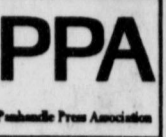

Kirk, Williams win handily

Larry Kirk ousted incumbent Tom Bonds in District 3, while Roger Williams claimed the District 4 seat in a three-way race Saturday in the Muleshoe City Council elections.

Kirk defeated Bonds by a margin of 62-17.

In District 4, Williams accumulated 44 votes, dominating opponents Delton Wilhite Brent Hall. Wilhite received 15 votes and Hall 5 votes.

District 4 incumbent Rex

Harris chose not to seek re-election

Kirk and Williams will be sworn in Thursday during a special meeting of the city council. They'll serve three-year terms.

Kirk, 55, has no prior political experience. He owns rental property.

He ran on a no-new-tax platform, stating that Muleshoe should avoid projects that increase the tax burden of citizens. He also expressed interest in consolidating the Mule-

shoe City Police and Sheriff's Department as a cost saving measure.

Kirk is married with two children and a grandchild.

Williams, 41, is the co-owner of Williams Brothers Office Supply and also has no previous political experience.

Among his political objectives was the hiring of an economic development manager to increase development of the city. He too expressed exploring the possibility of consolidating the county and city po-

lice forces.

Williams is married and has two sons.

Johnson wins Hospital Board seat in landslide

Playoff time!

Embry twirls two-hitter in 2-1 win at Littlefield

LITTLEFIELD — John Embry and Alfredo Gonzales hungered for another state tournament appearance.

A combined five previous appearances only served to wet the Muleshoe High School senior's appetite.

Embry twirled a two-hitter and Gonzales knocked both runs Tuesday as Muleshoe edged Littlefield, 2-1, on the last day of the season, earning District 2-3A's second spot in the state playoffs.

Muleshoe and Littlefield were tied for second in the district heading into the game. So it was essentially a one-game playoff for the playoffs.

"It's kind of a tradition," Gonzales said of Muleshoe's fourth-straight state playoff appearance. "We've had to keep it going and show the young guys they're expected to make the playoffs."

Muleshoe (13-13 overall, 6-4 in district) plays District 1-3A champion Perryton (20-7-2) in the bi-district playoffs

