achievement belongs to Scoutmaster Cletus Grady, who is employed by the Soil Conservation Service in Silverton, and his wife, Geraldine. Mrs. Grady has assisted her husband and the Scouts in almost every way possible. When Mr. Grady became leader

of Troop 262 in September, 1962, all of the boys had their Tenderfoot rank, and had very little experience in camping and cooking. He laughs and recalls that the boys were inexperienced and "we started off about even, as I had very little experience as a leader."

The following months the group spent quite a few weekends camping at Camp Haynes, located east of Silverton, learning the arts of cooking and camping. After spending a week at summer camp and taking a twenty mile hike, the Scouts advanced to Second Class.

While Second Class Scouts, they had to hike ten miles with full pack (always accompanied by the hiking Scoutmaster) to qualify for part of their First Class requirements. They had to learn Morse Code and be able to send and receive twenty words. They had to learn the use of the compass and how to tell direction by the sun and North Star. The boys had to remain First Class Scouts for three months before they could advance to Star.

The boys received their Star rank in May, 1964. To earn this, they had to earn five merit badges and remain in this rank for three months. They earned their Life Scout rank in September, 1964, qualifying for this advancement by earning ten merit badges. The most important of these, in the opinion of the Scoutmaster, was first aid. "We had the good fortune of having a man like Dr. (Neville) Muckleroy to spend his time passing the boys on first aid," said Grady.

After the Scouts received their Life rank, they started working toward the coveted Eagle rank. To attain this they had to have a total of 21 merit badges, which included two from the citizenship group, first aid, safety, firemanship, swimming, life saving, nature, personal fitness, soil and water conservation. The most important phase may have been life saving. They had to pass this under a person who held the senior

life saving certificate of the American Red Cross.

Yater Muckleroy has earned 23 merit badges; Roy L. Long, 23; Gary G. Grady, 29; Paul McWilliams, 21; Cletus G. Grady, jr., 23; Donald D. Weast, 27; Buddy Comer, 24; John Montague, 27; Gary Whitfill, 24; Darrell Long, 25; Mike Long, 23; Randy Pennington, 26; Mitchell McDaniel, 21; Rick Martin, 22; Larry Comer, 29; and Johnny Roy Weaver, 21.

After much hard work to earn these badges (you saw some of the Scouts sitting on the corner under the clock at First State Bank recording traffic violations, though you probably didn't know what they were doing), the day finally arrived for the boys to go before a Board of Review. They traveled to Plainview last Friday, and the boys passed with ease.

Eleven of the boys have also met with a Board of Review for their God and Country awards, and Donald D. Weast, Roy L. Long, Darrell Long, John Montague, Yater Muckleroy, Paul McWilliams, Cletus Grady, jr., Gary Gene Grady, Mike Long, Johnny Roy Weaver and Randy Pennington will receive this award in the near future. The boys have met regular classes under the direction of Rev. Carl Nunn for the past several months to meet the requirements for this award.

The rank to which the 16 Scouts are to advance on April 25 has been made possible by their parents, the citizens of the community and the capable leadership which has been provided. The boys have expressed a desire to publicly thank George Seaney, Jack Strange, Bill Long and the rest of the Silverton Lions Club for making the joys of Scouting available. The Silverton Lions Club has sponsored the Boy Scouts for years, and provides funds which keep the organization active without a continual passing of the hat.

AN ACT providing for the creation of Briscoe Hospital District with boundaries coterminous with those of Briscoe County, pursuant to authority granted by Section 9 of Article IX of the Texas Constitution; providing for elections on the questions of the creation of such District and the levy of a tax not to exceed seventy-five cents (75c) for its maintenance support and the payment of bonds issued by it and the indebtedness assumed; providing for the transfer of hospital facilities and the assumption of indebtedness and assets; providing the District with power to issue bonds, and methods for authorizing same, for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipment, and for the refunding of such bonds; providing that bonds issued by the District shall be lawful investments and security for certain funds; providing a governing body for such District, its powers and duties and the tenure of its members; withdrawing authority for the sale of bonds for hospital purposes by Briscoe County or any city located therein; enacting other provisions incident and germane to the subject and purpose of this Act; providing a severance clause and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1: Pursuant to authority granted by the provisions of Section 9 of Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, Briscoe Hospital District is hereby authorized to be created and as created shall have boundaries coterminous with the boundaries of Briscoe County, Texas, and possess such rights, powers and duties as are hereinafter prescribed.

