## Billy Graham Film To Be Shown Here

Evangelist Billy Graham's feature-length dramatic film, "Shadow of the Boomerang," will have its Silverton showing Saturday, January 14, at 7:30 p.m. at the First Baptist Church.

Starring vivacious Georgia Lee and television's Buffalo Bill, Jr., "Shadow of the Boomerang," is an outdoor action picture with all of the excitement and breath-taking scope of the "Down Under." Setting for the screen drama is Australia's "Outback," the continent's vast interior region where some of the world's largest cattle stations are located.

The two young Americans head an All-Australian supporting cast, playing brother and sister roles in a turbulent story of homestead life. Their arrival in Australia to manage newly acquired family holdings, plunges the couple into strange surroundings and situations with which they find it difficult to cope. ## Public Service Company Outlines Expansion Program

A 1967 construction program calling for the investment of more than 20-million dollars in new electric facilities was announced today by A. R. "Lon" Watson, president and general manager of Southwestern Public Service Company.

The new investment is being made, Watson said, in order that the electric company can continue to provide economical service for its customers at the same time that it assures them of reliable service.

"Electric service seems to be the last holdout against inflation. The purchasing power of today's electric service dollar is \$1.07—or seven percent more—than its 1952 value. On the other hand, the dollar you use to buy other goods and services is worth just 77c today, when you compare it with a 1952 dollar.

"There are two reasons for the increased value of the electric service dollar. Our customers are using more service, and the more they use the less they pay for each unit. This increased consumption, in turn, has made it necessary for us to have a continuing program of construction. The new equipment being modern, larger and more efficient helps us keep our service economical at the same time that it improves its dependability," Watson said.

Southwestern Public Service Company has not had a general rate increase for electric service in more than 15 years. Since that time, a rate simplification program, designed to reduce the number of rate schedules in the commercial and industrial fields, resulted, generally, in lower costs for users.

The major item in the 1967 program is continued construction on a 210,000 kilowatt generating unit at the company's Nichols Station, northeast of Amarillo. When the new unit goes into service in mid-1968, it will double the generating capability of the station.

"We design, engineer and supervise the construction of all of our generating stations. This do-it-yourself approach assures our customers of the best possible plant at the lowest practical cost. Right now, for example, our costs per installed kilowatt of generating capacity run substantially below the nation-wide average for units of comparable size," Watson said.

Watson also pointed out that the major additions made to the company's generating facilities in recent years are using less fuel and water for each unit of electricity produced, enabling the company to partially offset substantially increased costs for gas fuel and to conserve water resources.

Automation is also playing a major role in holding the price line. Some 70 percent of the company's total generating capability is now controlled by a computerized automatic dispatching system. The ADS constantly computes the cost of generating and transmitting the power so that the most economical means are utilized under all load conditions.

Additional power for the South Plains section of the company's service area will be provided by a 230,000 volt transmission line which will be built from Plant X, in Lamb County, to Tucco Station, in Hale County.

"Our interconnected generation and transmission system provides every corner of our 45,000 square mile service area with adequate power resources for future growth. Every community that we serve, from the smallest to the largest, can be assured that adequate, economical power is one of the assets it can include in an industrial development effort. 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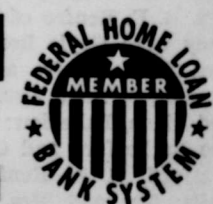
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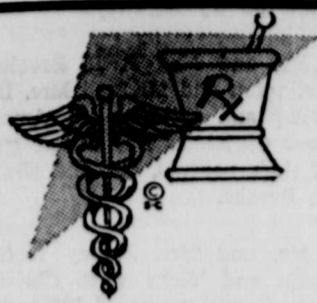

### Home Notes

#### Home Demonstration Agent

It's been a year this week that I came to Briscoe County. If you will allow a little reminiscing, we've moved forward in several areas this past year. You've organized a 4-H Adult Leaders' Association that is helping to strengthen and develop a better 4-H program in the county. Three home demonstration clubs have organized and recently you've formed a home demonstration council. Many have shown leadership qualities and tackled giving programs, and holding office, and heading committees. Several have joined the ranks as 4-H Adult Organization and Project leaders. With this kind of start we should be able to accomplish a great deal more in 1967.

We've heard some gloomy forecasts for this year, but John McHaney, Extension economist for Texas A&M University, predicts a healthy national economy in 1967. He says the national economy is expected to remain healthy during 1967 but growth potential may be closer to the long-term average.

