

Public Service Company Launches New Program

A "Prosperity Through You" program is being launched by the Southwestern Public Service Co. to enlist the aid of the electric company's customers and employees to attract new industries to the communities in which they live.

The customers and employees will receive a "Prosperity Through You" prospect card with their March electric service statement. If they have any information at all on an industry that would be interested in locating in their home town, they are requested to fill in the blanks on the card and bring it to their local Southwestern Public Service Co. office.

"Industrial development has many times resulted from the actions of one individual. Just the slightest rumor has led, on many occasions, to the establishment of an industry which was economically important to a community. This type of approach will obviously lead to some blind alleys, but it is equally obvious that, with the cooperation of all of us, it can also produce some valuable industrial prospects," Larry Milnes, industrial development manager for Southwestern Public Service Company, said.

Plans for following up on the leads provided by the "Prosperity Through You" program call for an evaluation of the tip by local business leaders and then some type of contact with the prospect suggested by the local resident.

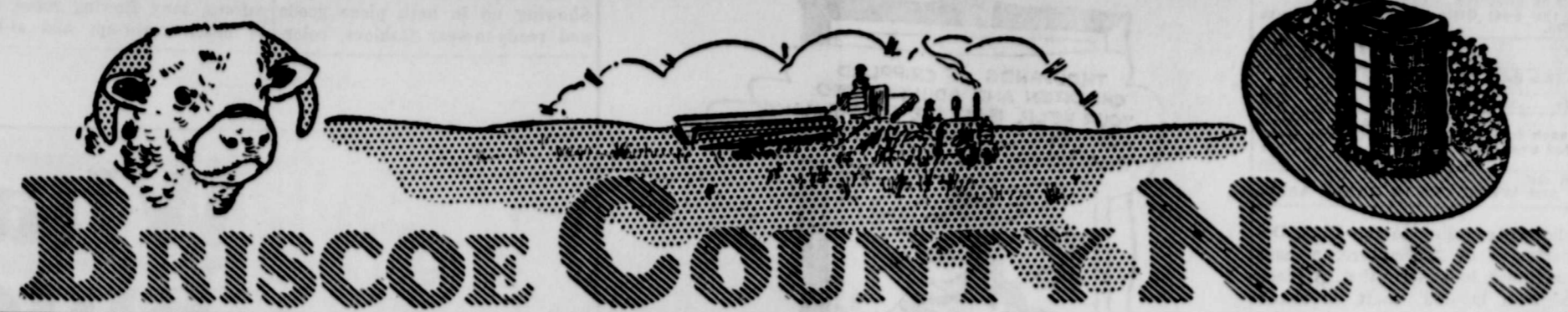

The Briscoe County Historical Society will meet Thursday, February 23, at 7:30 p.m. at City Cafe.

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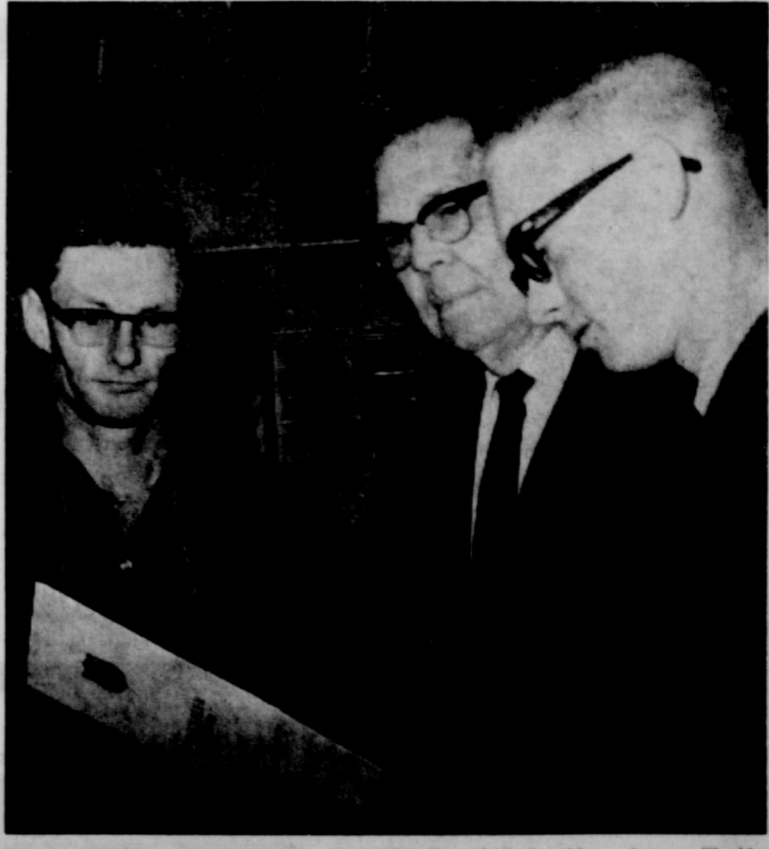

