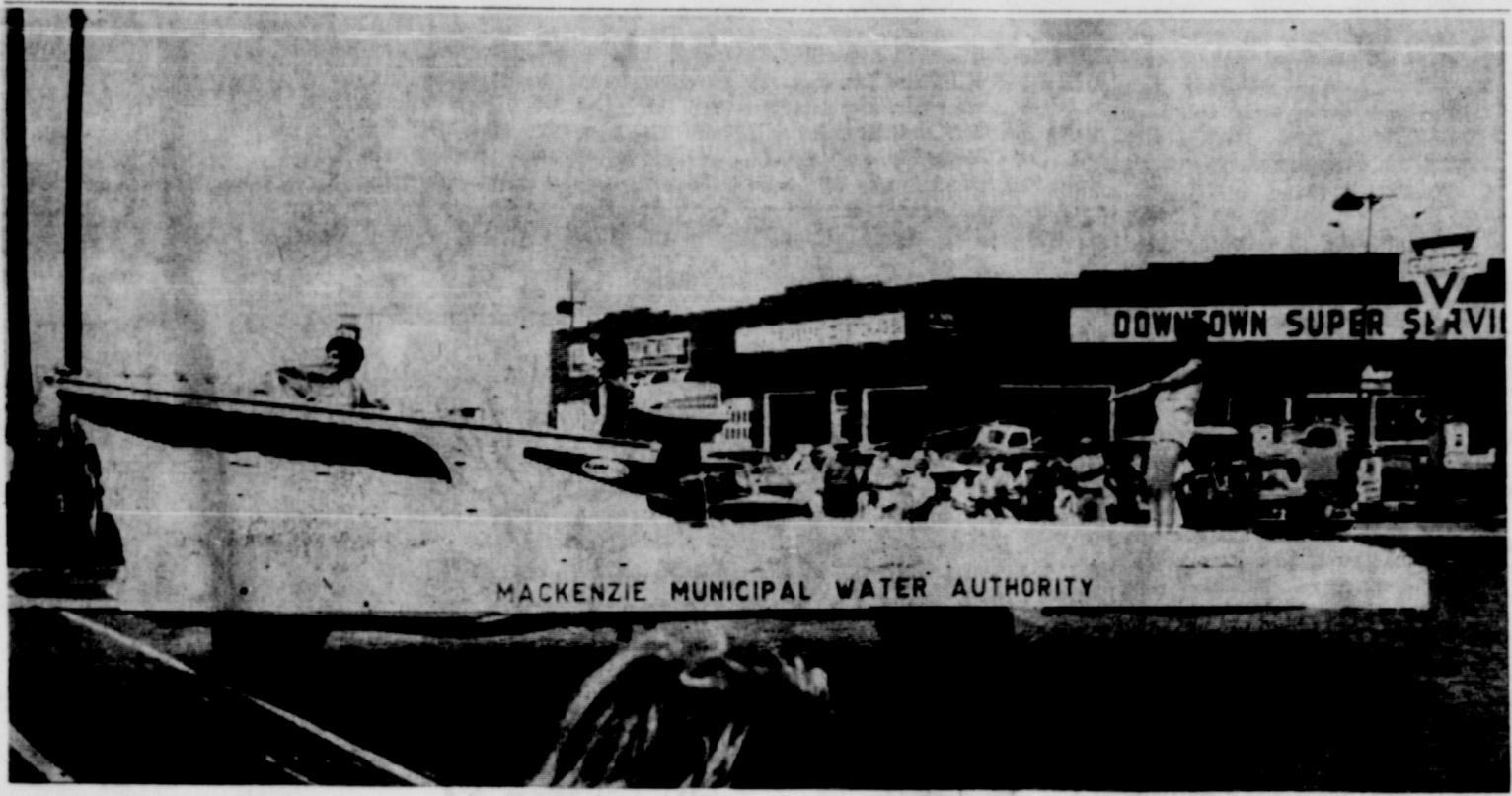

## Silverton FFA Boys Get State Honors



The Mackenzie Reservoir Authority float won first prize in the Tulla parade last week. Depicting a water-skiing scene, girls representing the towns of Lockney, Tulla, Floydada and Silverton rode in a boat furnished for the occasion by Beers Marine Supply of Amarillo. A fifth girl, representing Miss Mackenzie, was on water skis behind the boat. Numerous Silverton residents contributed their time and talents

to this project including Kay Strange, who was Miss Silverton on the float. The purpose of the float was to advertise and promote the Mackenzie Reservoir Project, and to call attention to the fact that the lake will not only furnish municipal water for the four towns involved, but will also add a sporting facility to the area.

