Many teenagers in Briscoe County will soon be deciding on a career, if they haven't made the choice already. For these young people and their parents, here is the latest on job opportunities in the years ahead as seen by the U.S. Department of Labor's specialists on occupational outlook.

For at least the next decade, greatest increases in demand will be for people in professional and technical fields—jobs that generally require at least a bachelor's degree from college. Also needed will be substantially more skilled craftsmen, clerical and sales workers, service workers, people for management jobs. There will be only moderate increases in semi-skilled jobs, no increases in unskilled jobs, a decline in farm jobs.

Here is the picture in some specific fields, as indicated by Labor Department studies:

"Engineers will continue to be in heavy demand, with greatest gains in chemical, electrical and mechanical engineering. The strongest demand will be for those with advanced degrees, for research and teaching jobs.

*Physicians, dentists and nurses will be needed in growing numbers, along with more medical technologists, dietitians and therapists.

*Teachers will find sharp increases in numbers of openings, with demand heavy for science, mathematics and industrial art teachers. There will be a corresponding need for many more school counselors.

*Also in demand. Job opportunities are expected to be very good in the decade ahead for mathematicians, economists, sociologists, historians, welfare workers, accountants, graduates in business administration and programmers for electronic computer operations.

*Less optimistic. Expansions in job openings are expected to be only moderate in the printing and machinist trades. The outlook in law is for keen competition, with the best openings going to the top 10 percent of graduates and those with degrees from prestige schools. Musicians, actors, singers and dancers will find their fields overcrowded. Railroads will continue to have openings, but total employment is expected to decline.

Mrs. Sarchet dismissed the group with prayer.

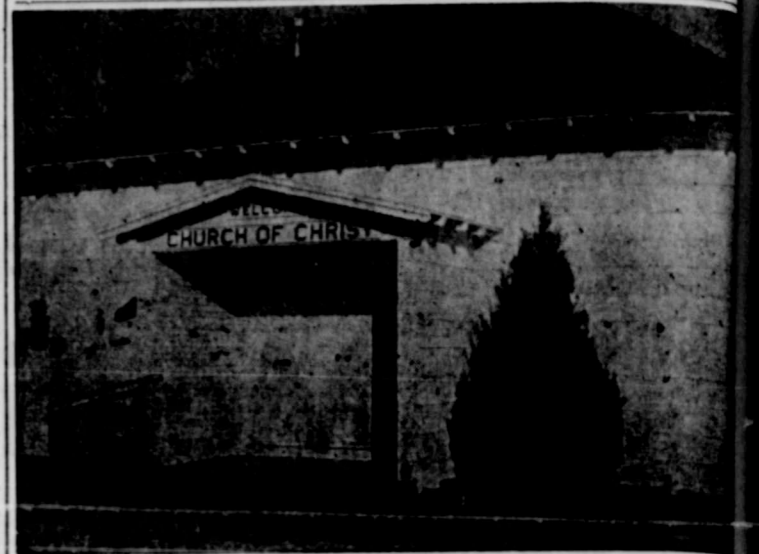
