## Primary Elections Slated For May 7

The Democratic and Republican Primary Elections will be held Saturday, May 7. Voting places in the Democratic Primary will be the same as usual, with four precincts voting in the county courthouse, one in Quitaque, one at Antelope and one at San Jacinto. Voting in the Republican Primary will be at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Williams.

Spotlight in the Democratic Primary has been on the race for attorney general. Candidates are Galloway Calhoun of Tyler, Crawford Martin of Hillsboro and Franklin Spears of San Antonio.

Spears pledges efforts to improve law enforcement. Martin is emphasizing his 27 years' experience as a lawyer and his long service as state senator and secretary of state. Calhoun identifies himself as the "only real conservative" in the race.

All three candidates are eying the large number of voters who apparently still are undecided despite their long campaigns.

Gov. John Connally, seeking a third term, virtually has ignored attacks on his administration by Stanley Woods of Houston. The third candidate for governor, Johnnie Mae Hackworth of Brenham, has not actively campaigned.

Bill Hollowell of Grand Saline, running as Woods' ticketmate, is opposing Lt. Gov. Preston Smith.

Paul B. Haring of Goliad is waging a spirited campaign against incumbent Railroad Commissioner Byron Tunnell of Tyler.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr is opposed by political newcomer John R. (Jack) Willoughby of Houston for the U. S. Senate nomination. Land Commissioner Jerry Sad-

Only contested statewide judicial race is between incumbent Court of Criminal Appeals Judge W. T. McDonald of Bryan and District Judge John F. Onion of San Antonio.

One race of interest is that of State Senator for the 30th District, there being two incumbents because of two districts having been combined under the redistricting. Incumbents Andy Rogers and Jack Hightower are being challenged by James Ray of Plainview.

The only local race which is contested is that of County Com-

missioner in Precinct No. 4. In that precinct, incumbent Roy S. Brown is being challenged by O. M. (Milton) Dudley and Mrs. Mary Beasley.

## Counties to Vote on Sale of Allotments

Growers in about two-thirds of the upland cotton producing counties will vote during the period of May 16 through May 25 on whether to permit transfer of cotton acreage allotments to other counties by sale or lease. If in any county at least two thirds of growers voting favor transfer, growers will be permitted to transfer allotments by sale or lease to farmers in other counties within the state. Allotments may not be shifted to other states.

Where approved by at least two thirds of growers voting in county, transfer of allotments to other counties for period 1967, 1968 and 1969 will be permitted. Transfer of allotments authorized in Food and Agriculture Act of 1965.

First vote on transfer of allotments held on November 23, 1965. At that time growers in 349 upland cotton-producing counties voted to permit transfers. There are a total of 1,059 cotton growing counties in the U.S. Only those counties which did not approve transfers last November will vote this month.

The May 16-25 referendum will be by mail, first time a referendum of this type has been conducted by mail. Ballots will be delivered to all cotton growers of record in counties holding a referendum. Officials said a mail vote should be much more convenient for growers rather than having to appear in person at the polling place, particularly during a busy season. USDA officials hope for good turnout in voting and will regard it as sign growers approve mail method of holding referendum. To be counted, all votes should be in the office of the county ASC committee before office closing time May 25.

The best time to tackle the medical problems of old age are during the middle years or the "Critical Decades." We need to develop a healthful pattern of living in order to prevent trouble from developing later on.

