Dr. William H. Crook, President of San Marcus Baptist Academy, commented: "Our pastors are confronted with the already impossible task of keeping the pews filled. If a man who could conceivably become the President of the United States is for substituting trees for cathedrals, then we are in danger of a continuing and accelerated moral decay . . . I hope and pray that he does not advocate the reduction or abolishment of formal religion as his remarks in Time would indicate.'

Mr. Goldwater has made morality a great campaign issue. From the Congressional Record come the following quotations from a speech by Thomas J. Dodd of Connecticut delivered in the United States Senate September 16, 1964.

"Crime and delinquency are indeed among our gravest domestic problems. They reveal a certain sickness in our society. Thousands and thousands of dedicated men and women have devoted their lives to this problem, in law enforcement, in social work, in the academic world, in mental institutions, in civic and fraternal organizations, in parents' groups, in churches, and in other areas.

"Senator Goldwater and Representative Miller have been conspiculously absent from this struggle, and I hope I speak for all who issue when I say that we are dismayed that they have now taken up this issue purely as a political [50] propaganda sideshow.

At that time, the enumerator will help answer any questions that may have proved







Entomologist Urges Cotton Field Clean-up

Cotton farmers in the Boll Weevil Control Zone should get their cotton stalks shredded and turned under as soon as possible after harvest. Even after the cotton has been harvested, weevils will continue to obtain diapause as long as a few squares and green bolls remain in the field to furnish food, cautions Don Rummel,

Area Extension Entomologist. Fields must be sprayed in the diapause control program as long as there is sufficient growth to furnish food for weevils. By destroying the stalks immediately after harvest, the weevils food supply is cut off. This will reduce the number of weevils able to obtain diapause. Also, this will reduce the number of acres requiring treatment for the remainder of the spray program.

Farmers who are starting to dessicate or defoliate cotton should consider adding a good boll weevil control chemical to the mix, con-





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

Perfect Partner for Steak



Families in the rice producing states (Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, and Texas) like big, thick, juicy steaks just as much as families in other parts of the country. But what they like to eat with their steak may differ from the steak accompaniments served elsewhere.

As you may have guessed, rice is a frequent partner for steak in the southern states which produce most of the rice used in this country. For example, Mushroom-Almond Rice, a favorite recipe from the files of a Texas homemaker, is often served with steak, and with roast beef, too. It is a savory mixture of rice

steak, and with roast beef, too. It is a savory mixture of rice cooked in beef bouillon with onion then mixed with sauteed almonds and mushrooms, and it takes lots less time to prepare


than it does to broil a thick beef steak.

Indeed, families of the men who produce rice in this country like to eat rice in every conceivable way and rice is kept on hand at all times, uncooked and cooked — the latter stored in their refrigerators and home freezers. They know how easy it is to refrigerators and home freezers. They know how easy it is to cook rice and how simple it is to reheat refrigerated and frozen rice. The magic 1-2-1 method of cooking rice, originated in the rice belt, is as follows: Combine 1 cup regular milled white rice, 2 cups water, and 1 teaspoon salt in a saucepan. Heat to boiling, stir once, cover, lower heat. Simmer 14 minutes. Do not peek. To reheat cooked rice, add 2 tablespoons liquid to each cup and cook, covered, for 4 to 5 minutes.

Mushre a Almond Rice

- 1 cup chopped onions 4 tablespoons butter or
- margarine
 1 cup uncooked rice
 2 cups beef bouillon
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper 1/2 cup sliced almonds 1 can (41/2 oz.) sliced

Cook onions in 2 tablespoons butter until tender. Add rice and cooking until golden. Add bouillon and pepper. Stir well. Heat to boiling. Cover pan, reduce heat and simmer 15 minutes or until liquid is absorbed. Saute almonds and mushrooms in remaining butter. When rice is tender, add almonds and mushrooms and toss lightly. Makes 6 servings.
