



Extremely high adult and unemerged weevil populations encountered.					
>	Number 2 (Beginning about October 4)	281,000 acres (Reduction due to acreage desiccated or harvested)	Field checks indicated effective kill of adult weevils but continuing emergence kept new weevil population up. Additional planes brought in to speed up sprayings.					
	Number 3 (Beginning about October 13)	230,000 acres (Continuing harvest and desiccation)	Field examination showed great reduction in number of adult weevils, with low occurrence of weevils in diapause stage. Also fewer unemerged weevils.					
	Number 4 (Beginning about October 21)	190,000 acres	Few unemerged and very young weevils left. Practically no weevils in diapause stage.					

CONCLUSION: Remaining unemerged and young adult weevils will be kept from going into hibernation either by frost or

Entomologists agree that hibernating weevils will have been reduced by more than 90 percent by end of this year's program.







Stuff And Sauce Green Peppers



Fine family fare is this tasty main dish of low-cost high protein developed by the Borden Kitchen. Nonfat dry milk adds to the high quality protein of the meat and cheese ingredients. Stuffed Green Peppers With Cheese Nut Sauce (Makes 6 servings)



healthy family relationships, Dr. Leonard Freeman, noted psychologist, attached special significance to the value of family games.

"Anything that will bring the several members of the family together in a stimulating par-

several members of the family together in a stimulating, participative interest" said Dr. Freeman, "helps preserve family unity."
"One of the causes of our modern day family problems is the divergent interests within the family. These cannot be avoided. In a complex urban society, it is natural for each of us to go his own way a good part of the time."
"But," he continued, "where this divergence and separate-

this divergence and separateness is allowed to become a family way of life, the family eventually loses its cohesive quality. When this happens, the home becomes merely a base of individual operation. A place to eat, a place to sleep, a place of last resort instead of primary concern. In other words, a place rather than a home with its normally beneficial influences." According to Dr. Freeman, the consequences of this breakdown of family oneness are all too often reflected in the revolt of teenagers who are quick to be influenced by companions and conditions outside the home, with deterioration of home discipline to a point of little or no
