Rains Send Water Flooding Down Tule

Heavy rains in the Happy, Tulla and southwest of Tulla areas sent a flood of water roaring down Tule Canyon last week. Rains in the Happy area put Tule Lake over the spillway and washed out one dam on a Tule Creek tributary. Flood waters in the area southwest of Tulla not only washed out a bridge but also fences, and fence posts, large trees and other debris were seen in large numbers passing down Tule Creek at the point of the proposed Mackenzie dam.

The floodwater crested at 11½ feet at the Mackenzie damsite at about 8:30 a.m. Friday. The waters had been gauged at more than 10 feet since 6:00 a.m., and continued at more than 10 feet after 9:00 a.m. Indications were that the flood waters may have reached a new high Saturday night or early Sunday, when the Middle Tule was swollen far out of its banks. Water was over the highway between Tulla and Silverton in several places, but only about half an inch of precipitation was measured in Silverton.

More than three inches of rainfall has been measured in Silverton since the first of June, in addition to .81 of an inch of moisture from a hailstorm late in May.

Oldtimers recall that the Tule Creek has been known to lap the bridge on FM 294, but some who have made this area their home for many years stood on the bridge Friday morning and mused that it had been some time since the creek had been so high.

A Department of the Interior engineer was on the scene measuring the flow of water and calculating the number of feet of water per minute that was going past.

One local resident commented that "if the Mackenzie dam was already built, it would be nearly full today." Even though several dry years have been seen, it is not practical to say that "it won't rain again like it used to." Never is a long, long time, and the rains do return.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:
 "Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members."
 "Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible."
 "Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."
 "This Amendment shall be-

come effective upon its adoption."
 Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:
 "FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."
 "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."
 Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Crop Residue Should Be Listed As Asset

Wheat crop residue should be considered an asset rather than a liability, according to Briscoe County Agent Leon Grosdidier.

The advantages of leaving wheat residue on the soil is in maintenance or improvement of soil structure. This is reflected in better water intake rate, less runoff after rain and better soil tilth.

Under irrigated conditions figure on having about 180 pounds of residue for every bushel of wheat produced. A 40-bushel crop will produce about 3½ tons of straw.

According to Jim Valentine, Extension Soil Chemist at Lubbock, 3½ tons of straw contains about 47 pounds of nitrogen, 12 pounds of phosphorous and 82 pounds of potash.

With good management these elements contribute to the nutritional requirements of the next crop.

Valentine also mentioned these ideas on residue management:

1. Leave part of the residue on the surface.
2. Decomposition of residue by soil micro-organisms is influenced by available nitrogen, temperature and moisture. Nitrogen should be worked into the soil, at least partially, for best effect.
3. Surface applied nitrogen on exposed residue cannot be expected to speed up the process and a portion can be lost to the atmosphere.
4. Decomposition slows down as soil temperatures drop. It proceeds fastest when temperature is ideal for plant growth.

