

Lights . . . camera . . . action!

Every morning, students at Watson Junior High School see familiar faces when they tune into the news.

That's because the five-minute newscast is done by fellow WJHS students.

It's five minutes a day that will last a lifetime for those students, according to their teacher, Tom Boutell.

"A lot of these kids were the ones who sat in the back of the room, or were viewed as trouble-makers. Kids not really performing up to their potential," said Boutell, who admitted a lot of the students were in danger of falling through the cracks and getting lost in the system. "Now, the teachers see these kids knocking their socks off with reports and stories on TV. Teachers are seeing kids in a whole different light.

"And they're starting to do better in other classes because they have a self worth. Parents are telling me all of a sudden they're interested in things they were never interested in before. Now they can't wait to come to school."

The newscasts, which originate from a rudimentary set in the library, are broadcast through TV monitors in each classroom.

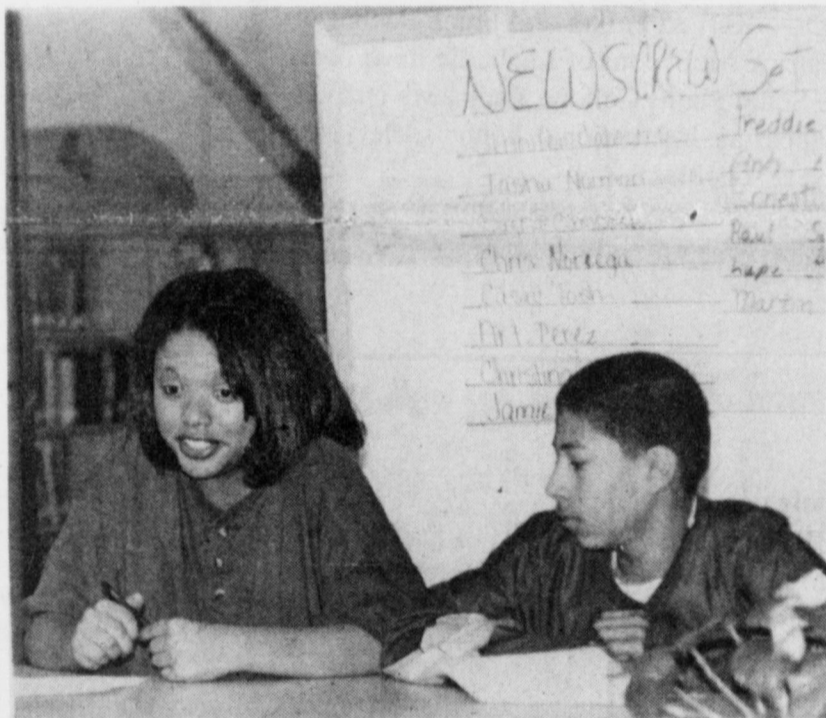
The content includes school, local and national news, editorial skits and interviews.

Students are broken up into three crews — a set crew, a camera and equipment crew, and a news crew.

Jennifer Castorena was a painfully shy, introverted seventh-grader when she started in the program that is part of Boutell's seventh- and eighth-grade English classes. Now she is a news director and one of the driving forces in the newscasts.

Monday, Jennifer was taking control, going over the day's newscast while barking out orders. It was more like a poodle bark than a

MISD changes graduation requirements

Several Boy Scouts working on communications badges were among the special guests attending the Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees meeting Monday night.

Scout Master Terry Hutto and his assistant Bruce Purdy brought the Boy Scouts to observe the communication skills of the Trustees during their meeting.

Muleshoe Mayor Robert Montgomery was at the board meeting to proclaim February as school board appreciation month.

Montgomery urged citizens to recognize the dedication and hard work of local board members, who work with parents, educational professionals and community members to create "the educational vision we want for our students."

MISD Superintendent Bill Moore presented each board member with a framed certificate of appreciation.

The Board recognized Clifton Finley as an "exemplary volunteer" for helping students with reading, art and library skills at least two days each week at DeShazo Elementary School, where his late wife, Owetha Finley, was a third grade teacher.

Items discussed by the Board included graduation policy and the reaction to the recent District 1-3A alignment.

The Muleshoe High School site-based decision making committee recommended that only four-year graduates who have taken a rigorous four-year program at Muleshoe or another high school be eligible for the valedictorian and salutatorian positions.

