## Mailboxes Protected By Federal Law, Postmaster Strange Reminds People

Mailboxes are protected by Federal Law, and pranksters or vandals who damage or destroy the boxes and their contents may be in for a heavy fine or imprisonment, Postmaster Strange warned today.

The Postmaster noted that some 25,000 mail receptacles were damaged or destroyed in the past

year. It was also noted that 2,641 persons were arrested in the year up to June 30th for damaging or destroying mail receptacles.

Postmaster Strange quoted from the law: "Whoever wilfully or maliciously injures, tears down or destroys any letterbox or other receptacle intended or used for the receipt or delivery of mail on

any mail route, or breaks open the same or wilfully or maliciously injures, defaces or destroys any mail deposited therein, shall be fined not more than \$1,000.00 or imprisoned not more than three years."

This applies to all mail receptacles and the mail in them, even though the boxes are bought by citizens and are their personal property.

They ran short at the State office, so we'll dispense our supply on the basis of first come first served. There is a new form "National 4-H Report Form" that is to replace the former "Standard Report Form." We have ordered a supply. If you pick up enough for your organization groups every member can be given a new form for their records for all projects in 1967.

Canned goods are handled by many people and gather dust before reaching you. It's an excellent sanitary measure to wash the tops of food cans with a sudsy cloth. This helps to protect the contents against contamination in case the cover slips inside when opened.

Having a crowd for dinner? Serve them buffet-style. Buffet service is a popular type of meal service today.

A buffet meal is the answer when more guests are present than can be seated conveniently at the dinner table or when the number of guests is indefinite.

The success of your buffet meal depends upon the attractiveness of the buffet table. Interesting colors may be introduced in the table covering, the serving dishes, the food or the decorations.

An unusual arrangement of fruit, vegetables, and nuts with fall colors adds special charm to the table. For more of a holiday atmosphere, light candles and surround them with Christmas ornaments in just the right colors to accent the food.

Give consideration to contrasts in sizes, shapes, and colors in the food and other items used on the table. Flavor of the food is of greatest importance and deserves much thought in planning the meal.

It's important to limit the number of hot foods served to those that can be prepared and served nicely. You can't risk serving poor quality food. Always remember—serve hot foods piping hot.

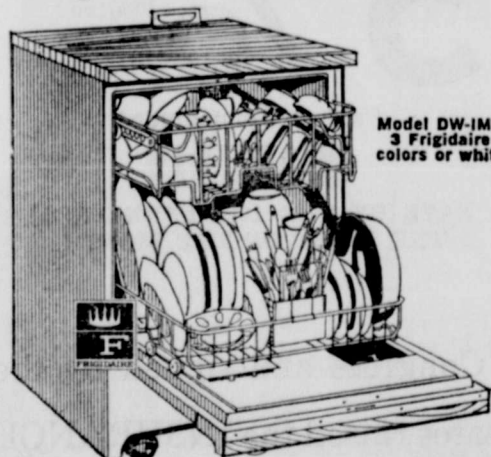
