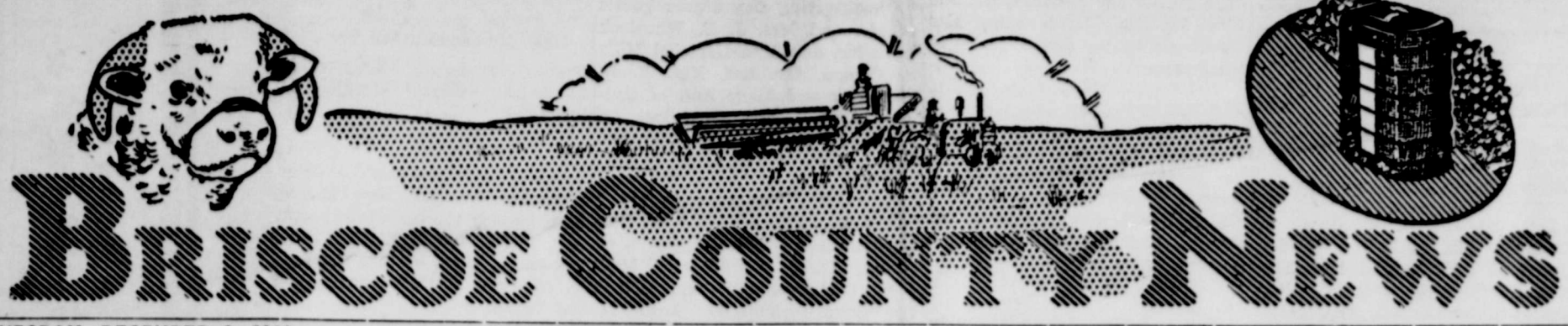

Owlets Undefeated, Owls Drop One

The Silvertown Owls and Owlets continued their winning streak by defeating the Quitaque cagers and the teams from Claude in two double headers here last week. On Tuesday night of this week, the Silvertown and Quitaque teams split two, with the Owlets winning and the Owls tasting defeat for the first time this year.

The Owlets still are undefeated in the regularly scheduled games. **SILVERTOWN vs. CLAUDE**
On November 24, the Silvertown teams hosted Claude. The Owls won their game 58-42, while the Owlets took a 48-32 decision.

Greg Towe led the Owls by netting 23 points, followed by Fred Stafford with 13 and Ike Bruton with 10.
The Owls took a slim lead early in the game and led the Mustangs 11-8 at the end of the first quarter. At halftime, the scoreboard reflected a 24-16 lead by the Owls, and at the close of the third period a ten-point margin separated the two, 41-31.

The Owlets' game with Claude was one of their closest. At the end of the first quarter, the teams were tied, 13-13. At halftime, the Owlets held a slim three-point lead, 20-17. The girls pulled out in front 34-26 by the end of the third period.

Connie Dudley led the scoring for the Owlets by caging 26 points. Martha Mills made 12 points, and Donna Stephens netted 10.

SILVERTOWN vs. QUITAQUE
On November 27, the locals hosted the boys and girls from Quitaque. The Owls took a 67-52 win from the Panthers, while the Owlets earned a 54-42 victory from the Pantherettes.

Greg Towe led the scoring for the Owls with 20 points, closely followed by Rocky Curby with 15. Fred Stafford caged 10, Ike Bruton made 8, Monty Smith got 6, and Larry McWilliams sank 6.

The Owls trailed the Panthers 13-15 at the close of the first period. At halftime everything was all tied up, 27-27. During the third period, the Owls went out in front with an 11 point lead and finished 12 points ahead.

Martha Mills led the Owlet scoring with 30 points. Tena Williams caged 17 points, Connie Dudley got 4 and Donna Stephens made 3.
At the close of the first period, Silvertown led 20 to 8, and at halftime the margin was reduced to a 28-20 lead. At the end of the third quarter of play, the scoreboard read 43-34, and the Owlets finished with a 12-point victory.