The Trustees concurred that three-year graduates should not be considered for valedictory or salutatory honors, as the state already rewards early graduates with scholarship money. But the Board members had concerns about eliminating students who move in during their ninth or tenth grade years.

Odyssey of Mind teams fare well in Lubbock

Teams from Watson Junior High School and DeShazo Elementary School in Muleshoe competed in the regional Odyssey of the Mind tournament Feb. 17 at Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

One of the DeShazo teams won a gold medal and will be competing in the state competition. DeShazo also brought home two fourth places and a ninth place. Two WJHS teams placed second, and the other placed third.

Dillman Elementary School also sent a team to participate in the event.

Odyssey of the Mind (OM) is an organization that promotes divergent thinking in students from kindergarten through college. Teams work on long term and spontaneous problems, as well as style.

Watson Junior High School's team placed second in the Crunch! problem competition, in which teams designed and built a balsa wood structure within specifications to hold as much weight as possible.

The Crunch! team also was

awarded an Outstanding OMER award for teamwork during the spontaneous portion of the competition.

Crunch! team members included Brandon Broyles, Christie Adrian, Matthew Lopez, Nikki Felan, Jessica Carpenter and Bobby Guerrero. Team coaches were Helen Adrian, Julie Broyles and Curtis Carpenter.

The Great Impressions team, which also placed second, presented an original performance based on a French Impressionistic painting and a classic poem. The team also had to create an original poem and a work of art.

Great Impressions team members included Ryan Hodge, Rendi Hodge, Janna Skaggs, James Hancock, Chris Vaughn, Yvette Villa and Joe Adair, coached by Lanelle Skaggs, Rhonda Eagle and Pam Hancock.

Teams in the Tall Tales of John Jivery competition wrote and performed an original tall tale. The WJHS team placed

third and received an award for outstanding creative merit.

This team consisted of Michael Dan Lopez, Chris Hall, Luis Pacheco, Laura Wood, Megan Barrett, Candace Hutto and Brandon Mount, with coaches Cindy Barrett, Linda Wood and Anne Mount.

This was the first year for Muleshoe to send teams to the Division II level of Odyssey of the Mind. The junior high teams competed against teams from Lubbock, Post, San Angelo, Odessa, Crosbyton, Levelland and Sundown.

DeShazo Elementary took four teams to the OM tournament. Each team worked about four months preparing, then competed with teams from Levelland, Sundown, Midland, Odessa and many teams from Lubbock.

DeShazo students competed in the same events as the junior high school, plus the fourth-place-winning Amusin' Cruisin' team, which designed, built and drove a vehicle which had to accomplish several tasks.

The City is aware that there are many householders from outside the City limits who bring their garbage to town and use City dumpsters.

In order for these householders or other rural residents to bring their trash to town but not be in violation of the City ordinance, the City will allow these rural users to sign up for dumpster service.

The monthly fee will be \$12.50 per month plus tax, and a dumpster will be assigned for these rural subscribers of the City service.

Texas Veterans Land Board offers forfeited state land for veterans' bids

AUSTIN — A catalogue listing 511 tracts of forfeited state land reserved exclusively for bids from Texas veterans is now available from the Texas Veterans Land Board (VLB).

The catalogue, containing bidding instructions and a detailed description of each tract, can be ordered by calling (800) 252-VETS.

Bids will be opened April 23 at 1 p.m. The sale will be by sealed bid only, with a minimum bid set by the board. Bidders need not be present at the opening.

Texas veterans will receive a 7.64 percent interest rate with a 30-year assumable fixed-rate loan. A \$25 non-refundable fee for each bid is required.

There are tracts in 27 counties, including one in Bailey County. The tracts range in size from five to 200 acres. County maps showing locations of properties also are available by calling the number given above.

The Board also discussed the site-based decision making committee's recommendation that the district not issue certificates of completion for students who have completed all graduation requirements except for passing the required EXIT tests.

The Trustees agreed that to participate in the graduation ceremony and receive a diploma, a Muleshoe student must be a "full graduate," meaning that a student must complete credit requirements (25 or 26 credits) as well as passing all parts of the TAAS and Exit exams.

Regarding the UIL realign-

ment process, athletic directors of the new 1-3A district have met to discuss playing arrangements to reduce travel time and loss of school time.

Their discussion has centered around the use of zoning for junior high sports, with the four schools on the south end and the four schools on the north end playing each other.

Saturday playing dates will be arranged between schools with the longest travel time, and Tuesday night basketball games will be held at the closest schools, with long basketball trips to be held on Fridays or Saturdays.