Home Demonstration Agent

The correct size socks are just as important as the correct size shoe, say clothing specialists. They should fit loosely around the toes. The correct length is one-half inch longer than the longest toe so that all toes lie straight and comfortable.

To get the most for your money when buying a ham, buy it either whole or half. That way you know you'll get those meaty center

slices. According to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, a ham half must be exactly that. A piece of ham labeled butt or shank "end" or "portion" means the butcher has removed the center slices. He probably sold them separately.

To remove black heel marks from floors, rub lightly with fine steel wool dipped in the wax you are using on the floor.

When buying major appliances check dimensions against available space.

Does your orange juice taste better lately?

The processor may be using a procedure developed by U. S. Department of Agriculture scientists to determine the amount of peel oil in the juice.

Peel oil —squeezed from the peeling of citrus fruits during juice extraction has a lot to do with juice flavor, and needs to be carefully controlled. Too much peel oil gives the juice a sharp, unpleasant pungent taste and too little leaves the juice flat and uninteresting.

Former test procedures took 90 minutes and, at modern high production speeds, citrus products could be packaged and in the warehouse before the analysis of the peel oil content was complete. The new test method consists of a simple chemical measurement

SWEET - SOUR CHICKEN

(Sure to bring repeat requests) Looking for a new way to serve chicken so you won't tire of it now that it's especially thrifty? Here is a recipe developed by USDA food specialists, that gives chicken a lift:

- 1/4 cup brown sugar, packed
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup liquid drained from canned pineapple
- 1/4 cup vinegar
- 1 tablespoon soy sauce
- 3 cups cooked, sliced chicken
- 1/4 cup onion thin half slices
- 1 cup drained canned pineapple chunks
- 1/2 cup celery strips, very thin, 1-inch long
- 1/2 cup green pepper rings, thin quartered
- 2 tablespoons diced pimento
- 3-ounce can chow mein noodles or 2 cups cooked rice
- 1/4 cup slivered, toasted almonds, if desired

Combine brown sugar, cornstarch and salt. Stir into pineapple liquid. Add vinegar and soy sauce. Bring to a boil over high heat; reduce heat and cook until thick, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add chicken, onion, pineapple, celery, and green pepper. Cook 5 minutes. Add pimento and cook 1 minute longer. Serve over chow mein noodles or rice. Top with almonds, if desired.