He emphasizes that the rate of increase in economic activity during the year ahead will depend a great deal upon the turn of events in Vietnam and their impact on other government programs and on business investments.

If defense spending is accelerated, further restrictive fiscal action may be necessary to combat inflationary measures, he says. If developments result in a reduction in defense spending, it is expected that certain government programs will be increased to ease the resulting economic adjustments, he adds.

The economist sees no let-up in spending by state and local governments. The increase in 1967 is expected to equal or even exceed the growth rate of the past five years.

Residential construction and capital investments have been slowed by the tight monetary situation of 1966 which resulted as demand for credit rose in response to a sharp increase in demand for goods and services. Future developments in residential construction will depend, in part, on the success of government action to provide more funds for

mortgage markets, points out McHaney. Mortgage money should become somewhat easier to obtain later in 1967, if as expected, consumer and business demand for credit should ease. An upturn in the housing market is expected late in 1967, the economist says.

McHaney sees a slight lessening of consumer demand for durable goods but a continuing increasing demand for non-durable goods and services. Several factors are cited which may prevent auto sales from matching the total for 1966. These include a slowing down in the rate of increase of consumer income; higher cost of cars, high interest rates, draft calls, and relatively large proportion of young cars in the auto population.

Total purchases of furniture and household equipment are not expected to equal the increase of 1966 over 1965 in view of higher price tags and housing market prospects. Expenditures for non-durables, such as food, clothing, drugs, gas and oil, are expected to continue upward during 1967.

Consumers' after-tax incomes, assuming no change in present tax rates, are expected to register another gain in 1967, but it will not be as large as the past year, says the economist.

Business activity is expected to continue upward during 1967. The momentum of the current boom is expected to carry through the first half of the year but the activity gain in the last half will likely be at a slower rate, says McHaney.

In conclusion, the economist points out that many uncertainties come into the 1967 picture and make difficult the problem of assessing the overall economic outlook.

Do you still have turkey left from the holidays? Below is a suggestion from Jewel Robinson, HDA at Levelland, for making turkey tacos using Chili Con Queso as the sauce. Whether you use leftover turkey or not is not important. Turkey has been a good buy all fall and is a very nutritious meat. You may have stocked your freezer while they were plentiful.

#### Chili Con Queso

- 1 large onion, chopped
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 2 tablespoons cooking oil
- 1 No. 2 can tomatoes
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon oregano
- 1 pound Old English brick cheese
- 2 small cans chopped green chilies
- 1 small can evaporated milk
- Saute onion and garlic in cooking oil. Add tomatoes, salt and oregano. Cook on low temperature until liquid cooks down. Add cheese and cook on very low temperature until cheese melts. Add chopped chilies (peppers). Thin with evaporated milk and use sauce for Turkey Tacos. (By omitting the milk, the Chili Con Queso may be used as a dip and served with tostadoes.)

#### Turkey Tacos

- 12 tortillas
- 2 cups diced turkey
- Fry tortillas in hot cooking fat until soft. Remove from fat and fold in half as for tacos (you may use the packaged taco shells). Inside each taco place a small amount of diced turkey. Place in greased baking dish. Pour Chili Con Queso mixture over tacos. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 to 30 minutes.

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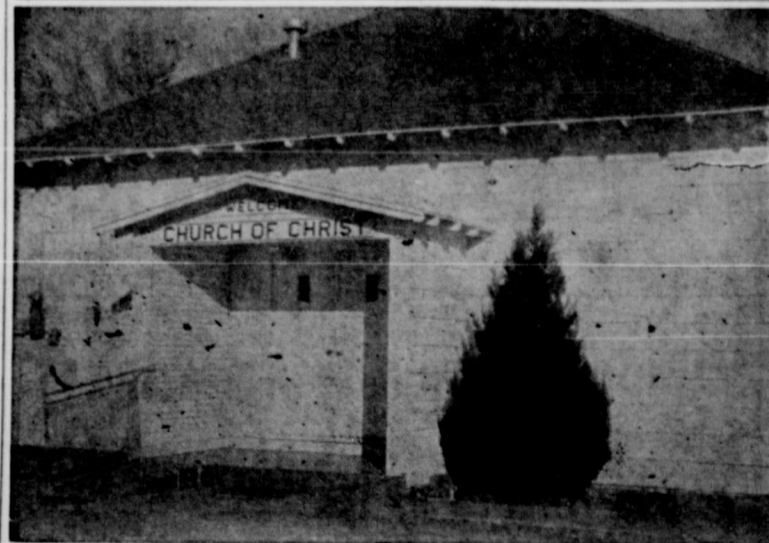