The Trustees asked that the

district immediately communicate with the UIL its desire to be moved from this alignment at the first opportunity (in two years).

Following a closed session for the discussion of personnel issues, Trustees approved the one-year extension of the contracts of all administrators.

Trustees voted to accept the resignation of Venida Collins, MISD director of special education, effective April 5.

Collins, who has accepted a position with the Texas Education Agency, will be working as a leadership specialist with Region 12 Education Service Center in Waco.

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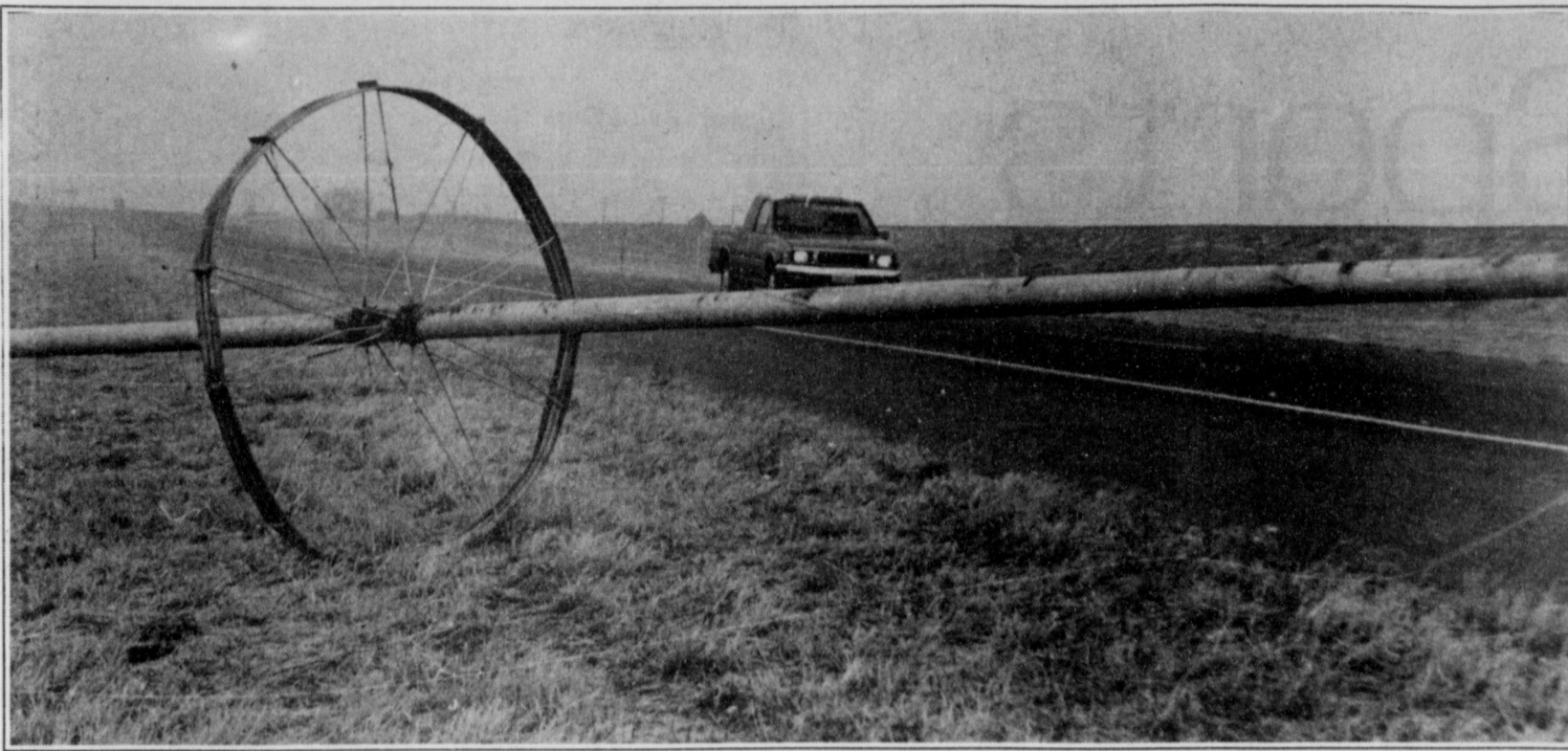

Muleshoe development group continues progress

Muleshoe Area Industrial Foundation (MAIF) held its annual meeting Thursday at the United Methodist fellowship hall in Muleshoe, with Leal's Restaurant providing a fajita dinner.

