Did you know that peach tree leaves contain one of the most dangerous poisons known? In the vegetable world, the leaves and vines of the tomato and potato plants contain poisons. Most dangerous of all plants in your garden is the rhubarb. Its stalk is very good to eat, but the leaves will cause you severe damage if eaten. Let's make it our business to find out about poisonous plants . . . it can save our lives.

Children are developing all of their senses all the time. We all develop our sense of taste by trying out different things. Eating something new is always a challenge. Children go through this process everyday. Do you have a pre-school child in your home? If you do, that child depends on you for protection. Remember young ones of this age try to reach what they see . . . and what they reach, they put in their mouth. Be aware of the poison problem.