SECTION 2: Purposes of District. The District herein authorized to be created shall take over and there shall be transferred to it title to all lands, buildings, improvements and equipment in anywise pertaining to the hospital or hospital system owned by Briscoe County and thereafter the district shall provide for the establishment of a hospital system by the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovations of buildings and equipment and equipping the same and the administration thereof for hospital purposes. Such District shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and shall assume the outstanding indebtedness which shall have been incurred by Briscoe County for hospital purposes prior to the creation of said District.

SECTION 3: Creation of District. The district shall not be created nor shall any tax therein be authorized unless and until such creating electors of the District voting at an election called for such purpose. Such election may be initiated by the Commissioners' Court of Briscoe County upon its own motion and shall be called by said Commissioners' Court upon presentation of a petition therefor signed by at least fifty (50) qualified property taxpaying electors of the District. Such election shall be held not less than thirty (30) nor more than sixty (60) days from the time such election is ordered by the Commissioners' Court. The order calling the election shall specify the time and places of holding same, the form of ballot and the presiding judge for each voting place. Notice of election shall be given by publishing a substantial copy of the election order in a newspaper of general circulation in Briscoe County, Texas, once a week for two consecutive weeks, the first publication to appear at least fourteen (14) days prior to the date established for the election. The failure of any such election shall not operate to prohibit the calling and holding of subsequent elections for the same purpose. At said election there shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying electors of Briscoe County the proposition of whether or not Briscoe Hospital District shall be created with authority to levy annual taxes at a rate not to exceed SEVENTY-FIVE CENTS (75c) on the one hundred dollars valuation of taxable property within such District for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the District's bonds, indebtedness assumed by it, and its maintenance and operating expenses and a majority of the qualified property taxpaying electors of the District voting at said election in favor of the proposition shall be sufficient for its adoption. The ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Creation of Briscoe Hospital District providing for the levy of a tax not to exceed 75c on the \$100 valuation using Briscoe County values and Briscoe County tax rolls, and providing for the assumption by such District of all outstanding bonds and indebtedness heretofore issued by Briscoe County for hospital purposes."

"AGAINST the Creation of Briscoe Hospital District providing for the levy of a tax not to exceed 75c on the \$100 valuation using Briscoe County values and Briscoe County tax rolls, and providing for the assumption by such District of all outstanding bonds and indebtedness heretofore issued by Briscoe County for hospital purposes."

SECTION 4: District Management. Within ten days after such election is held the Commissioners' Court of said County shall convene and canvass the returns thereof and in the event such election results favorably to the proposition specified in Section 3 hereof, such District shall be governed by a Board of Directors to consist of five (5) members. Each such

member shall be elected by the qualified electors of the District, and each of the four remaining Directors shall represent a Commissioner's precinct of the County, and each Director must reside in the area he represents. Directors shall be elected to compensation at a rate to be determined by the Board, provided that in no event shall the rate of compensation exceed Ten Dollars (\$10) for each meeting of the Board of Directors. Upon creation of the District as above provided, the Commissioners' Court shall appoint the persons as above provided, to serve until the first Saturday in April of the year succeeding the year of the District's creation, at which time five (5) Directors shall be elected. The three (3) Directors receiving the highest vote at such election shall serve for two (2) years, and the other two Directors shall serve for one (1) year. Thereafter, all Directors shall serve for a period of two years and until their successors have been duly elected or appointed and qualified. All qualified electors residing in Briscoe County, Texas, and in the Briscoe Hospital District shall be eligible to vote for all Directors. Each member of the Board of Directors shall qualify for his office by executing the Constitutional oath of office to be filed in the office of the District. The Board of Directors shall organize by electing one of their number as President, one as Vice President, and one as Secretary. Any three members of the Board shall constitute a quorum and a concurrence of three shall be sufficient in all matters pertaining to the business of the District. The Board shall require the keeping of a true account of all their meetings and proceedings and shall preserve all contracts, records, notices, duplicate vouchers, duplicate receipts and all accounts and records of the District at its principal office where same shall be open to public inspection at all reasonable times. All vacancies in the office of Director shall be filled for the unexpired term by appointment by the remainder of the Board, however in event the number of Directors shall be reduced at any one time to less than three (3) for any reason, the remaining Directors shall immediately call a special election to fill said vacancies and upon failure to do so such vacancies may be filled by appointment of the County Judge of Briscoe County. The regular election of Directors shall be held on the first Saturday in April in each year and notice of such election shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation in Briscoe County one time at least ten (10) days prior to the date of election. Any person desiring to have his name printed on the ballot as a candidate for director shall file a petition signed by not less than five (5) qualified voters to such effect, at least twenty-five (25) days prior to the election.