Five Silverton F.F.A. boys have earned their Lone Star Farmer degrees, the highest award a boy can receive on the state level.

They are Joe Bob Watson, Tony Allison, Garner Garrison, Darrell Long and Johnny McGavock.

The awards were given at the annual State Future Farmers of America Convention. This year's 37th annual convention was held in Houston July 13-16, and Joe Bob Watson was the only one who was able to attend from the local chapter to receive his degree in person.

"This is a great honor for these boys," said A. E. Sommerfeld, who is the new teacher of vocational agriculture in Silverton High School. "Selection is based on successfulness in supervised farming projects and also on activeness in the F.F.A. and leadership in the F.F.A. and other organizations. Silverton F.F.A. was one of the very few chapters to have as many as five winners for this year."

### Eddleman Appointed To F.H.A. Committee

Bryant Eddleman of Silverton has been appointed as a member of the three-man Briscoe County Farmers Home Administration committee, the agency's county supervisor Donald B. Cruce, announced this week. The appointment is for three years and began on July 1.

Eddleman succeeds Jim Mercer, whose three-year term expired this year. The other two members serving with Mr. Eddleman are Berle H. Fisch of Silverton and Denver I. Anderson of Quitaque.

The local Farmers Home Administration county committee reviews applications by farmers and other rural families for seven different types of agricultural, housing and water loans made in Briscoe County. In addition, the committee advises with the county supervisor regarding the adapting of national loan policies to local conditions.

Each girl will receive a blue, red or white award, and the top girl in the junior and senior divisions will represent Briscoe County in the District 4-H Dress Revue which is to be held in Lubbock on August 12.

### June Rainfall Totaled 5.35 Inches Here

Rainfall during the month of June totaled 5.35 inches in Silverton, according to the official measurement. This occurred on six days, the most falling during any 24-hour period being 1.67.

March moisture totaled .51 of an inch; April rains contributed 1.71 inches; and in May 1.24 inches was received.

The four-month total rainfall amounts to 8.81 within the city limits.

### Two Rural Accidents Investigated in June

The Highway Patrol investigated two rural traffic accidents in Briscoe County during the month of June, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

The accidents accounted for one injury and an estimated property damage of \$820.00.

The rural traffic accident summary in Briscoe County for the first six months of 1965 shows a total of eight crashes resulting in none killed, ten injured, and an estimated property damage of \$6,130.00.

"As of the first of this month, there had been a total of 1,040 fatal crashes in Texas taking lives of 1,261 persons," the Sergeant stated. This is approximately two percent less than for the same period of 1964; however, if past trends continue, we will in all probability exceed the all time record high of 3,006 persons killed in traffic crashes experienced in Texas last year.

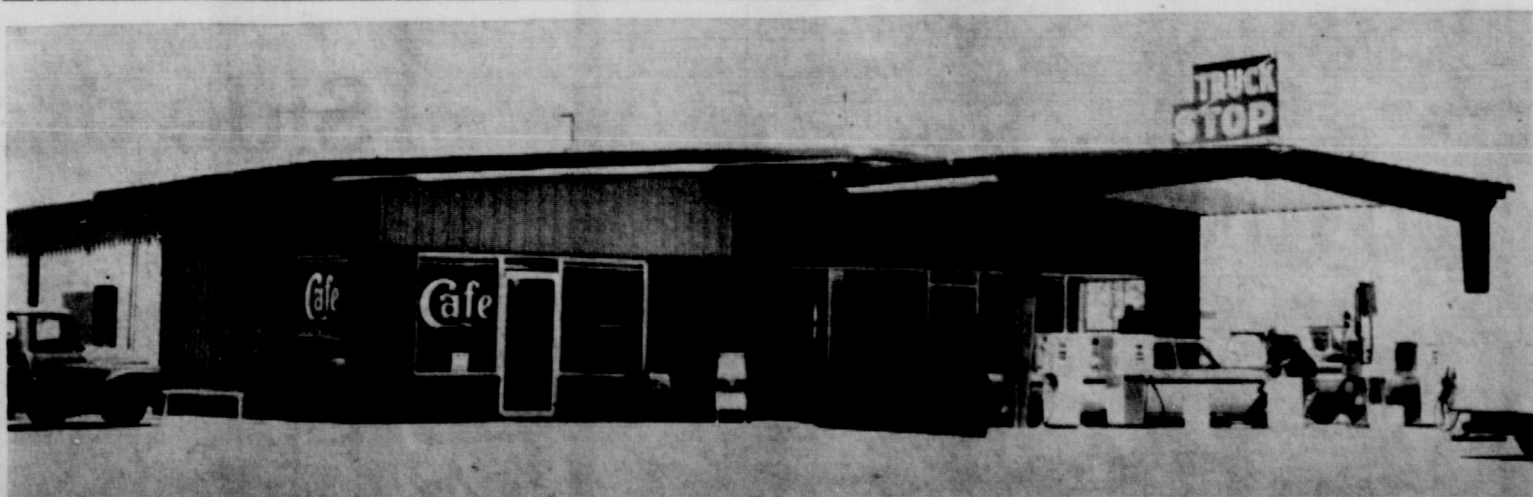
The Amarillo Air Force Band will lead Silverton's parade this year and will be guests for the free barbecue that evening.