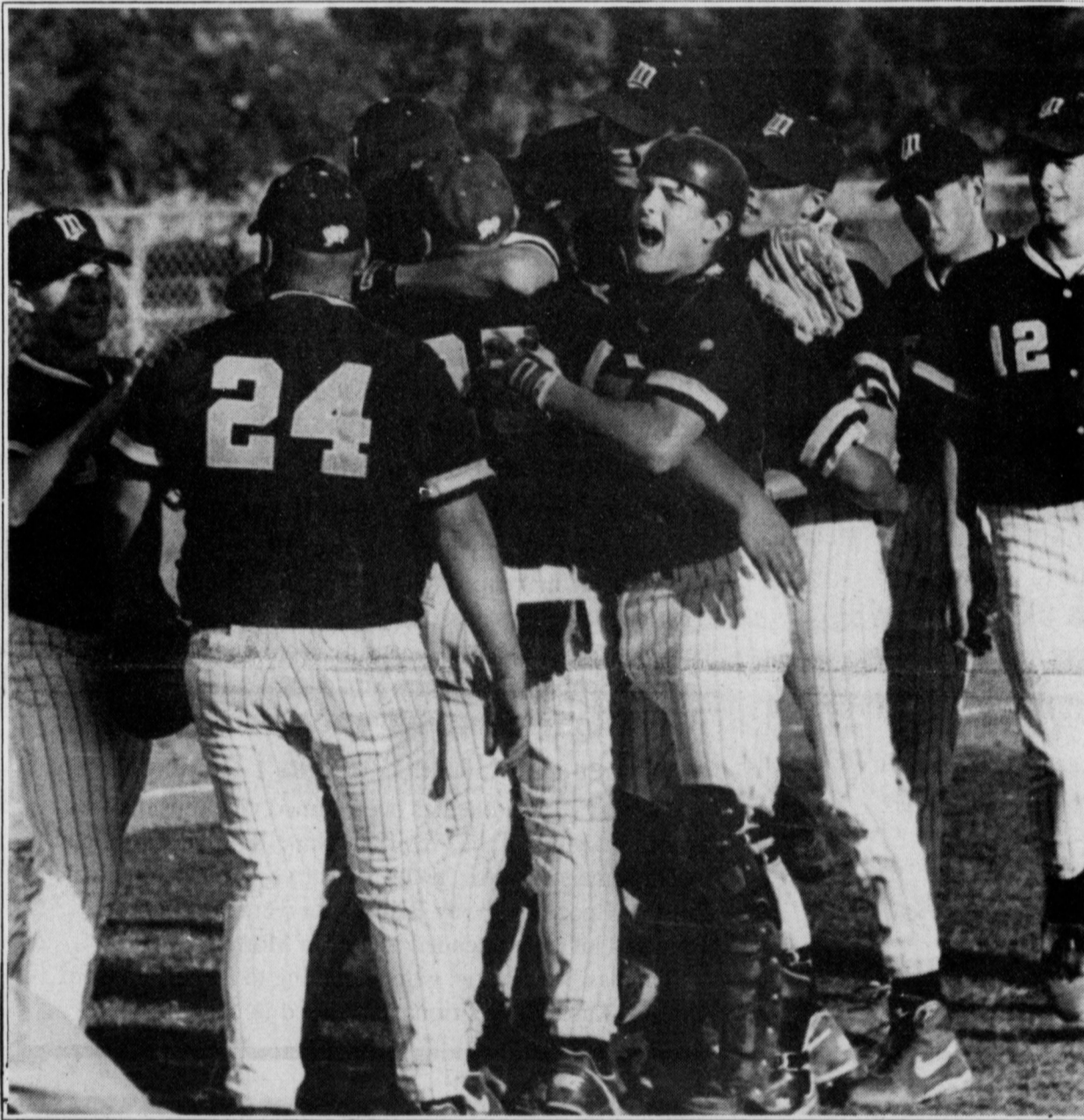

"I feel pretty confident right now," said Muleshoe rookie coach Brad Hill. "We're playing the best all-around baseball we've played all year."

Muleshoe had three-game winning streaks to open and close the district season, sandwiching a four-game losing streak in the middle. A strange recipe for playoff success, but still tasty.

Embry (2-2) was overpowering in his matchup with Littlefield ace Aaron Carr.

Using mostly fastballs, Embry struck out nine and

Garbarino sets sights on Austin

Muleshoe's Daniel Garbarino will have his own cheering section Saturday when he runs the 300-meter hurdles in the Class 3A state meet at Memorial Stadium in Austin.

About 20 relatives from Texas and Louisiana, including his mother and step-father, Eileen and Mark Morton, and a sizeable Muleshoe contingent will be part of an expected crowd of 20,000 at one of the most prestigious high school athletic events in the country.

"There's nothing like it. It's awesome. When they come around that final turn, it's like a energy bolt surges through the crowd," said Eileen, who will be more than a face in the crowd when Daniel runs Saturday afternoon.

She has a booming, foghorn voice that stops traffic — shipping traffic in the Gulf of Mexico.

Even her normally reserved husband has trouble controlling his enthusiasm.

"You can't help yelling and getting excited, especially when it's your kid involved," Mark said.

A trip to the state meet two years ago made the Mortons fans for life.

"We got caught up in the excitement that year and we'll probably go every year, even after Daniel graduates," said Mark, who traces his love for track back his days as a kid growing up in Louisiana pole vaulting with a bamboo pole in the backyard.

Garbarino will be making his second-straight appearance in Austin.

He finished dead last in 1995, which didn't sit well.

"It tends to humble you a little bit," Garbarino said. "I have something to prove."

Garbarino time of 39.77 while winning the Region I title April 29 in Odessa placed him in a tie for the sixth best time in a field of eight Saturday. Race time is 2:20 p.m.

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Prisons recycling uniforms

HUNTSVILLE — In the past, tattered convict clothing and worn-out guard uniforms brought less than a penny a pound when sold as scrap by the state prison system.

Cloth trimmings from prison garment factories brought two cents a pound. Poly-cotton wastes ended up in landfills.

In the future, these rags and scraps will save millions of dollars for Texas taxpayers thanks to new recycling equipment installed by the Texas Department of Criminal Justice at its Huntsville textile mill.