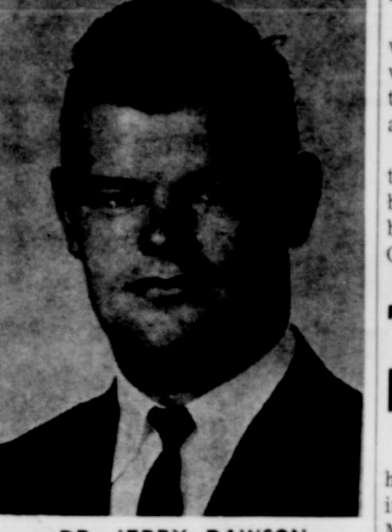

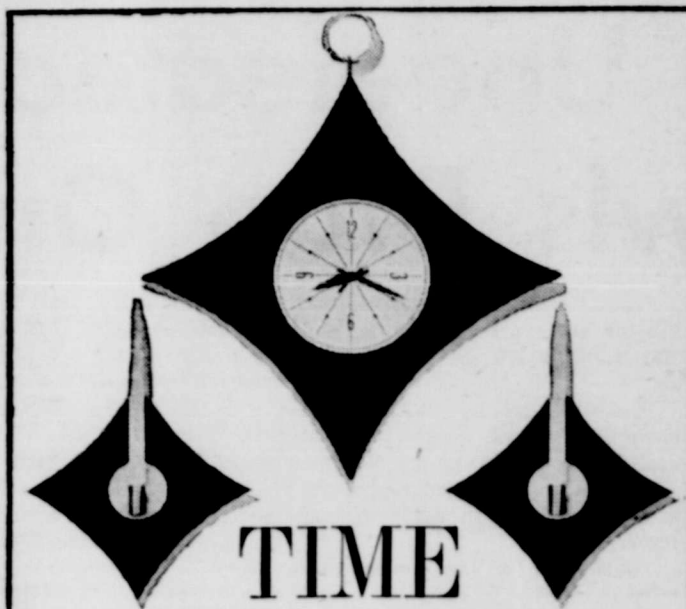

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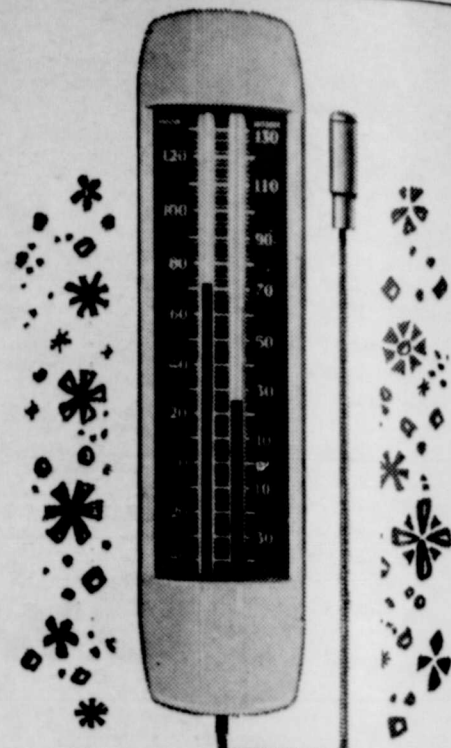

March of Dimes Volunteers Help Parents of Birth Defects Children

Picture a child crippled by a severe birth defect.

A tragedy? Unmistakably.

But how severe are the effects on the parents of this child? What is the extent of their shock and suffering?