### Youth Riding Clinic Planned Next Week

A Youth Western Horsemanship and Riding Clinic will be held at the Indoor Arena at the Tri-State Fair Grounds in Amarillo July 27 from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. each day.

Mrs. Eleanor Freeman of Wheeler will be the instructor for the clinic. She and her husband are in the ranching business, raise Appaloosa and Quarter horses, and developed the well-known Wheeler Parade Group. She holds instructor's and judge's ratings for teaching western riding. She will instruct mounting, safety, aids, biting, faults, schooling of horse leading, proficiency in western pleasure events and halter showing.

## 4-H Youths Keep Fit

When boys and girls club work first started in the early 1900's, the emblem was a 3-H clover symbolizing Head, Heart, Hands. Around 1911 the 4th H was added to represent Health. Ever since, both here and in about 75 other countries, this emblem has represented the equal training of "head, heart, hands and health for better living."



Health projects have grown over the years in knowledge, activities and membership, says the Cooperative Extension Service which supervises 4-H programs. And keeping fit is one important segment of the national 4-H Health program which today enrolls some 677,000 boys and girls.

It is easy to keep in good shape during summer months through sports, games, hikes, camping and outdoor work. But, cautions the 4-H Health bulletin, there is more to maintaining good health than strenuous exercise.

This recent publication points out the need for three nutritious meals a day, plenty of sleep, periodic physical checkups and a sensible balance of work and play. It also urges 4-H Club members to look for ways to improve family and community health.

Individual members and clubs can win awards for doing an outstanding job. Winners are selected by the Extension Service. Award donor and sponsor of the 4-H Health program for the last 10 years is Eli Lilly and Company.

The boy or girl judged best in the state will be a delegate to the National 4-H Club Congress at Chicago next fall, and will compete for one of six \$500 scholarships. In the county, the best four club projects will be recognized with a certificate and medals will be presented to as many as four top individuals.