SECTION 5: Powers of Directors. The Board of Directors shall manage, control and administer the hospitals and hospital system of the District. The District through its Board of Directors shall have the power and authority to sue and be sued and to promulgate rules and regulations for the operation of the District. The Board of Directors may at its discretion appoint a qualified person to be known as the Administrator or Manager of the Hospital District and an Assistant to the Administrator or Assistant Manager. If any, shall serve at the will of the Board and shall receive such compensation as may be fixed by the Board. The Administrator or Manager shall, upon assuming his duties, execute a bond payable to the Hospital District in an amount to be set by the Board of Directors in no event less than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000), conditioned that he shall perform the duties required of him and containing such other conditions as the Board may require. The Administrator or Manager shall supervise all the work and activities of the District and shall have general direction of the affairs of the District subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by the Board. The Board of Directors shall have the authority to employ such doctors, technicians, nurses and other employees of every kind and character as may be deemed necessary for the efficient operation of the District or may provide that the Administrator or Manager shall have the authority to employ such persons. Such Board shall be authorized to contract with any county or incorporated municipality located outside Briscoe County for the care and treatment of the sick, diseased or injured persons of any such county or municipality and shall have the authority to contract with the State of Texas and agencies of the federal government for treatment of sick, diseased or injured persons for whom the State of Texas or the Federal Government are responsible. The Board of Directors is also authorized to enter into such contracts or agreements with the State of Texas or the Federal Government as may be required to establish or continue a retirement program for the benefit of the District employees.

SECTION 6: Fiscal Year - Audit - Accounting. The District shall be operated on a fiscal year commencing on October 1 of each year and ending on September 30 of the succeeding year and it shall cause an audit to be made of the financial condition of said district which shall at all times be open to inspection at the principal office of the District. In addition the Administrator or Manager shall prepare an annual budget for approval by the Board of Directors of said District. As soon as practical after the close of each fiscal year the Administrator or Manager shall prepare for the Board a full sworn statement of all moneys belonging to the District and a full account of the disbursements of same.

SECTION 7: Authorization of Bonds and Levy of Tax. The Board of Directors of the Hospital District shall have the power and authority to issue and sell its bonds in the name and upon the faith and credit of such Hospital District for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of improvements and equipment, the same for hospitals and the hospital system, as determined by the Board, and for any or all of such purposes. At the time of the issuance of any such bonds a tax shall be levied by the Board sufficient to create an interest and sinking fund and to pay the interest on and principal of said bonds as same mature, providing such tax together with any other taxes levied for said District shall not exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) on each one hundred dollars (\$100) valuation of taxable property in any one year. Such bonds shall be executed in the name of the Hospital District and in its behalf by the President of the Board and

the bonds of the District may be issued for the purpose of refunding and paying off any bonds issued or assumed by such District. Such refunding bonds may be sold and the proceeds thereof applied to the payment of outstanding bonds, or may be exchanged in whole or in part for not less than a like principal amount of such outstanding bonds provided that if refunding bonds are to be exchanged for a like amount of said outstanding bonds, such refunding bonds shall bear interest at the same or lower rate than borne by the bonds refunded, unless it is shown mathematically that a saving will result in the total amount of interest to be paid on said refunding bonds; and provided further that if such refunding bonds are to be sold and the proceeds thereof applied to the payment of any such outstanding bonds or other refundable indebtedness same shall be issued and payments made in the manner specified by Article 717k, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, as amended.