Savings of more than \$1 million a year are expected from a 20 percent reduction in cotton purchases as the textile mill blends 20-25 percent reclaimed fibers with new fibers to make cloth for inmate clothing and guard uniforms.

That gives Texas Department of Criminal Justice a payback in less than a year on the \$600,000 worth of recycling equipment bought with state bond money.

The prisons produce more than a million pounds of fabric wastes a year.

"This is good business, good management and good environmental sense," TDCJ board chairman Allan Polunsky of San Antonio said. "It is a part of our constant effort to control and hold down the cost of the prison system."

Prison officials expressed appreciation to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission for assistance in putting the new equipment into operation, the first of its kind in Texas.

The Huntsville textile mill uses 7,500 bales of cotton a year, half of it produced on Texas prison farms and the rest bought on the open market to supply eight prison garment factories.

The 3,500 bales of cotton produced by TDCJ's agriculture division with inmate labor last year on 4,800 acres of prison farm land had a market value of \$1.4 million.

The recycling equipment will further cut TDCJ's cost if cotton prices climb as they have in the past, according to Tony D' Cunha, assistant division manager of TDCJ's textile operations.

Embry goes route in key district win

Obviously shaking off more signs than he had pitches, John Embry laughed as he stepped off the rubber with one out in the seventh inning.

Returning to the rubber, Embry calmly recorded the final two outs as Muleshoe High School kept its state-playoff hopes alive Saturday with a 5-4 win over Dimmitt at the city ballpark.

With a win Tuesday at Littlefield, Muleshoe would finish second in District 2-3A and qualify for the state playoffs for the fourth-straight year. MHS and Littlefield, which beat Friona 10-8 Saturday in 10 innings, are tied for second at 4-5.

Floydada (7-2) clinched the district title Saturday with an 11-3 win at Shallowater.

It's been a season of few smiles for Embry, a three-year starter expected to anchor the Mules' pitching staff his senior year.

Shoulder problems limited Embry to three starts and 20 1/3 innings this season. He was also suspended twice for a total of five games for breaking team rules.

"It's been a rough season for me," Embry said. "Not being able to go to the playoffs would

have ended the season on a sour note. And there have already been too many sour notes."

Edward Olivas scored the winning run in the bottom of the sixth inning on a two-out single by Alfredo Gonzales.

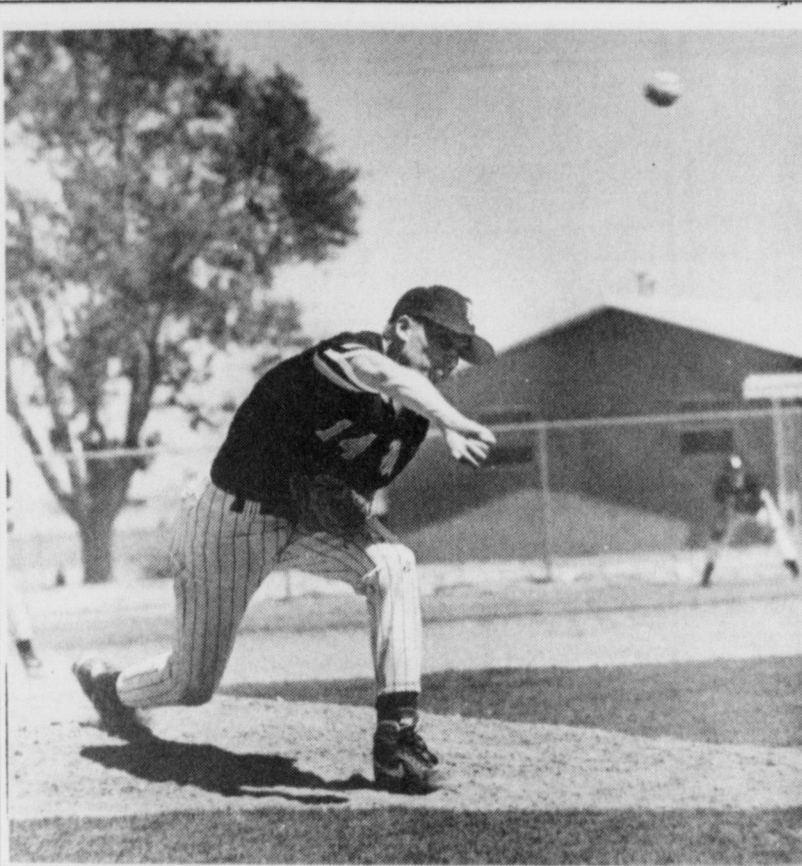
Olivas started the inning with a bunt single and continued to second when losing pitcher Zack Matthews threw wild to first after fielding the bunt. Olivas was sacrificed to third, and scored when Gonzales' soft liner tipped off the glove of leaping second baseman Conrado Saucedo.