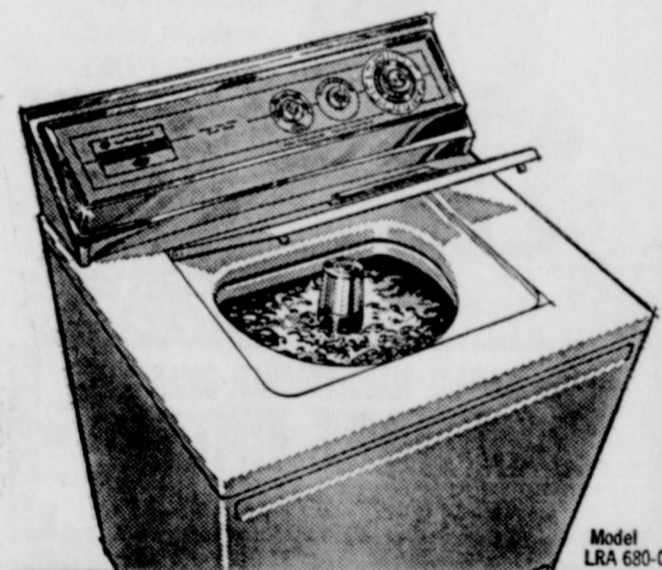

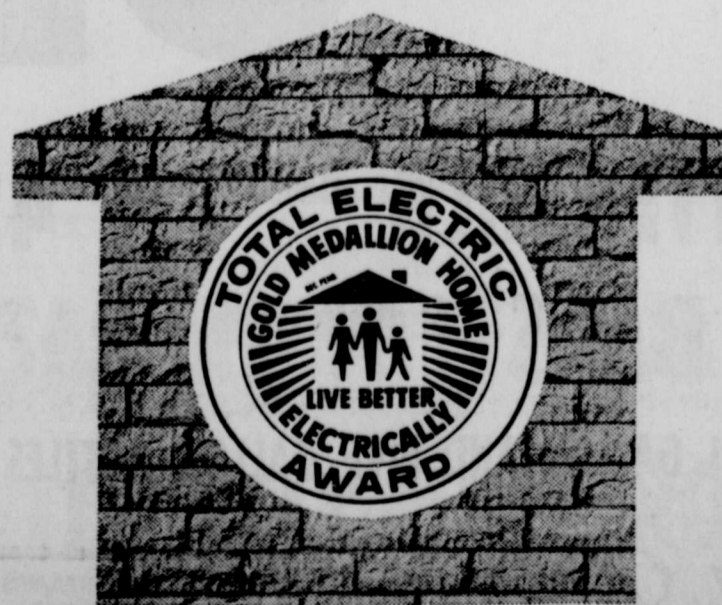

As each of you know, there is a bill before our Senate concerning liquor by the drink in the State of Texas. I would like to share an article with you from the "Parade" magazine for January 22, 1967, by Lloyd Shearer: "Americans are probably the hardest drinkers in the world today. A recent public-opinion survey reveals that one in every five adults has some family member who drinks too much, while one in fourteen claims that he is close to a person who shows the effect of drinking almost all the time."

"Alcoholism has long been regarded as strictly a masculine problem, but in America today, alcoholism among women is booming."

"The National Council on Alcoholism estimates that the 6.5 million people are suffering from alcoholism today. And of this number, no one really knows how many are women because women in our society are the hidden drinkers."

"Dr. Marvin A. Block, Chairman of the Committee on Alcoholism of the Council of Mental Health for the American Medical Association, has even ventured the opinion that there are now possibly more women than men alcoholics in the country."

Liquor by the drink revenue for the State of Texas is estimated at 15 million dollars annually. Of course, this represents a large sum of money, however, I wonder how this will affect broken lives, additional broken homes, additional car accidents with fatalities, and additional confusion within our society.

Should this particular bill come to the people of Texas for a decision, please make your way to the polls and vote your convictions.

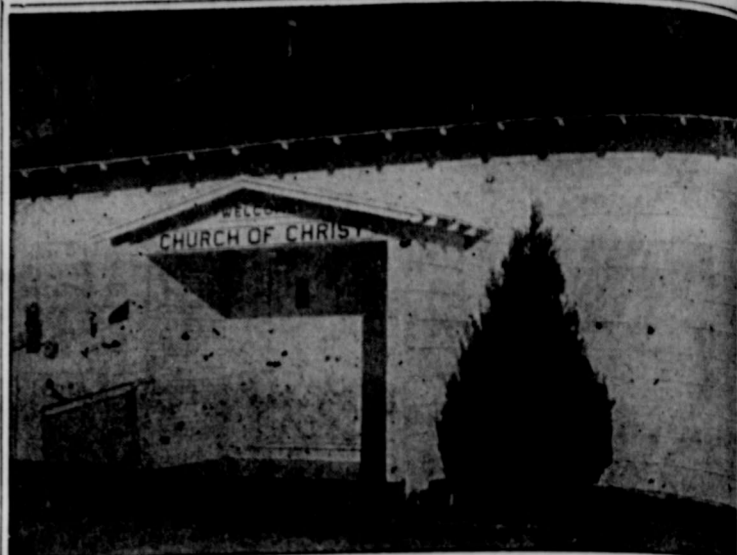

"Lots of people have sent gifts for the babies," Mr. Autry went on. "Margie is very happy with all the things that have been done for them."

