# Mackenzie Board Has Business Meeting



Buddy Comer and Laquita Bomar were named as the Gold Star boy and girl in Briscoe County at the annual 4-H Achievement Banquet held here recently. The two Silvertown students will represent Briscoe County at a banquet honoring the Gold Star winners in this area hosted by the rural electric cooperatives.

Directors of Mackenzie Water Authority entered into contract with First Southwest Company and Columbian Securities Corporation of Texas for professional services as financial consultants to the Authority when the regular monthly meeting was held Monday night in Tullia.

Dumas, Huguenin & Boothman of Dallas were retained as bond attorneys in connection with the financing of the proposed project. The bond attorneys will provide the necessary legal proceedings and render their unqualified approving opinions on bonds to be issued by the Authority.

The fiscal agent will make a detailed study and submit a recommendation as to the type or types of bonds which the Authority should issue in order to finance the project on an economical and practical basis. The agents will be paid \$36,750 for services if the total of bonds issued by the Authority and the contract value of any water sold in place to an agency of the State of Texas is \$2 million or less. If the total of bonds issued exceeds \$2 million, the fee shall be \$36,750 plus one per cent of the amount of the excess of \$2 million.

If the Authority determines to apply for a grant or other type of financing from a federal agency and desires the services of the fiscal agent, the fee of the fiscal agent will be set by negotiation at an amount mutually agreeable to the Authority and fiscal agent.

Jim Nichols, Fort Worth engineer, reported on the field study made. The proposed location of the project will be on the Rex Rodgers property with one corner on land owned by Cephus Flowers. The dam would be located about one half mile west of the bridge in the canyon between Silvertown and Vigo Park.

It was reported that the Mackenzie project would provide a better quality of water than that in the Canadian River project. Capacity of the reservoir would be 54,000 acre feet. Surface area would be 900 acres. Maximum depth of water, 148 feet, and average depth would be 60 feet. Service spillway level would be 3100 elevation and emergency spillway level, 3110. Length of the main embankment, 2300 feet and maximum height and width of embankment respectively would be 178 and 1058 feet. Approximate volume of earth work would be four million cubic yards.

The engineer reported foundation conditions excellent, both right and left abutments capped by 45 feet sandstone. Red bed underlies the sandstone and is exposed in both abutments and the creek channel. Core trench will be

nominal depth and will be dry. Adequate materials for construction of either homogenous or zoned type of embankment are readily available as well as riprap and blanket.

Pipeline from the dam to filter plant would be 21 inches. Eighteen inch lines would be built to Tullia and to near Lockney at which point a 12-inch line would go to Lockney and 16-inch line to Floydada. A 10-inch line would serve Silvertown.

Length of pipeline to the four cities would be 22 miles to Tullia, 27 miles to a point east of Lockney, four miles to Lockney from this point, 16 miles from the same point to Floydada. The filter plant would be located 2.5 miles from dam. The filter plant would be 5.5 miles from Silvertown.

Construction time would be two years. Engineers will estimate the cost of the project at the next meeting.

The lake would be from 3 1/2 to four miles long, all on the Rodgers estate.

#### Cooperatives Serving Low-Income Families Receive Credit Assistance

Farmers Home Administration  
 Economic Opportunity Loans total-  
 ing over \$2 million have been  
 made this year through Septem-  
 ber 30 to 176 rural cooperatives  
 serving some 10,000 low-income  
 people in 25 states, including  
 \$3,800 to two Texas groups, L. J.  
 Cappelman, State Director, recent-  
 ly announced.

"Most of this credit is extended  
 in the form of small loans to fi-  
 nance a variety of cooperative en-  
 terprises—all designed to increase  
 the net income of farm and other  
 rural people throughout the United  
 States," Cappelman explained.  
 Cooperative enterprises financed  
 throughout the nation during the  
 past nine months include dairy  
 products processing, handicraft  
 marketing, feeder pig sales yard,  
 vegetable marketing, peanut mar-  
 keting and the sharing of several  
 types of farm equipment.

Economic Opportunity loans to  
 cooperatives serving rural families  
 carry 4 1/2% interest and are sched-  
 uled for repayment over a period  
 not exceeding 30 years.

Farmers Home Administration  
 loans to cooperatives serving fam-  
 ilies in Texas are for group owned  
 farm machinery.

The majority of such loans  
 made throughout the United States  
 have been to finance small machi-  
 nery cooperatives that provide  
 needed agricultural equipment  
 member farmers could not other-  
 wise obtain.