SECTION 8: Bonds Exempt from Taxation. In carrying out the purposes of this Act the District will be performing an essential public function and any bonds issued by it and their transfer, shall at all times be free from taxation by the State or any municipality or political subdivision thereof.

SECTION 9: Purchases and Expenditures. The Board of Directors of such District shall have the power to prescribe the method and manner of making purchases and expenditures, by and for such Hospital District, and also shall be authorized to prescribe all accounting and control procedures and to make such rules and regulations as may be required to carry out the provisions of this Act.

SECTION 10: District Depository. The Board of Directors of the District shall name one or more banks within Briscoe County to serve as depository for the funds of the District. All such funds shall, as derived and collected, be immediately deposited with such Depository. Bank or Banks except that sufficient funds shall be remitted to the bank or banks for the payment of principal of and interest on the outstanding bonds of the District or other obligations assumed by it and in time that such money may be received by said bank or banks of payment on or prior to the date of maturity of such principal and interest to be so paid. To the extent that funds in the depository bank or banks are not insured by the federal deposit insurance corporation, they shall be secured in the manner provided by law for security of county funds. Membership on the Board of Directors of an officer or director of a bank shall not disqualify such bank from being designated as depository.

SECTION 11: Bonds Eligible for Investment and to Secure Deposits. All bonds of the District shall be and are hereby declared to be legal and authorized investments of banks, savings banks, trust companies, building and loan associations, savings and loan associations, insurance companies, fiduciaries, trustees, guardians, and sinking funds of cities, towns, villages, counties, school districts, or other political subdivisions of the State of Texas, and for all public funds of the State of Texas or its agencies, including the State Permanent School Fund. Such bonds shall be eligible to secure deposit of public funds of the State of Texas and public funds of cities, towns, villages, counties, school districts or other political subdivisions or corporations of the State of Texas; and such bonds shall be lawful and sufficient security for said deposits to the extent of their value when accompanied by all unmaturing coupons appurtenant thereto.

SECTION 12: Eminent Domain. Briscoe Hospital District created hereunder shall have the right and power of eminent domain for the purpose of acquiring by condemnation any and all property of any kind and character in fee simple, or any lesser interest therein, within the boundaries of the District, necessary or convenient to the powers, rights and privileges conferred by this Act, in the manner provided by General Law with respect to condemnation.

SECTION 13: Levy. Assessment and Collection of Taxes. District taxes shall be assessed and collected in the same manner as provided by law with relation to County taxes. The Tax Assessor and/or Collector of Briscoe County shall be charged and required to accomplish the assessment and collection of all taxes levied by and on behalf of the District and to promptly pay over the same to the District Depository. For his services the County Tax Assessor-Collector shall be allowed such compensation as may be provided for by contract with the District but not to

SECTION 14: Patients: Inquiry as to the Ability to Pay. Liability of Relative. Whenever a patient residing within the District has been admitted to the facilities thereof, the Administrator or Manager shall cause inquiry to be made as to his circumstances and those of the relatives of such patient legally liable for his support. If he finds that such patient or said relatives are able to pay for his care and treatment, in whole or in part, an order shall be made directing such patient, or said relatives, to pay to the Hospital District for the support of such patient a specified sum per week in proportion to their financial ability, but such sum shall not exceed the actual per capita cost of maintenance. The Administrator or Manager shall have power and authority to collect such sums from the estate of the patient or his relatives legally liable for his support in the manner provided by law for the collection of expenses in the last illness of a deceased person. If the Administrator or Manager finds that such patient or said relatives are not able to pay, either in whole or in part, for his care and treatment in such hospital, same shall become a charge upon the Hospital District as to the amount of the inability to pay. Should there be any dispute as to the ability to pay or doubt in the mind of the Administrator or Manager, the Board of Directors shall hear and determine same, after calling witnesses, and shall make such order or orders as may be proper.

SECTION 15: Donations. The Board of Directors of the Hospital District is authorized on behalf of such District to accept donations, gifts and endowments to be held in trust and administered by the Board of Directors for such purposes and under such directions, limitations and provisions as may be prescribed in writing by the donor, not inconsistent with proper management and object of the Hospital District.