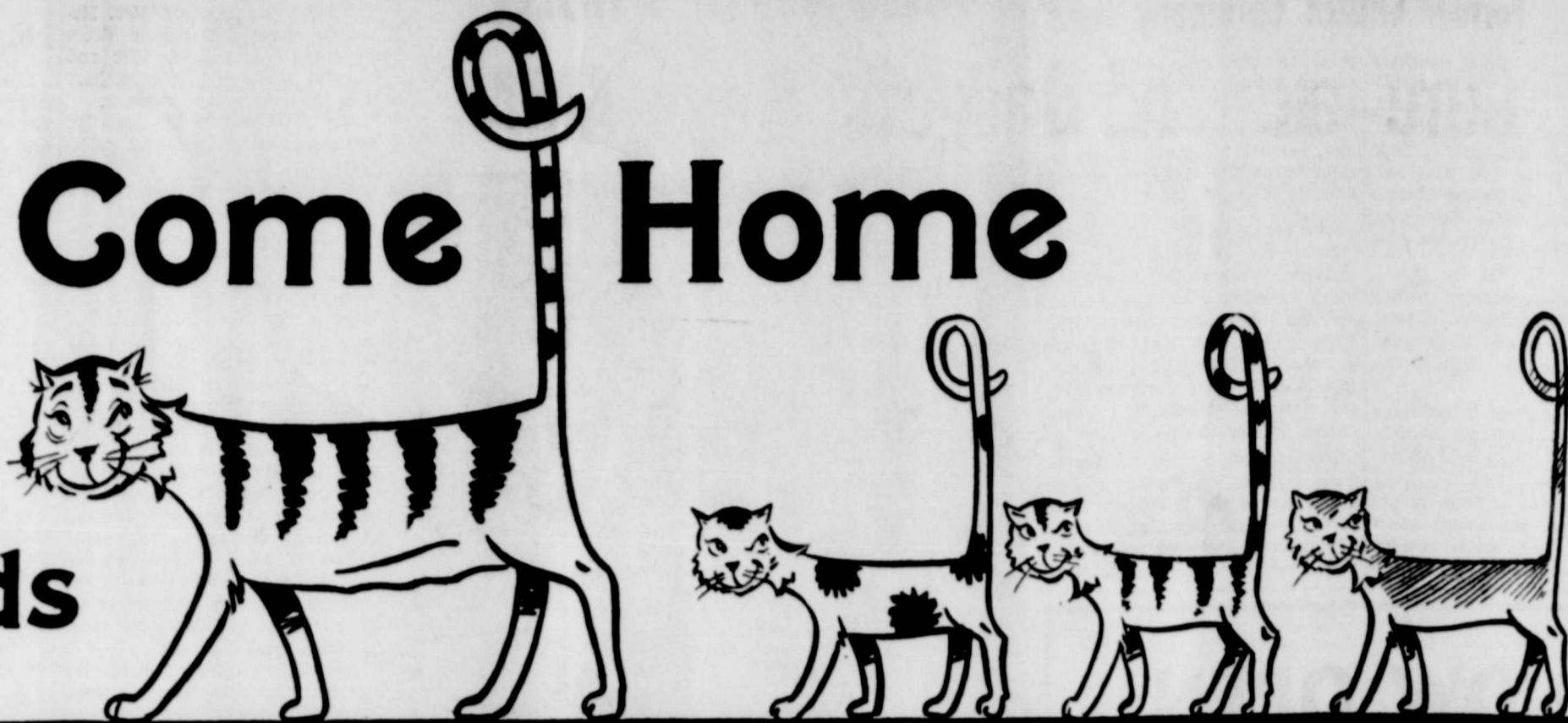

Quacks Extort Millions With Phony Cure-alls and Gadgets, Says AMA

Today there are thousands of quacks promising quick cures for every disease known. They extort millions of dollars annually from their gullible patients. Yet, the quack's promises, cure-alls and gadgets are as phony as a fixed gambling wheel or a "con man's" schemes, said F. J. L. Blasingame, M.D., executive vice president of the American Medical Association. "Healthy people usually laugh at anything that offers a quick cure. Indeed, almost anyone can be fooled unless he knows how quacks operate."

Machines can be a blessing or a curse to medicine. In the hands of a skilled physician, certain machines are useful in arriving at a diagnosis or charting a method of treatment.

But some machines are a threat to your health. Any quack who passes off his device or gadget or "system" as a cure-all is cashing in on your limited knowledge of science.

Doctors of medicine are trained for years in reputable schools and hospitals. They are licensed only after they meet high medical standards. The legitimate doctor does not limit himself to a device or instrument or to any one "system." He does not limit himself to manipulations or adjustments.

Not so with the quacks. The quack pretends to medical skill. He invents a machine, device or scheme to defraud the public. He advertises that he has the one and only "cure." He may even purchase a phony medical diploma. All the quack needs is someone to believe him. And some sick people are easily impressed.

One alleged "doctor" testified he received four degrees from a "drugless practitioners college" he said he had attended for one year. He claimed to be a doctor of chiropractic, naturopathy, herbal materia medica and electro-therapeutics.

Another "practitioner," who came here from India, advertised that he has at least 15 degrees, including an "honorary M.D." He started the Spectro-Chrome Institute about 1920 and did a flourishing business until the

government prosecuted him in 1947 for repeated violation of the federal food and drug law. At the trial it came out that the founder of the institute had told an elderly diabetic to stop taking insulin—that Spectro-Chrome was all he needed. The diabetic took the advice, and soon afterward went into a coma and died. Also at the trial an epileptic, testifying that the same device had benefited him, collapsed on the witness stand—from an epileptic fit. A \$20,000 fine was levied against the institute and its director, who escaped a prison sentence only because of his age (he was 75). He was put on five year's probation. However, when

the term ended he was reported to be working again. Some quacks are also licensed to practice a "healing art." Some cultist groups lobby powerfully for license recognition in various states. Well-meaning citizens often help to pass laws permitting limited practice, but this does not protect the public. A woman chiropractor in Los Angeles was given a chance to demonstrate her alleged ability during tests made at the University of Chicago. According to the university's official report, she claimed she could diagnose illness from a drop of blood of a person who wasn't there. She "diagnosed" that the person had cancer, abnormal blood pressure

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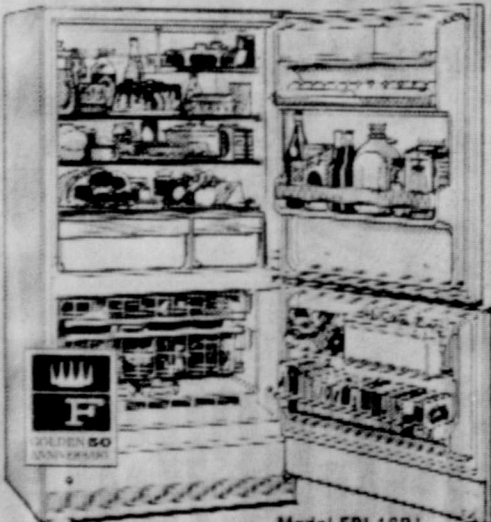