Chairman David Marricle called the meeting to order, and Phil Kent gave the invocation.

Dr. Tom Bonds welcomed guests, including Muleshoe Mayor Robert and Sharon Montgomery, Muleplex president Chuck Smith, Adreanne Ashford and Amanda Messenger.

Bonds also recognized the following, who are also members of the Foundation: Chamber of Commerce president J.B. Douglas, MISD Superintendent Bill Moore, City

Councilman Rex Harris and Rotary Club President Mike McDearmon.

Dr. Robert Lepard gave the treasurer's report and announced nominations for directors.

Marricle said the Foundation had prepared major proposals to six prospective companies and had made contact with 21 other prospects during the year.

"Even though there have been no takers yet, we need to continue efforts to attract new businesses," Marricle said. "It takes the support of all the members of the Foundation."

The Foundation completed its goal of increasing the membership by 10 new members, with 49 members.

Its two other goals for the

year were to hire a person both to work with economic development and to manage the Chamber of Commerce, and to complete an informational pamphlet on the Muleshoe area to send out to prospective businesses.

After Marricle's state of the Foundation report, Susan Roberts of the Economic Assistance Division of the Comptroller of Public Accounts spoke about the services available through the regional office in Lubbock.

The comptrollers office is involved with the half-cent sales tax for economic development efforts and will provide free geographic and demographic information.

Roberts has access to more than 1,400 grants, and will

recommend grants to apply for, as well as information on restrictions of a particular grant, the dollar amounts of grants, and when and where to apply.

Roberts discussed the Lone Star Card program that State Comptroller John Sharp introduced to take the place of food stamps in order to cut costs.

She also discussed the Texas Tomorrow Fund, a program to pre-pay college tuitions at today's costs to help cut the cost of a college education.

Hubert Kidd presented awards to outgoing directors

Rounding out the team were Littlefield senior Emily Hutchins and Floydada freshman Victoria Cummings.

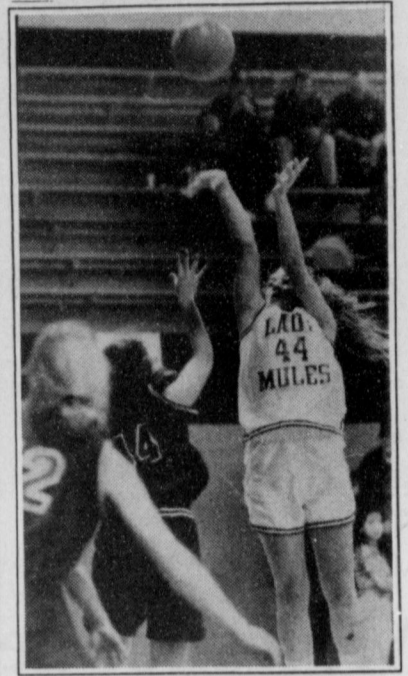
Muleshoe senior Michelle Williams was named honorable mention. Williams averaged 4.9 points and 4 rebounds in district play.

Showing he belonged from his first game, Muleshoe freshman Dustin Cleavinger was named to the All-District 2-3A boys basketball team.

District champion Dimmitt took home the league's two top honors. Senior guard Joe Larra was named player of the year and Alan Steinle was named coach of the year by league coaches.

Cleavinger, called up four games before the district season, averaged team-highs of 14.6 points and 7.1 rebounds a game for the Mules (5-23 overall, 1-9 in district). The 6-4 post upped those averages to 14.8 and 7.4 rebounds in district. He shot 50.6 percent from the field, 57.7 from two-point range.

Dimmitt had three players selected to the 10-man team. Joining Larra were a pair of 6-1 senior posts, Justin Newman and Chad Ellis.

