Did you notice that Service Elevator's name was omitted from the list of Silverton Merchants who purchased 4-H and F.F.A. club animals at the Amarillo Fat Stock Show? I can't honestly say that the omission was intentional, but I'm glad it happened. It gives me the opportunity to call special attention to the service that the elevator manager performs each year.

Glen Lindsey usually represents the Silverton Merchants when it comes time for the club animals to be sold. County Agent Leon Grosdidier showed me his sale sheets, which proved that the Silverton boys and girls consistently sold their animals at a higher per-pound price than the steers and barrows from other areas were bringing. Glen was there to make sure that each Silverton youth got at least 34c a pound for the club animals.

The County Agent added that the auctioneer called special attention to the fact that the Silverton Merchants were united so solidly behind their youth. There was one Amarillo implement dealer at the sale who deliberately out-bid the Silverton Merchants, and afterward explained that he thought it was a fine thing the local people do. He said he kept bidding for the animal he bought because he wanted to help out these who unite behind the 4-H and F.F.A.

The merchants pay the premium price for the club animals and then re-sell them, taking a loss which is equally shared by those participating. This year each of the participating merchants paid about \$13.00 to make sure that the youth of Briscoe County would show a profit for their hours of hard work.

This is an example of the things you don't support when you don't trade at home. It would be much easier for the people of Amarillo to support their youth than it is for the few merchants in Silverton. But they don't. And you'd be surprised to know how many other ways the Silverton Merchants share their profits to make this a better place in which to live.

Let's salute Glen and the others who work so hard for the youth of this county!

Winston Churchill, taking over as Prime Minister of England in 1940, offered "blood, sweat, toil and tears" for his country. Even though his country seemed doomed, Churchill was determined that England should be defended at all costs.

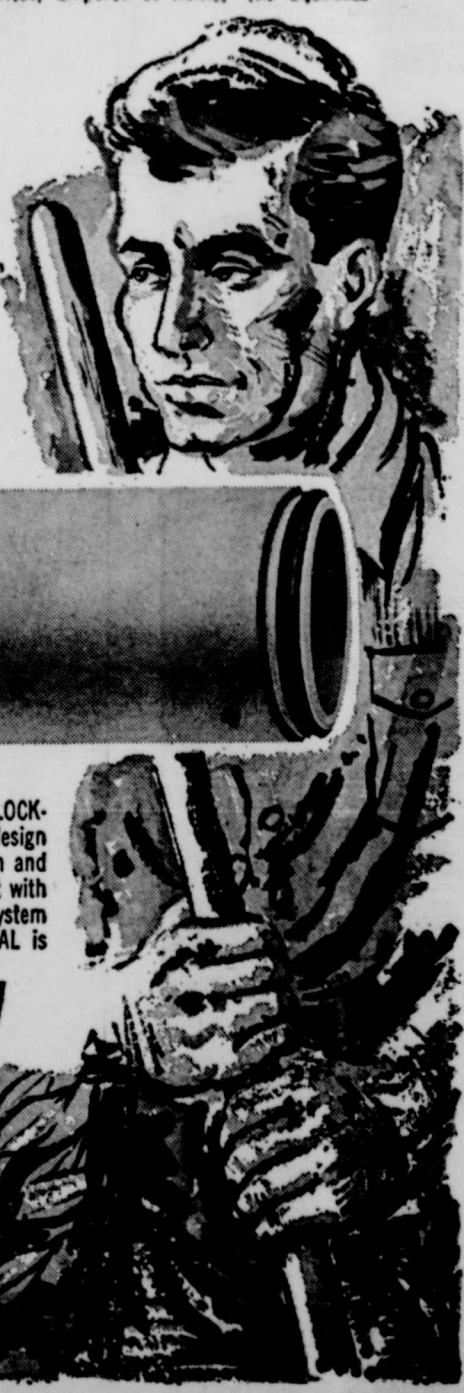
**THIS PIPELINE WAS BUILT
