For at least the next decade, greatest increases in demand will be for people in professional and technical fields-jobs that generally require at least a bachelor's degree from college. Also needed will be substantially more skilled craftsmen, clerical and sales workers, service workers, people for management jobs. There will be only moderate increases in semi-skilled jobs, no increases in unskilled jobs, a decline in farm jobs.

Here is the picture in some specific fields, as indicated by Labor Department studies:

*Engineers will continue to be in heavy demand, with greatest gains in chemical, electrical and mechanical engineering. The strongest demand will be for those with advanced degrees, for research and teaching jobs.






