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Good Showers Over Weekend

Showers filled the Silverton rain gauges to the 1.18 inches mark over the weekend. This brought the total moisture for the first five months of 1967 to 2.39 inches. The average annual rainfall in Briscoe County is listed by the Texas Almanac as being 19.85 inches. Since the first of October 1966, only 2.78 inches of rain has fallen on Silverton, and the nine-month figure is far below normal. Rains were predicted to continue in this area, with locally heavy showers expected. Some large hail and high winds have been reported in neighboring areas, but so far Briscoe County farmers haven't reported crop damage other than from drought and late freezes. Some of the rural areas received less than the 1.18 inches that fell in town.

Post Office Rules Altered Last Week

Postmaster Fred Strange issued a notice to Post Office box holders last week to the effect that as of May 26, 1967, no one will be handed mail from a box at the window. "There have been entirely too many people calling for the mail from boxes of other postal patrons," Postmaster Strange said. The purpose of having a box is that each individual can get his mail whenever he wants to. "If you want someone to get your mail, you will have to give him the combination to your box. I have instructed the employees of this Post Office not to give out mail from any box as of this date, May 26, 1967," the Postmaster continued. If anyone has trouble opening a box, any employee will be glad to assist you in opening the box. The Postmaster concluded by saying that the cooperation of everyone concerning this matter will be greatly appreciated.

Major Wheat Policy Meeting Scheduled

R. T. Price, chairman, Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee, today announced that an informal hearing on the 1968 wheat allotment will be held in Amarillo. The meeting, one of a series being scheduled in wheat-producing areas throughout the nation, will be held June 7, at Holiday Inn-West, 601 West Amarillo Boulevard, Amarillo, Texas. A member of the State ASC Committee will preside and the Wheat Program Specialist will participate. A major goal of the meetings will be to get information and suggestions from those in attendance and take them to Washington to assist Secretary Freeman in making the 1968 wheat acreage allotment determinations. Although the wheat program is voluntary, farmers who operate most of the wheat land elect to take part in the wheat program and thus assure themselves of full parity prices on the wheat they produce for food use in the United States. The program also protects farmers to some extent against the effects of bad weather. "A great many factors must be taken into account in establishing acreage and production goals for a major crop like wheat," the chairman pointed out. "Such things as projected production and supplies, domestic utilization and export requirements, and reasonable carryover must be considered before final decisions can be made on next year's wheat program."

The chairman said special invitations are being sent to leading wheat growers and leaders of general farm organizations, as well as to representatives of such organizations as wheat producers, elevator and warehouse operators, millers, and other interested producer, marketing and processor groups. In addition, area farmers are also invited to attend and participate in the policy meeting. Similar meetings have been held in other wheat-producing states.

The vote this year is as follows: 131 voting yes; 227 voting no. The negative vote on the referendum question again limits cotton farmers in Briscoe County to sell or lease their allotments only to within-county farmers. This referendum has no bearing on buying or leasing cotton allotments from surrounding counties who have voted "yes" in one of the last three transfer referendums.

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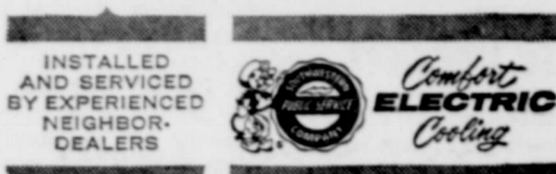
G.F.W.C. Convention Is Next Week

Home Notes

It is really going to be nice to have a County Agent again. Mr. Kenneth Cook will be reporting to the office today. If we have been unable to help

you with your problems, give us another try now that we have an Agricultural Agent. If he does not have the answer, he will know where to get help in finding the information or help you need.

The Young Homemakers are planning an upholstery workshop in June. Mrs. Billie Carr, the home economics teacher, is their sponsor and advisor, and she will direct the training. The class has been limited to ten. Mrs. Buck Hardin, president of the Young Homemakers, tells me that they will probably have less than ten enrolled. On a first call basis, Home Demonstration Club members may enroll to complete the class. If several Home Demonstration Club members are interested, I will help Mrs. Carr in whatever way she desires to conduct the workshop. The tentative dates for the class are afternoon sessions on June 26, 27 and 28.

There are four ways to pick out a good cantaloup. First, look for a smooth, shallow stem scar. Second, check the netting or veining. It should be thick, coarse, high-ridged, and stand out in bold relief on the surface. Third, check the "ground" color between the netting. As the melon ripens, the color will change from green to a yellowish-buff, yellowish-gray, or pale yellow.

Fourth, check firmness, gently, with both hands. The melon, especially the blossom end, should yield a little. It is best to select melons ripe enough to be eaten, rather than trying to let them ripen at home. These tasty melons are now on the market. They add both color and flavor to mealtime.

Credit—is it a tool or a trap? Will it be master or servant of a

A useful little guide called "Be Wise—Consumer's Quick Credit Guide" is available upon request without charge from our office. Call 4271 and we will mail you one. It folds to about a 2"x3" size that can easily be carried in one's purse or billfold.

Do you know how much you are paying for credit? There is a chart called "typical credit charges." It may surprise you to find that 1% per month equals 22.2% simple annual rate when charges are based on the beginning amount owed and are included in the 12 equal monthly installments.

What is the "true" cost of credit? Most consumers compare prices of things they buy, such as cars and television sets, so why not compare prices when they buy money—which is what they are doing when they borrow money or purchase merchandise on installment credit. Shopping for credit is as important as shopping for anything else.

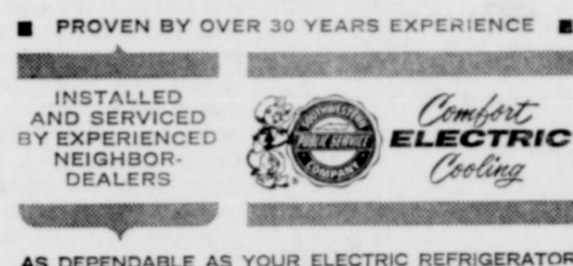