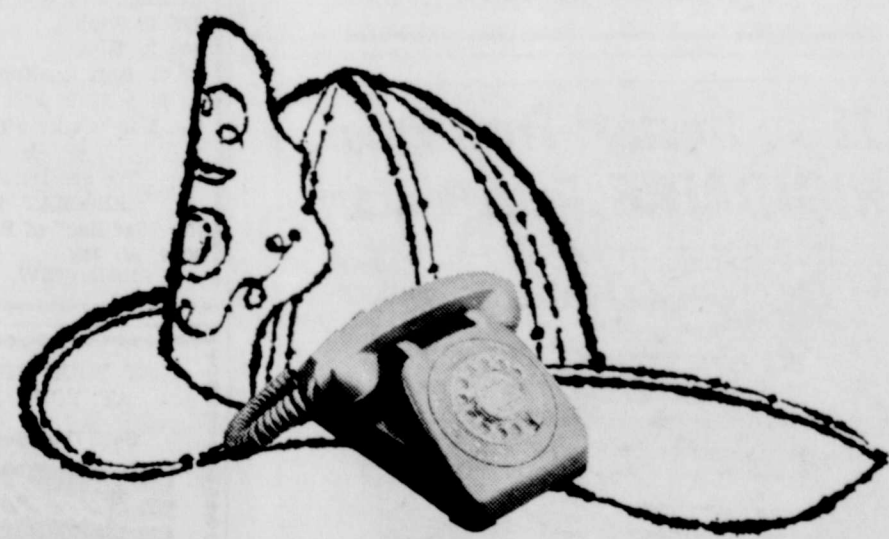

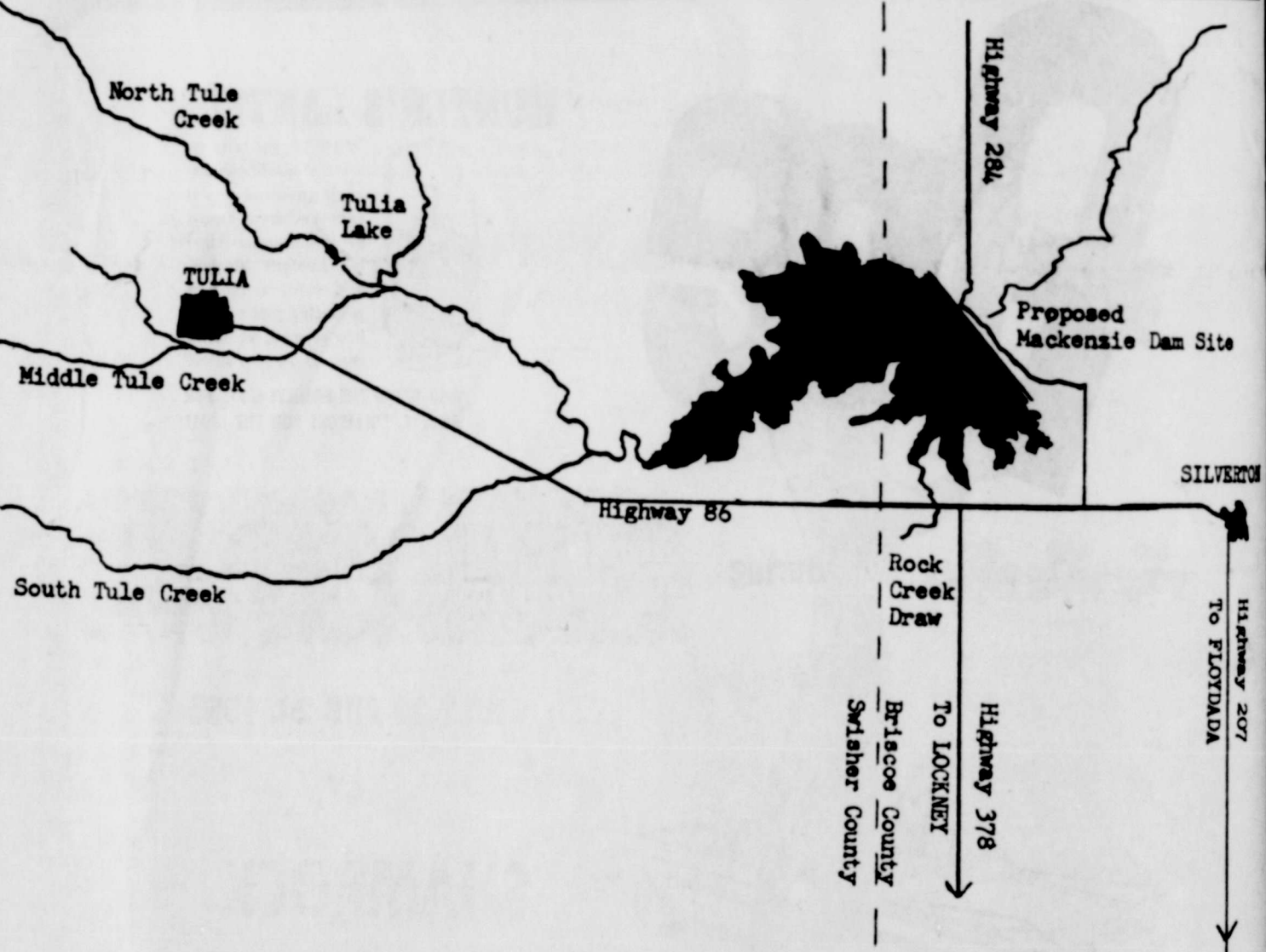

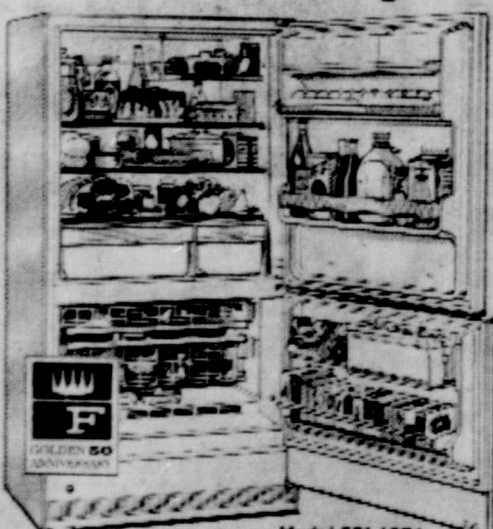