SECTION 16: Annual Budget. The Board of Directors of said Hospital District shall cause to be prepared an annual budget based upon the fiscal year of the Hospital District in accordance with the provisions of Section 5 hereof and prior to September 1st of each year shall give notice of the public hearing on the proposed budget. Such notice shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the County at least ten (10) days prior to the date set for the hearing.

SECTION 17: District Alone to Incur Indebtedness for Hospital Purposes. After creation of Briscoe Hospital District neither Briscoe County, Texas, nor any City or Town therein shall thereafter issue bonds or other evidences of indebtedness or levy taxes for hospital purposes for medical treatment of indigent persons and the said Briscoe Hospital District shall assume full responsibility for the operation of all hospital facilities for the furnishings of medical and hospital care of indigent persons.

SECTION 18: State Not to Be Obligated. The support and maintenance of the Briscoe Hospital District shall never become a charge against or obligation of the State of Texas, nor shall any direct appropriation be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of any of the facilities of such District.

SECTION 19: Severability Clause. If any of the provisions of this Act or the application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the Act which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Act are declared to be severable.

SECTION 20: Publication of Notice. Proof of Publication of the notice required in the enactment hereof under the provisions of Section 9 of Article IX of the Texas Constitution has been made in the manner and form provided by law pertaining to the enactment of local and special laws and such notice is hereby found and declared proper and sufficient to satisfy such requirement.

SECTION 21: Emergency Clause. The fact that there is urgent need to provide for the creation of the Hospital District for Briscoe County, authorized by Section 9 of Article IX of the Texas Constitution, creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the Constitutional rule requiring bills to be read on three several days shall be suspended, and said rule is hereby suspended and that this Act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.

All interested citizens of Briscoe County are invited to attend a public meeting on Monday, April 5, at 7:30 p.m. in the Silverton School auditorium for the purpose of discussing a proposed bill which would request the permission of the State Legislature to hold a Hospital District Election in Briscoe County.

Drive To Raise Funds For Eradication

The Briscoe County Screwworm Eradication Committee is making plans for the county's participation in a concentrated drive to raise \$300,000 from the Texas Livestock industry for the Screwworm Eradication Program.

"The goal for our county is \$1,440," according to Ben Whitfill, chairman of the local committee. He pointed out this goal can be attained if every farmer and rancher will contribute on the basis of 10 cents per animal unit. An animal unit consists of one beef or dairy animal, or one horse, or five sheep, goats or hogs.

The fund drive is now on and will conclude Monday, April 12. Livestock producers can leave their contributions at the First National Bank in Quitaque and at the First State Bank in Silverton. The program needs approximately \$1.1 million to operate through April, May and June. The Texas Legislature has al-

ready voted \$250,000 and Congress is expected to appropriate \$550,000 for the three-month period. These government funds cannot be spent, however, unless producer money is also made available.

The screwworm fly has been eradicated from the Southwest, but a barrier of live, sterile flies must be maintained along the U. S. - Mexico border to prevent fertile flies from Mexico reinfesting the U. S. If funds are not made available, the Southwest stands to lose the gains that have already been made.

Leon Grosdidier, County Agricultural Agent, said in the three years the program has been in existence, savings of more than \$168 million have been realized by producers. One case of screwworm infestation was detected in this county last year.

Congress is considering a U. S. D. A. request for \$5 million which would make the program financed entirely by the Federal Government beginning July 1.

Boll Weevil Fight Continuing in County

An important meeting of Briscoe County cotton producers has been scheduled for April 12, according to Leon Grosdidier, County Agricultural Agent. The meeting will be held at the Bank Community Room at 7:30 p.m.

The purpose of the meeting is to explain in detail the results of the 1964 diapause boll weevil control program and to offer specific control recommendations for this season, said Grosdidier.

The spray program last fall has been declared an unqualified success by program officials. Extensive field checks and winter trash surveys have shown a 90 percent reduction of overwintered boll weevils. However, it is extremely important that producers follow recommended cultural and chemical control practices during the growing season to insure the continued success of the program. Don R. Rummell, Area Extension Entomologist from Lubbock,

will discuss the diapause control program and present new recommendations at the meeting. A representative of Plains Cotton Growers will also be on the program. This control program offers Briscoe County cotton producers a chance to obtain excellent weevil control at a very low cost, said Grosdidier. All cotton producers and businessmen are invited to attend the meeting.

tional Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Economics at Texas A & M University will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A & M University.