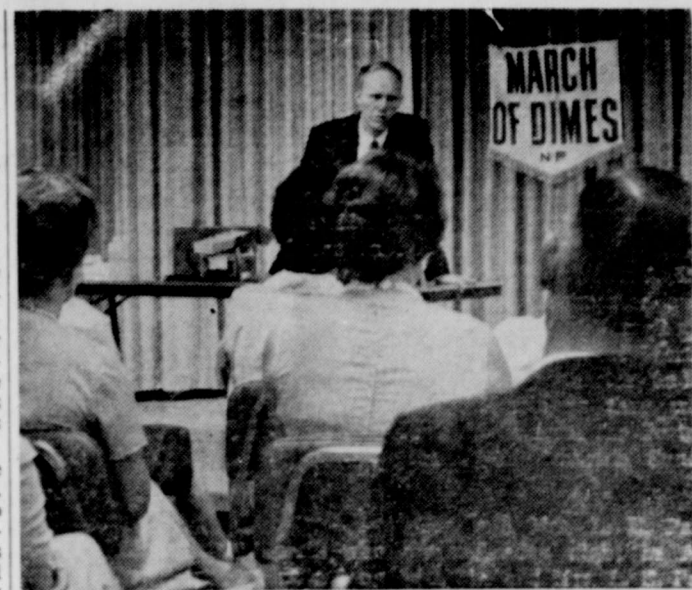
Dr. Hans Zellweger, a well-known professor of pediatrics and genetics at the State University of Iowa College of Medicine and medical director of the March of Dimes-supported Birth Defects Center there, reports that in his experience 80 per cent of the parents of defective babies harbor unwarranted feelings of guilt.

He believes that they, like their afflicted child, need help. For that reason he is about to organize group therapy "classes" in which troubled parents can talk among themselves and with medical experts to discuss the problems created by this family tragedy.

Dr. Zellweger points out that more than a quarter of a million babies are born every year in the United States with birth defects—among them blindness, deafness, missing extremities, imperfect spines and nervous systems, and many other crippling disorders. Feelings of guilt and humiliation in the parents of these children are commonplace and have been for centuries. He explains that unfortunately this sense of shame persists even in the "enlightened" 20th century, although the individual pediatrician today does all he or she can to combat it.

Help Is Expanding
Help for those grief- and guilt-stricken parents is being provided by March of Dimes chapters on a growing scale in several sections of the country.

"Actually, most of these parents aren't in need of medical treatment, but they are in need of some psychiatric help and the opportunity to talk over their problems with others similarly afflicted," according to Dr. Virginia Apgar, director of the division of congenital malformations of The National Foundation-March of Dimes.

"Also, they are in need of a healthy dose of truth about birth defects," she adds. "That truth is that so far as medical science knows, by far the majority of parents of a defective baby have no reason to reproach themselves, or to point the finger of suspicion at the other partner in marriage."

March of Dimes chapters in five Minnesota counties now hold meetings of parents each month to discuss means of ridding themselves of their unjustified feelings of self-reproach. Usually they are also addressed by a pediatrician and are informed about the progress of March of Dimes research grants in birth defects at leading university-affiliated medical centers and laboratories across the nation.

At Houston, Tex., the Harris County Chapter has established a Spina Bifida Educational Association which meets monthly in a seminar room at Texas Children's Hospital. Fifteen to 20 sets of parents attend the

evening lecture, exchange "traumatic" experiences, and discuss such practical problems as getting their handicapped small children into the elementary schools.

Volunteers Well-Informed

Up to 75 parents attend the monthly gatherings of the Child Development Center Parents Group, at Children's Hospital, San Francisco. Half of the necessary financial support comes from the funds of the March of Dimes-financed Birth Defects Center at the hospital.

All the sponsoring chapters find enthusiastic and well-informed volunteers at these meetings on whom to call for help during the March of Dimes campaign each January when funds are raised nationally.

Other March of Dimes chapters around the country are planning similar projects to banish needless feelings of guilt among parents of children with defects.

