#### **January Is Good Time To Submit** Soil Samples

At the present time, are processed as soon as they arrive at the laboratory and test reports are mailed within ten days. This schedule should benefit you since prompt service is an important requirement for an effective soil testing service.

Sampling well in advance of planting offers the advantage of allowing time to obtain the fertilizers needed. In many instances wet soil may be encountered during the winter and cause a delay in sampling, therefore, sampling now is advisable.

Shipping weights can be reduced by allowing the sample to dry a day or two at air temperature. Samples should not be heated since high temperatures cause potassium to be fixed in some soils in such a way that it cannot be removed by chemical procedures.

If reliable information is to be obtained from a soil test, it is necessary for the sample to be as nearly representative of the field on which information is desired as possible. To obtain a representative sample, a composite is made by obtaining a core or slice of soil from 10 - 15 spots in fields from 20 to 40 acres in size, Grosdidier

Pint boxes, mailing cartons, history sheets, and instructions are available from your county agent's office. Instructions for sampling should be studied and followed as closely as possible.

It is a good idea to go over these instructions with your county agent, especially if this is your first experience in collecting sam-



### Mother of March of Dimes Patient Teaches Child Braille as Precaution

"When the doctors told me my daughter was prob-ably going blind, I deter-mined to learn Braille and be her teacher. I wanted to cushion the shock of knowing she might lose her sight. and to try to share the experience with her."

Speaking is Mrs. Mary A Fennell of Archer, Fla., mother of five-year-old Lucille, who has congenital glaucoma (hardening of the eyeballs). The attractive blonde and blue-eyed child is also the victim of another birth defect which consists of malformations of the lymph vessels throughout her body.

"I've been warned," Lucille's mother explains, "that if I make a mistake in her diet such as using the wrong kind of flour in my pies-Lucille won't be with us very long."

Mrs. Fennell told of her ef forts to learn Braille, and why, at the Birth Defects Center at the University of Florida School of Medicine at Gainesville. The Center is one of 77 supported by the March of Dimes across the nation.

At the suggestion of the Florida State Council for the Blind, Mrs. Fennell wrote to the Library of Congress for a book of Braille and teaching instructions. (Available at no cost for anyone declared legally blind.)

"I thought that was all there was to it," Mrs. Fennell says. "I figured I'd just do a little studying and soon I'd be teaching Lucille how to spell by 'feeling' the raised dots. How mistaken I was!" A person who has normal