Mr. Anderson holds two college degrees in Agricultural Economics, a B.S. degree from Texas A&M and an M.S. degree from L.S.U. In addition to college work and research work in farm management, Mr. Anderson has had several years of on-the-farm experience.

During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Anderson will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction.

What is wrong for someone else is just as wrong for you, however. If it wasn't, the crime rate would climb rapidly in a nextremely short time.

Whose responsibility is it to obey the laws? Naturally, it is the responsibility of each and every citizen. If you do not wish to suffer punishment, do not violate the laws. Do not be like the fellow who argued that he should not have to pay a fine for speeding on the grounds that other people violated the speed limit and were not fined. The ones who speed and are not caught may pay with their lives if they do not reform. If a fine will make you obey the speed laws, then it has achieved its purpose.

Remember that the laws are there only for your benefit. They are to protect you and your family from your worst enemy—you.

When New Year's Day was changed to January 1, some people still celebrated it April 1. These people came to be known as April fools. The custom of fooling friends and relatives on that day became popular in France, and spread to other countries. It was widespread in England by the 1600's. In France, the victim is called an April fish. In Scotland, he is called an April gowk.

In Portugal, Mexico and India the people observe All Fool's Day on the Sunday and Monday before Lent.

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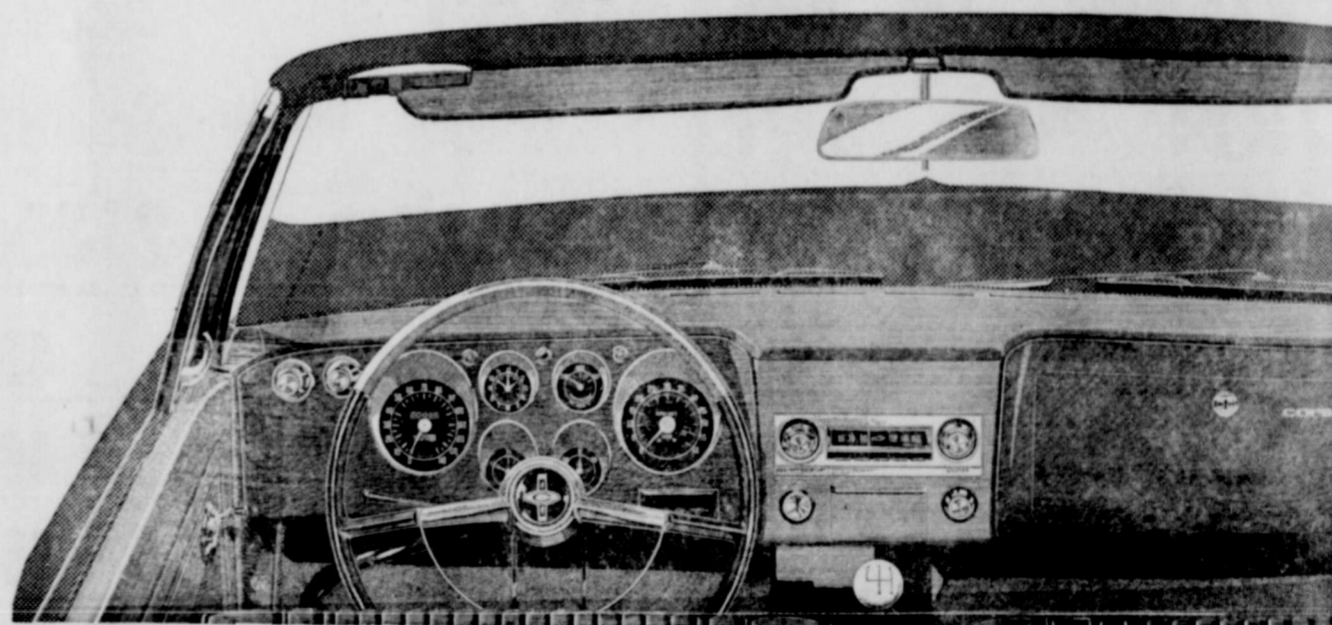