Dimmitt (12-13, 3-6) had tied the score at 4-4 with one out in the top of the sixth on Ramiro Garcia's hit-and-run single with runners on first and third. Embry escaped further damage by striking out leadoff hitter Dwayne Espinosa and getting Matthews to pop up to short.

Embry (1-2) went the distance against a Dimmitt team that featured three .400 hitters, scattering nine hits while striking out nine and walking two.

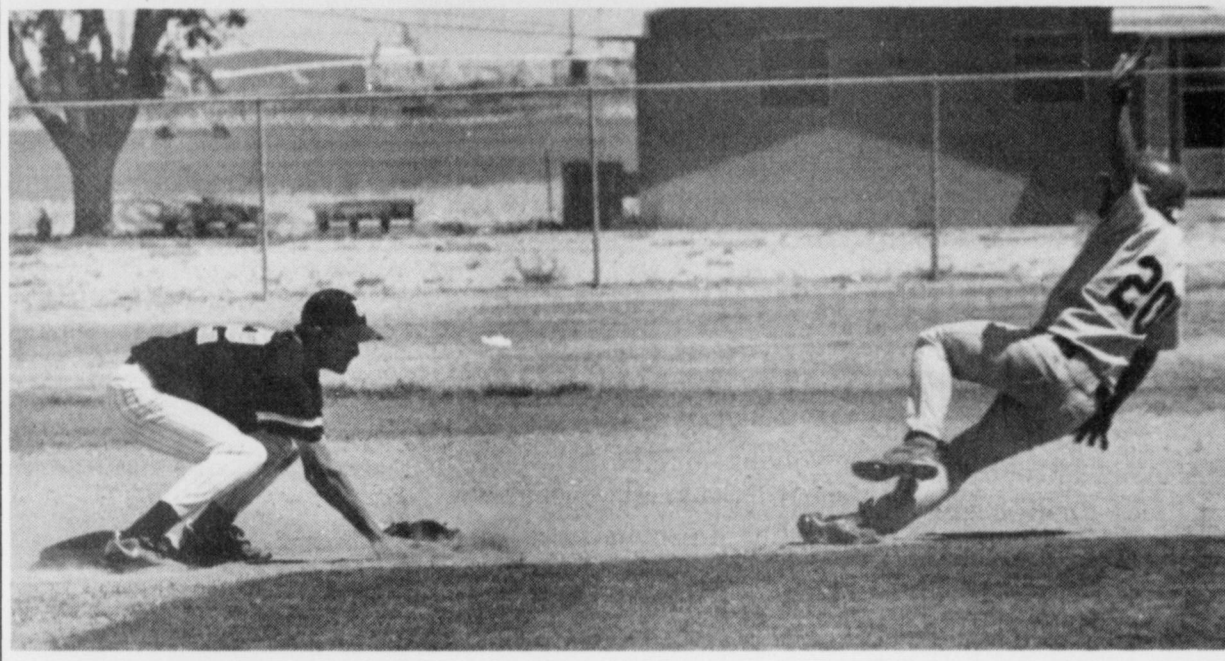
"I'm proud of being able to finish the game," said Embry, 9-2 last year. "It was my first complete (seven-inning) game."

Muleshoe (12-13) continued its offensive upsurge, banging out 12 hits, including

Holmans, who will major in Physical Education at WBU, is also an excellent student.

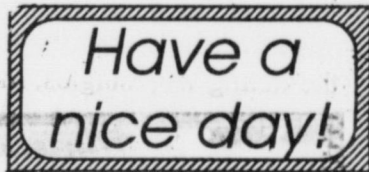
"We are excited to have a student of her caliber in our program. She brings in a 3.94 G.P.A. from junior college," Estes said.

