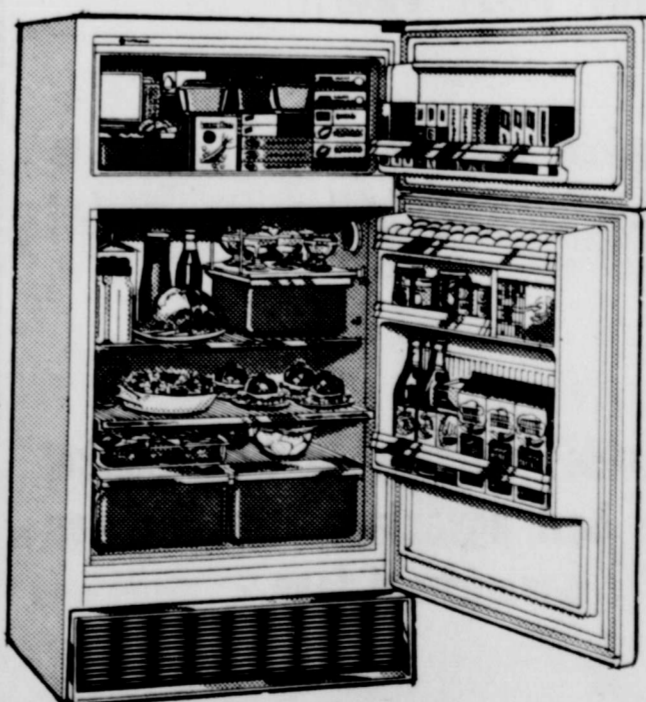

### Permit Signing For Boll Weevil Pushed

"Permits to spray, signed by every farmer with cotton in these seven counties, is a must if the Boll Weevil Control Program is to get underway on schedule." Bill Gunter, Area Extension Agronomist who is serving as Extension coordinator for the program, continued by saying the seven counties where permits must be signed are Motley, Briscoe, Floyd, Dickens, Crosby, Kent and Garza.

For those farmers who haven't attended a permit-signing meeting in their county, several places have been designated where permits can be obtained and signed. These include the local county agricultural agents office and the county ASCS office. In addition, permits can be obtained from the county and community chairmen of the Area-wide Boll Weevil Control Program Committee.

Regardless of where you get the permits, make sure you get one and sign it promptly, says Gunter. The time is fast approaching when the spray program must get started. Cotton farms for which permits have not been signed can-

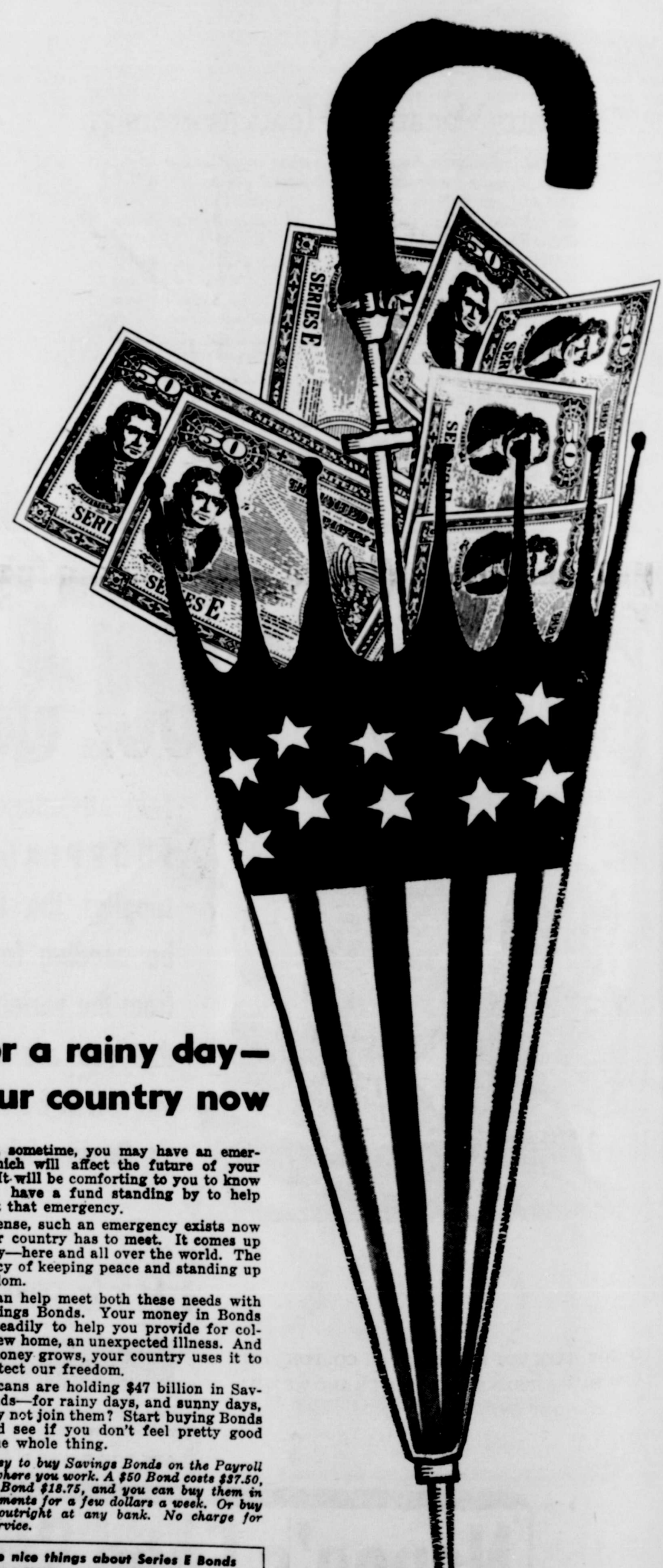

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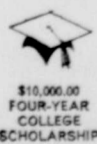

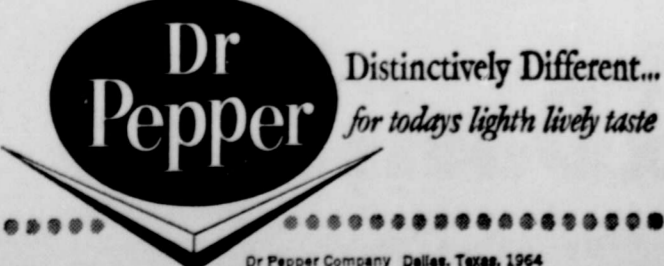