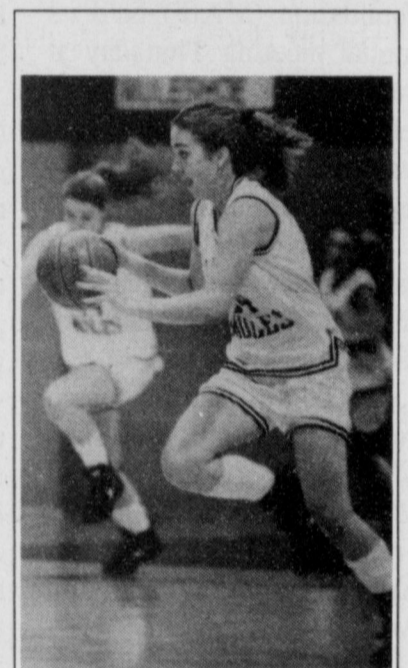

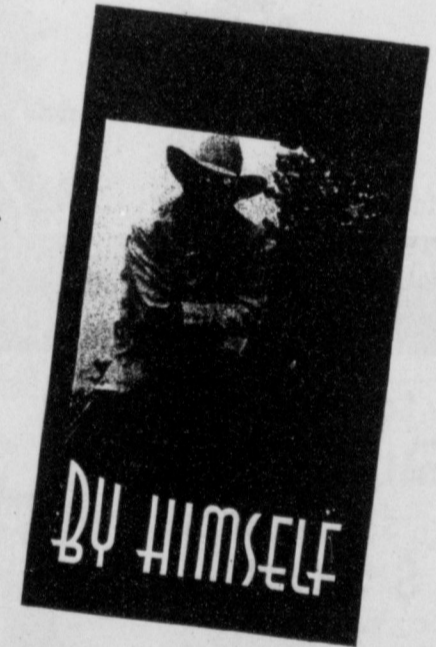
I found great comfort as I stepped out on the dark curb to unlock my business to have one of our very own city policemen to shine his spotlight from Main Street towards me until I was safely inside.

of 1812 as a Lieutenant. He wrote a lengthy account from the battlefield April 22, 1836, which was later published. This is the only eye-witness account of the Battle of San Jacinto on record in the United States Archives.

Ruby Green, Jennyslipper president, will introduce her mother, Callie Smith, a Bailey County pioneer, age 98. Ms. Smith was 22 when women got the right to vote. She will tell us of the early days.

"We're getting better every day and learning from our mistakes," Jennifer said. "At first, nobody wanted to volunteer. It was so boring. We're trying to make it more fun."

Seventh-grader Daena Campolla, a member of the camera crew, remembers those first broadcasts.

"We were nervous," Daena said. "Those were pretty hard times because we didn't know what we were doing. Now it's easier because we know what we're doing. Back then, we couldn't wait for (the newscasts) to get over."

Now the students are bouncing off the walls with excitement, looking for new challenges every day.

"If it's a good show, they know it," Boutell said. "If not, they know what to do to correct it. That's where they've come a long way. They're taking full responsibility."

For seventh-grader Chris Noriega, it's been a way for him to channel his considerable energy in a positive way. Noriega, who doesn't have a shy bone in his body, is one of the top newscasters.

Boutell said his report on the school's Roman Festival

was his crowning moment.

"He went out and lined up the interviews," said Boutell, who was particularly impressed with the way he controlled the interview with WJHS teacher Neva Gray, the organizer of the festival.

At first, newscasts consisted of little more than pre-recorded monotone readings of announcements of school news.

Now the newscasts are live, and fast-paced, with on-camera reporters adding personality and insight into their newscasts. Recently, they started writing their own stories, adapting local and national news that relates to the school. They are graded on spelling, punctuation and grammar.

They're also working on two half-hour documentaries about school-related problems, one each by the seventh- and eighth-graders.

The junior-high news-makers have even become the news, being featured on KMACTV-28 out of Lubbock in January.

"I stumbled into this," said Boutell, who started the program three years ago after getting the ideal from Channel 1, a national student news program. "We're getting so many benefits from it we never envisioned."

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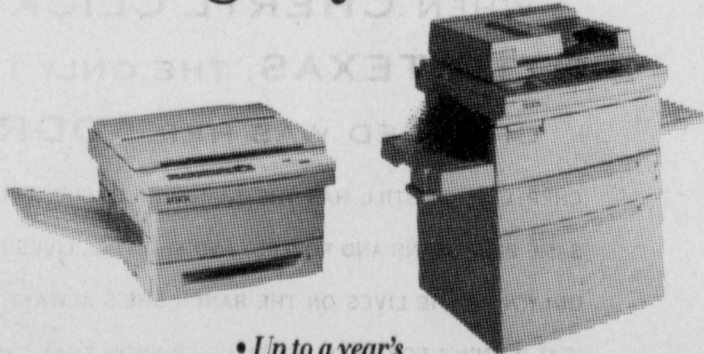