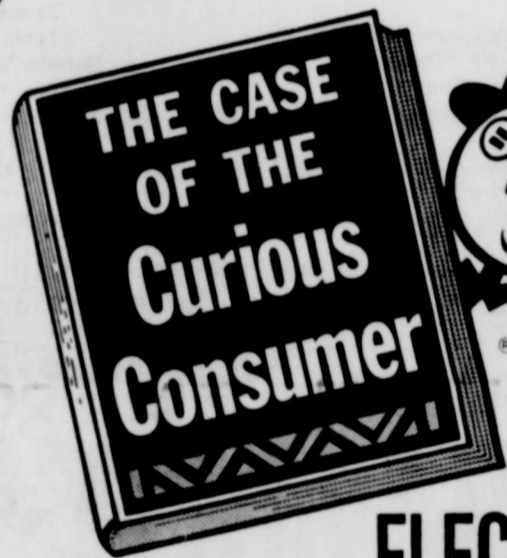

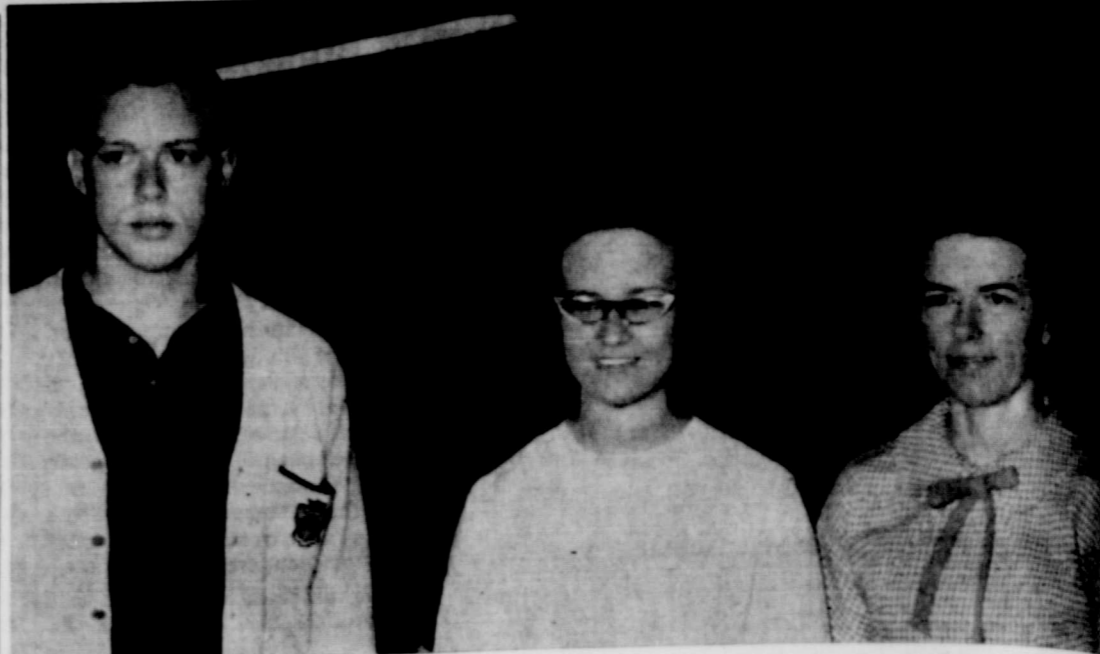

SPRING, or any other time, is just right for adding a bit of cheery color, a cozy nook, draperies, or an entire new decor to the home. At least that's what scores of 4-H Club members are doing as part of their home improvement project.

It is amazing what these teenagers, and even pre-teens, have done to beautify their own rooms, and often all the other rooms in the family dwelling. Projects vary according to ability and need, but the young homemakers learn the basics of painting, papering, choice of color, texture and design, furniture and floor refinishing, sewing and purchasing.

#### Awards Given

At the close of the 4-H Club year, the 4-H staff of the Cooperative Extension Service will judge completed projects for county, state and national awards. Donor of the home improvement awards for the fifth straight year is The S&H Foundation, Inc. Six \$500 scholarships will go to national winners.

Examples of what 4-Hers can accomplish is told in the records of three recent national scholarship winners, all named Linda. Linda No. 1 had the thrill of helping to renovate an old farmhouse which her parents had purchased to make more room for the growing family of six. Linda tackled painting, tiling,



sanding floors and refinishing furniture. She did research on lighting and also made bedspreads and curtains for her own room.

A brand new house was the starting place for Linda No. 2 who had previously collected an idea scrapbook on home beautification. She took on a man-sized share of the interior decorating from the bare walls to making a novel lamp from a "large balloon and spray starch."

More than 70 different home improvements were scored by the third Linda over a seven-year period. She studied flower arrangement, color, texture and design as she advanced in her projects. Her method for making glass mosaics gained national fame.

After transforming her bedroom into a cozy retreat, Linda went to work on her brother's room. She used the bright hues of his miniature car collection for the decorating colors.

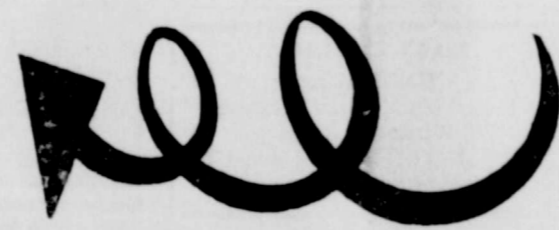