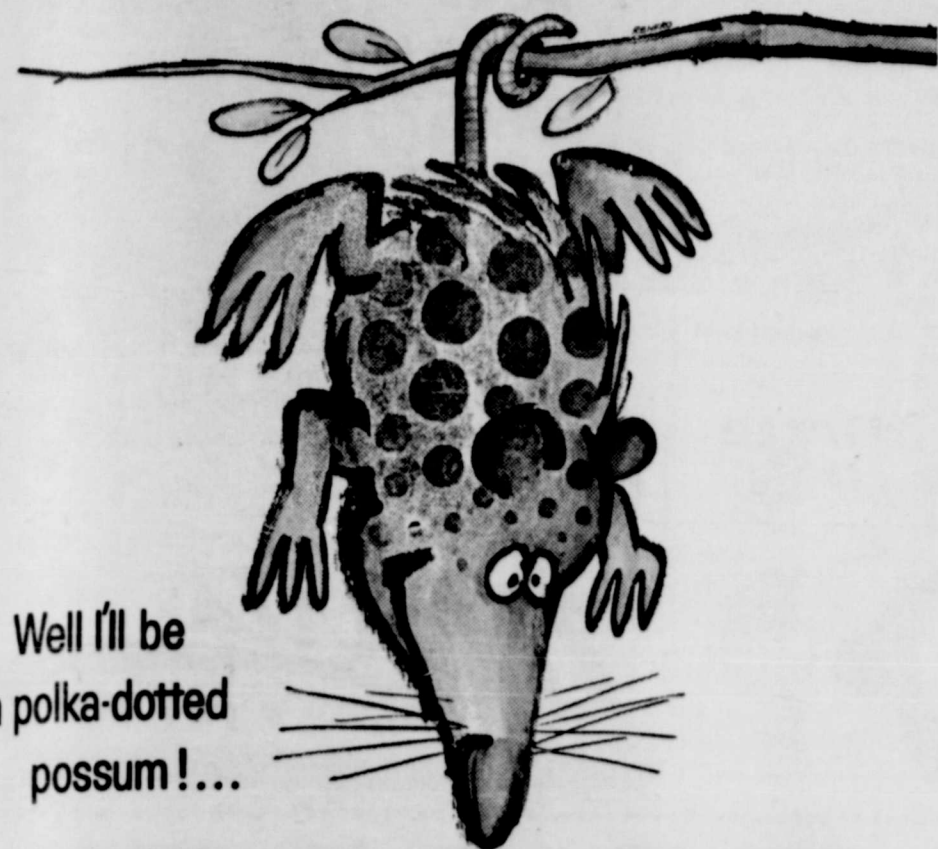

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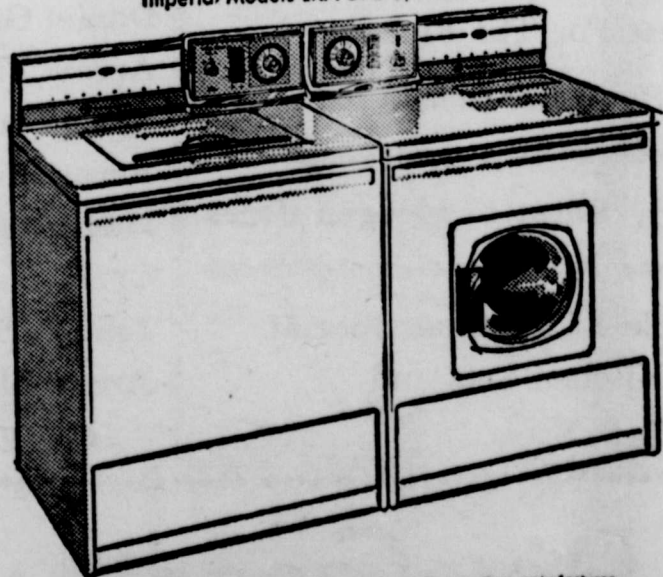