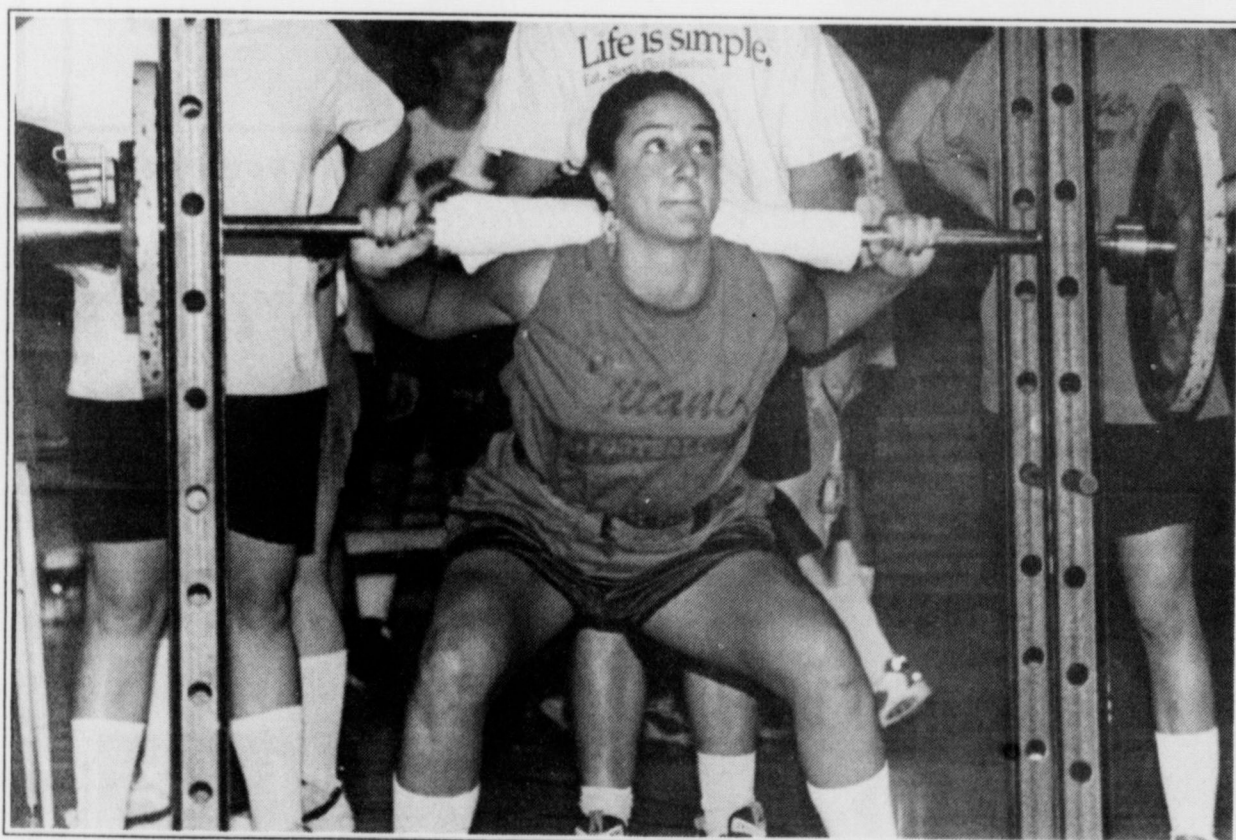

finished with a two-hitter, striking out six and walking three.

Embry gave up a two-out double to Carr in the seventh, which brought out Hill for a quick chat. Carr tomahawk a two-strike fastball into right center.

Faver advanced to second on Embry's wild pickoff attempt, and moved to third on a passed ball, still with nobody out. Embry then walked cleanup hitter Kyle Brown. Faver stole home when Brown purposely got in a rundown between first and second.

The bands were directed by Martha Anthis and Rob Levett.