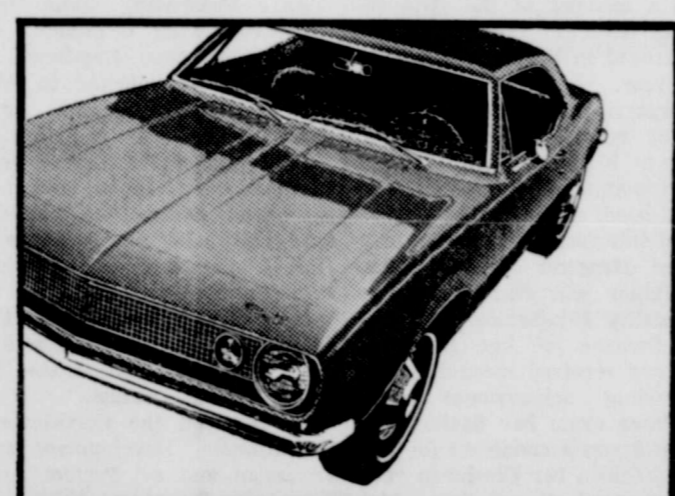

The Taylor triplets are the second set of triplets that have been born in Southwest Texas Methodist Hospital in San Antonio since its opening in 1963.

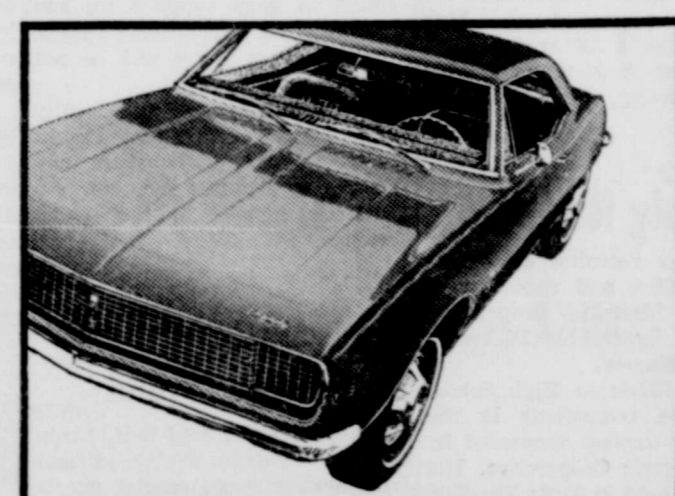

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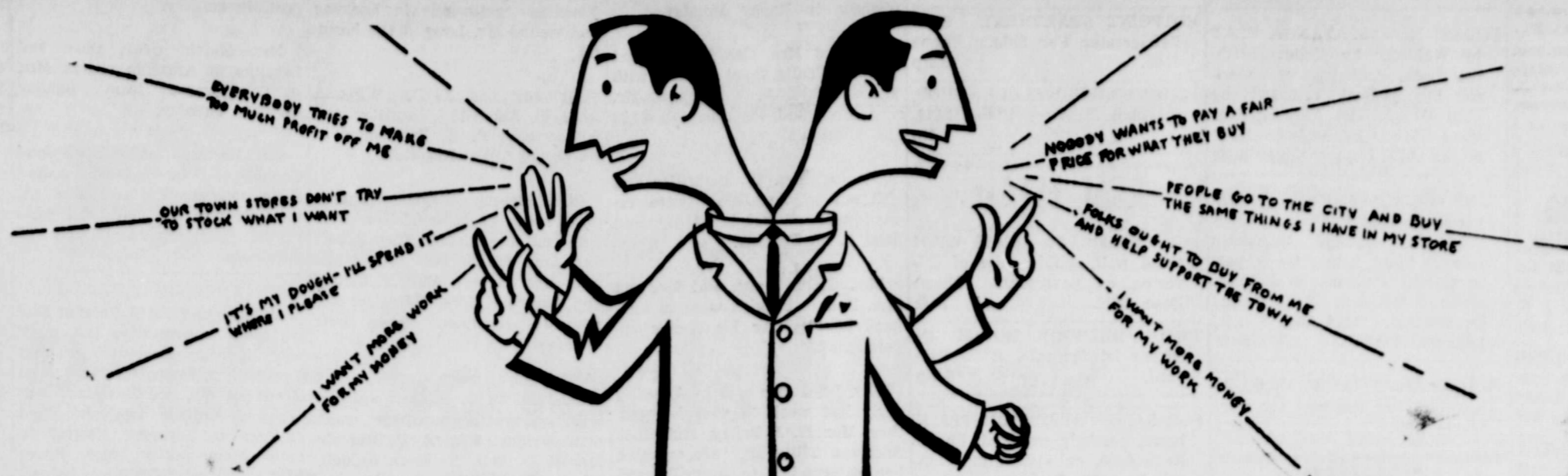
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Buyer... vs. Seller
