

A group of about 30 businessmen, farmers and ranchers met in the county courtroom Tuesday night for the purpose of discussing community recreational and entertainment needs.


It was suggested that a summer tennis tournament could be held: that a vacant building could be rented for a youth center; and that the outdoor movie could be reopened by forming a stock company.




