The law required that 20 houses be erected before the town could be patented, and the directors of the townsite mpany gave a lot to every man who would build a house. When he townsection was surveyed, the urveyors were paid with town Tickets for the lots were laced in a box and each man rew one and it was designated as his lot. Mr. Braidfoot reserved 40 acres for his services in filing on the land, and this part is called the Braidfoot Reservation and located in the northwest part the townsection.

Mrs. Braidfoot was given the nor of naming the town, and she chose "Silverton" because she ought it sounded pretty.

To make brim of bonnet, trim the 15x10-inch cake to form a large circle. Frost top and sides. On center of this, place one 8-inch layer. Frost top of layer; then place second layer on top, and frost top and sides.

Divide remaining frosting into four parts; tint yellow, green, blue, and red. Use these tinted frostings in pastry tube; decorate bonnet with flowers, leaves, and hat band. Make a ribbon bow for back of bonnet.

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