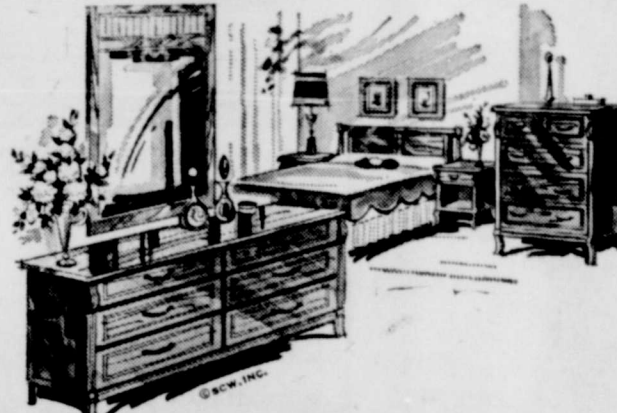

Schools Urged To Curb Smoking Habit

 Alerting children to the dangers of smoking is the school's responsibility and teachers should take steps to help children see these dangers, the American Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation said this month. The AAHPER statement was approved by its Board of Directors and is official association policy.

The policy urges a four-fold approach: awareness by teachers that their smoking sets a poor example, recognition that education about smoking must begin in the preteen years, utilization of the motivational potential of sports to get children to refrain from smoking, and elimination of the practice of schools providing facilities for student smoking.

The policy statement urges "all school personnel who smoke to recognize the inevitability of education by example, and to take appropriate action to provide an image consistent with the facts regarding smoking and health."

The statement also urges "a program of instruction throughout the primary grades emphasizing experiences which will provide children with an opportunity to develop the foundations essential to self-understanding and self-acceptance."

Those responsible for sports programs, the statement says, should use the motivational potential of sports participation "in educating youth to refrain from smoking during those years when the decision to smoke or not to smoke is most likely to be made."

Finally, the statement recommends "that all schools presently providing facilities for smoking re-examine this practice and take appropriate steps to eliminate such facilities."

Assembly News

Rev. Clyde Cain, pastor of the First Baptist Church, spoke to the student body on Wednesday, November 25, using the topic, "Where Are You Going?"

Today, he said, one must get the right start in order to arrive at the right destination. In the complex world of today, people are so busy that they can only see as far as what is taking place now. They are not concerned about reaching the right destination.

Accounts in the Bible tell of instances when God had occasion to ask of Adam, Jonah and Judas the decisive question, "Where are you going?" In each case, the one being questioned was traveling in the wrong direction.

Brother Cain told of the time during which he was pastor of a church in Gatesville. He became well acquainted with the Boys State School located there. In 1960, the school housed 1,375 boys. Some of the boys were eight, nine and ten years of age, but the greater percentage of the boys were between 12 and 16 years old. The school now has more than 1,500. Most of the boys had the same opportunities as boys here in Silverton, but they lacked the desire to travel in the right direction.

He then told the story of two boys who started out with the same opportunities. One committed himself to making a success in life and found himself adhering to God's call. The other, in opposition, did not decide on any special destination. He died in prison as a result of not taking advantage of his opportunities.

Success in life, he said, should be measured by a person's willingness to travel in the direction that God would have him. Brother Cain closed by challenging each student to consider where he is going, as each young person is now in the process of making a decision concerning his destination in life. As you travel the road of life, know where you are going, and be sure that your destination is in accordance with God's will.

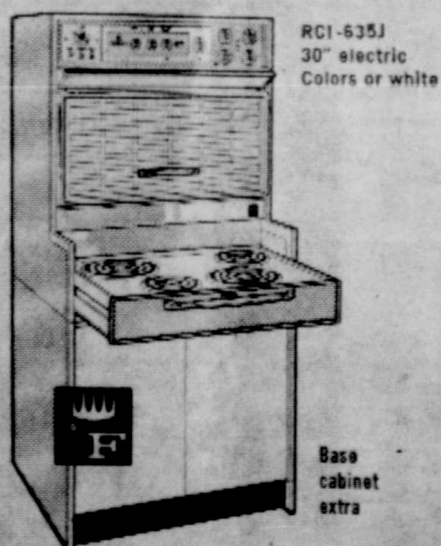