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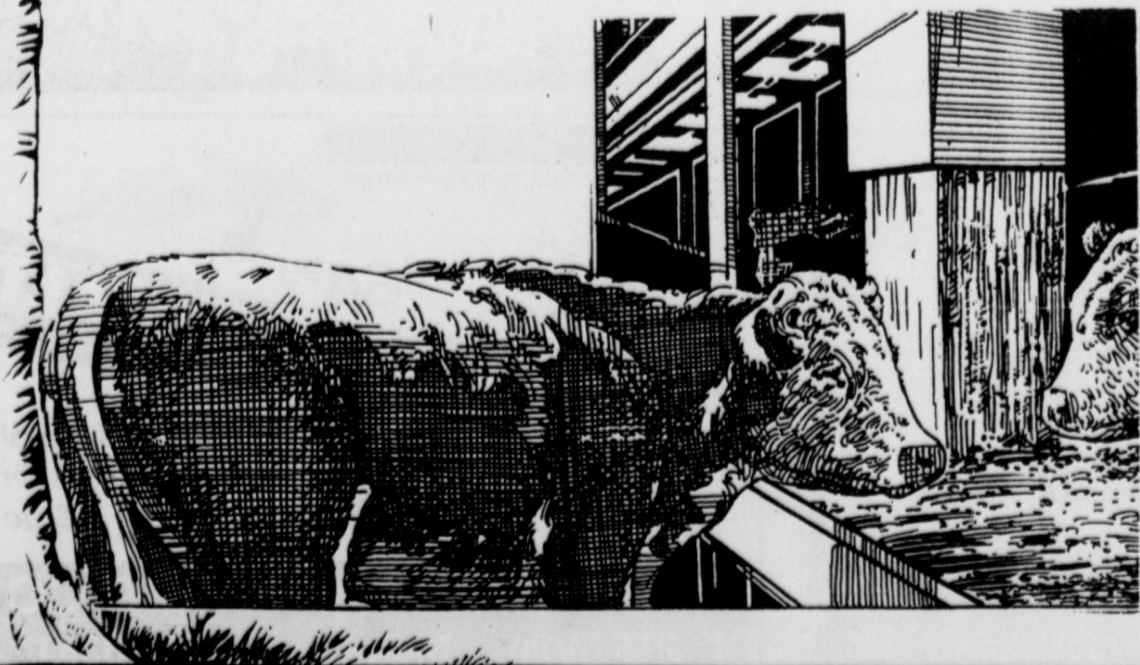
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

The band received a rating of II for concert and sightreading from a panel of three judges.

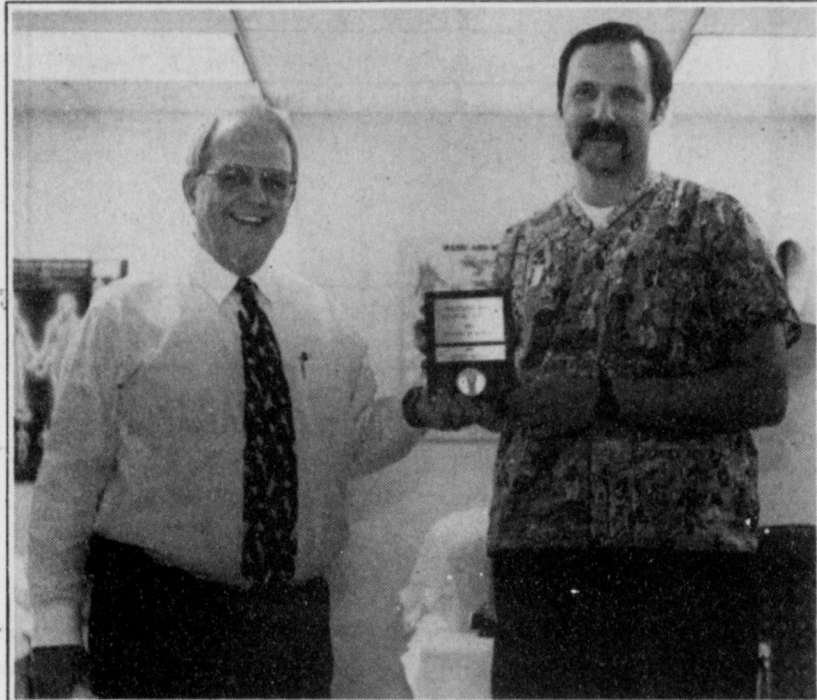
The bands are rated on a

About Special Education?”

