And of course, the ones he referred to were Joel Morris and David McDaniel.

And the mention of David brings something else to mind that might be mentioned in passing. He is older, of course, but due to a lack of boys his age in the neighborhood he has some-times played with the younger ones. He will probably never stand taller in my sight than he did one day some time ago when several of the boys were in our yard playing. I was inside the house but the window was open and I became aware of a scattering of "dirty mouth" from one of them. I was trying to decide how to handle the situation when David jumped to his feet, addressed the guilty party, and delivered a lecture to the effect that he should not take the name of the Lord in vain again. 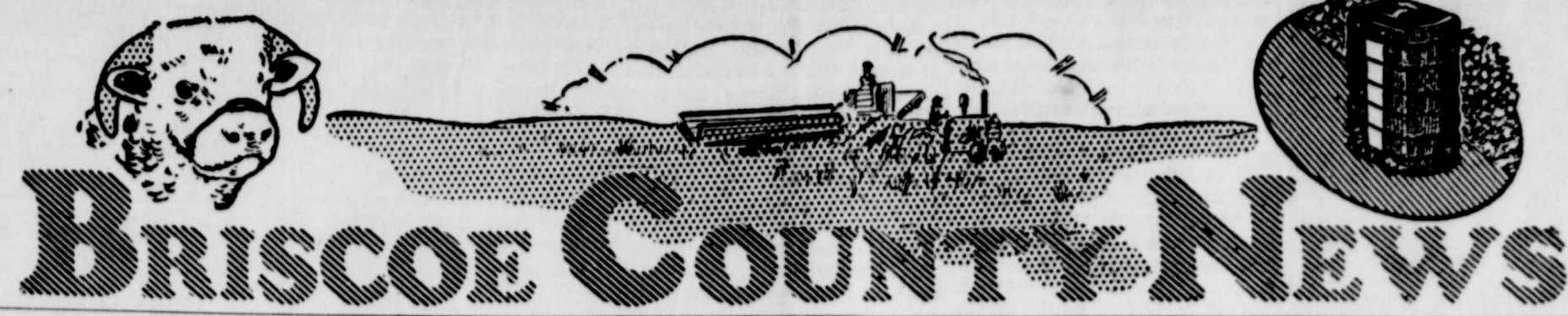
Mrs. Baker Buried At Lockney

A native of Seminole, he received a B. S. degree in animal science in May 1964, from East Texas State University and was awarded the M. S. degree there in May 1965, in the same field.

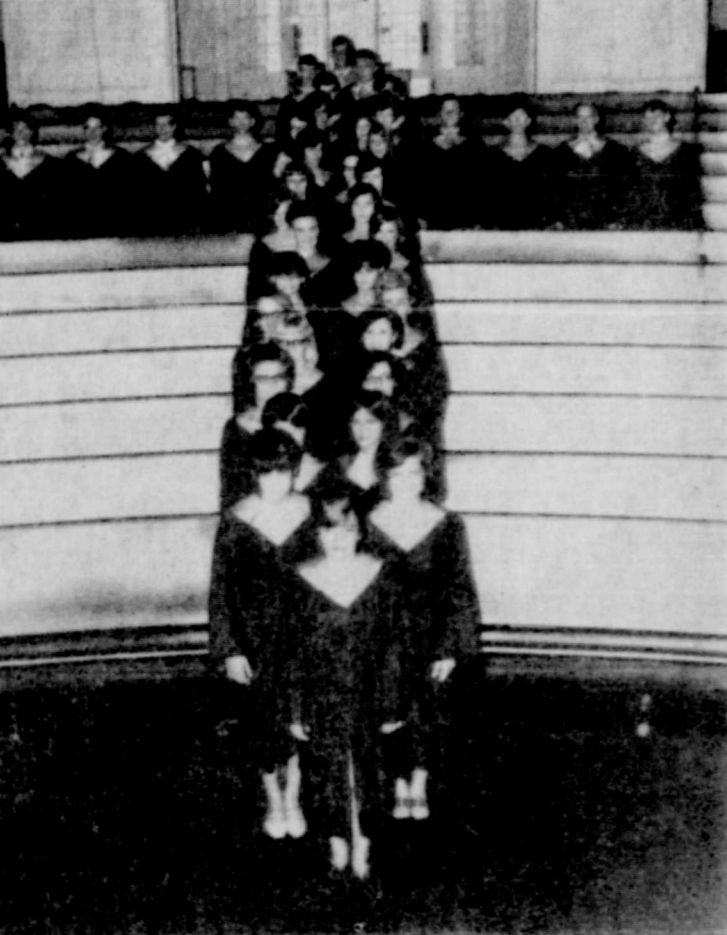
Cook has served as assistant county agent in Lubbock County for the past two years.
