



It is a sad FACT that Briscoe County could pay as much as \$5,000.00 dues at 2 lb. per thousand, but we only have collected a little over \$800.00 and a few hot words. Hot words will not sell maize.

It also a FACT that in the grain producing area of Briscoe Southwest of Silverton where the maize is produced, that about only 10% or less have paid any dues or helped in anyway.

Dempsey Elevator did about half of the county grain business, but the little farmer east of town paid the dues.

Seems like the farmers east of town with weak water think more of their product and are more willing to support it than the ones who can afford to pay their dues. Are we not selfish, or do we just not care what happens. Deposit at Bank.