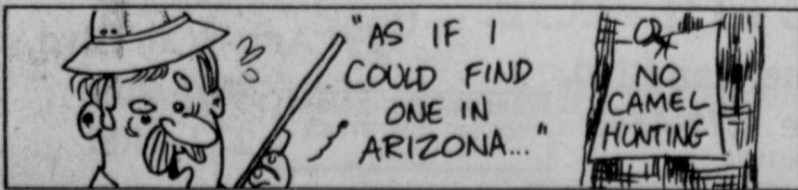

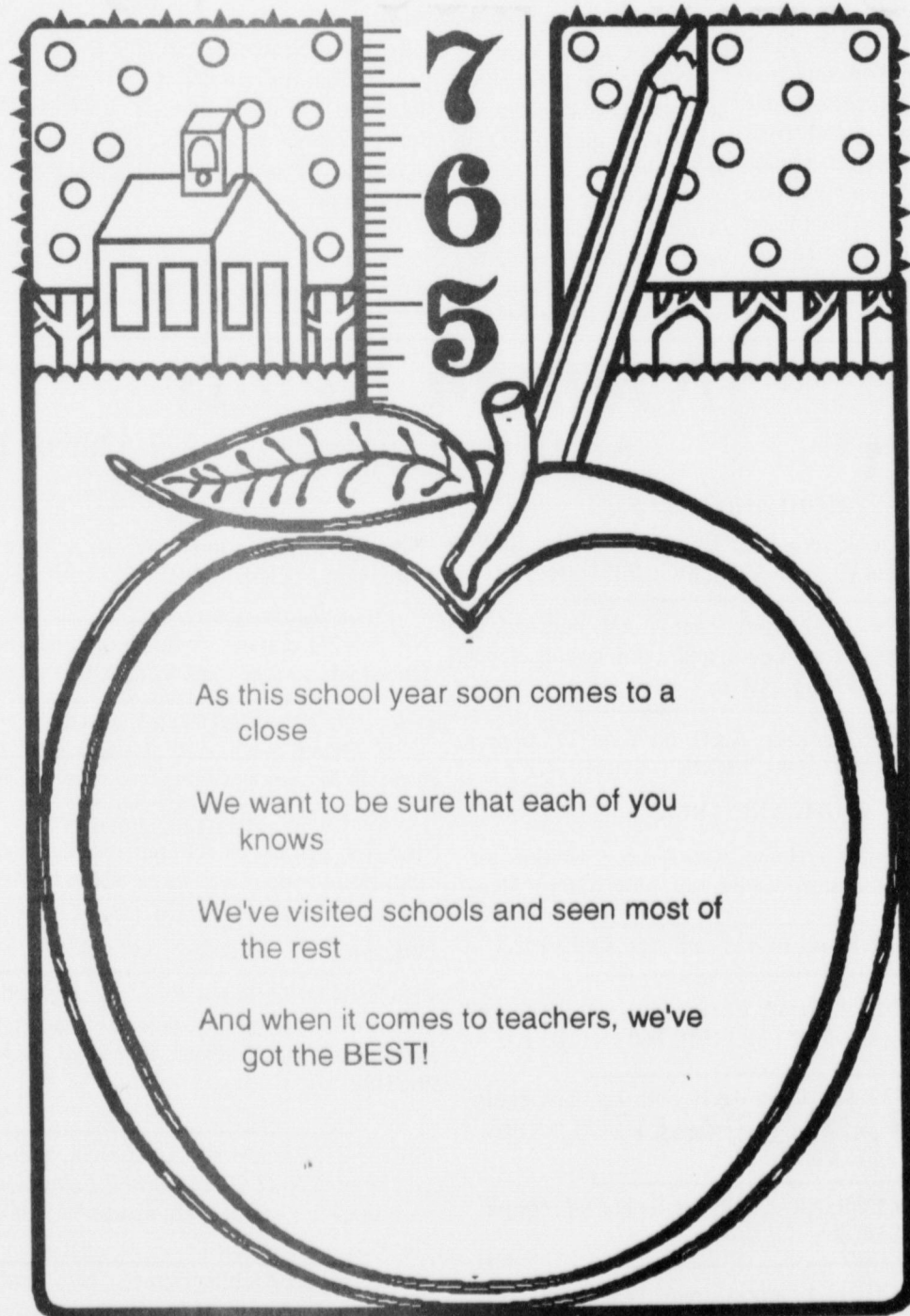