The Texas Farmers Home Ad-  
 ministration director emphasized  
 that he foresees great potential in  
 the Economic Opportunity loan  
 programs since they are capable  
 of putting new economic muscle

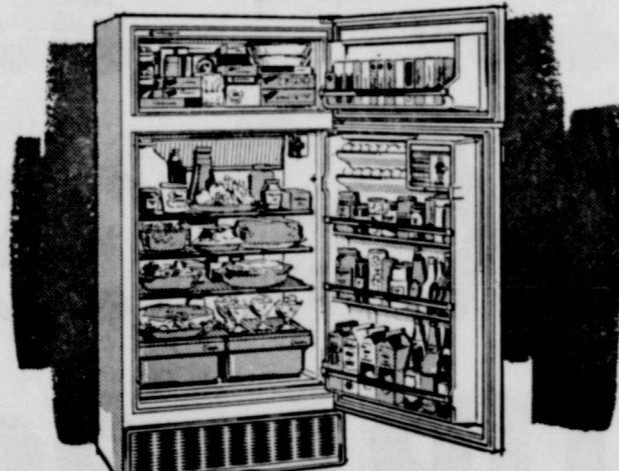

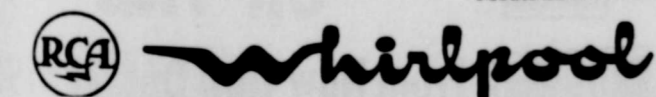

## Should Capital Punishment Be Abolished

There are 13 states in the United States that have eliminated capital punishment. Last year there were only 15 executions as compared with 177 in 1930. Many feel that abolishing capital punishment would increase the nation's crime rate.

In New York City the statistics show that there is a murder a day. This accounts for the 9,000 murders committed last year. The fact that the murder rate is lower in states without the death penalty does not take into consideration that some communities are more law abiding than others.

Several states abolish the death penalty, but then restored it to keep the number of major crimes down.

Alabama, who has the highest murder rate in the United States, is the most consistent user of capital punishment. Oregon found that the murder rate increased after the death penalty was restored. As a result, Oregon abolished it again.

In the last decade, California has paroled three hundred murderers, and only nine were later convicted of other crimes.

Prison wardens favor abolition because injustices are done. Less than 1% of all convicted murderers are executed.

The only way to make sure a murdered will not be freed someday is to execute him. However, capital punishment is too final. It leaves no room for error.

## BOOK REVIEW

My Darling Clementine  
The Story of Lady Churchill  
by Jack Fishman

In a book that matches the charm of its subject, the remarkable woman who stood at Winston Churchill's side during his entire career is at last revealed. In "My Darling Clementine" is one of the most fascinating personalities of our times.

From her first meeting with the young Churchill and his proposal to her in the gardens of Blenheim Palace, the story of Clementine Churchill covers their lives together. It is filled with intimate details of their days of struggle, disaster, and glory. In the seclusion of their country home or at 10 Downing Street in the boiling center of political strife, Lady Churchill has been the active partner of one of the most exciting men of the twentieth century.

Whether facing a hostile political rally on behalf of her husband, riding a camel in the desert beside Lawrence of Arabia, or teaching her notoriously tardy husband a lesson by making him wait while she dressed for the evening all over again, Lady Churchill is a delight.

No man, and certainly no woman whose heart has been stirred by Winston Churchill's oratory and deeds, will want to miss this account of his years of darkness and triumph as they were lived by the woman at his side.

Although hundreds of books have been published about her husband, this is the first book to be devoted to Lady Churchill. Even before a single copy of the volume was in print, the news of its coming publication caused a great stir. Publication rights were eagerly bid for in America, Australia, France, Greece, Holland, Iceland, Japan, South America, and Sweden, with more offers coming in every day.

The author began to gather his material for the book while he accompanied the Churchills on many of the blitz tours they made in bombed English cities. He continued to gather stories over the years from people whom Clementine Churchill had met; people with whom she worked, and who worked for her. He interviewed Ministers and their wives, relatives and friends. He found literally hundreds of collaborators among the distinguished and unknown, whose paths had crossed hers. The book also draws on innumerable documents, diaries and memoirs. The author was given access to files of people and organizations closely linked with Lady Churchill and was permitted to quote from some of her correspondence.

Lady Churchill emerges as a vibrant, unconventional personality in her own right. And the book is a duel portrait. It presents the Lady Churchill unknown to the mass of people. It also presents an unknown Winston Churchill—Winston as he is seen through his wife's eyes.

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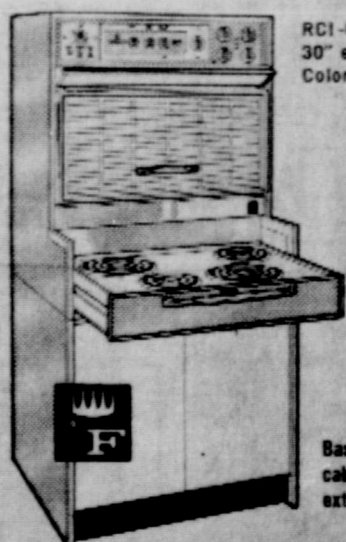


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
