Mr. Boling was baptized into the Church of Christ in his early teens, and was a member of the Silverton Church of Christ at the time of his death.

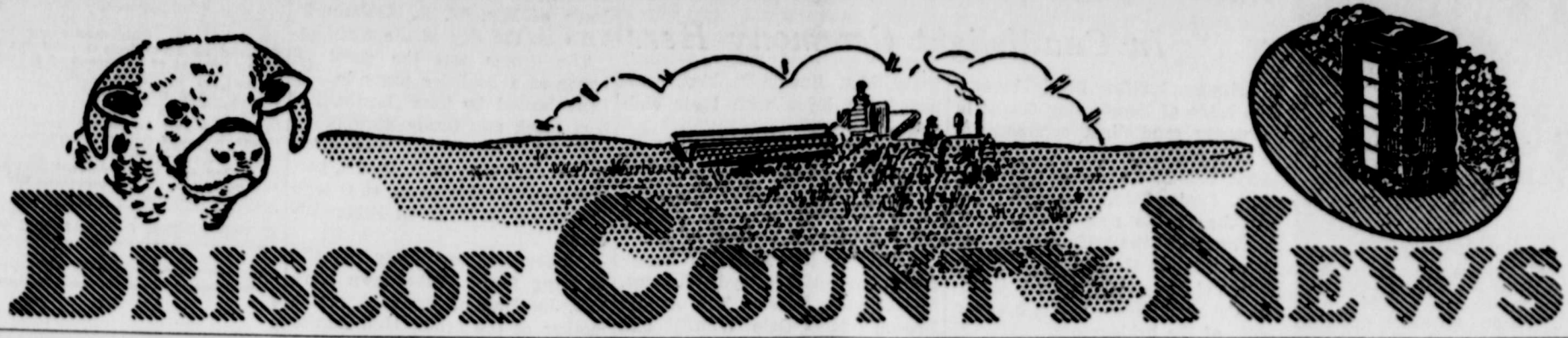

From The County Agent's Desk

Dead needles and limbs now showing up in evergreens may be the result of winter and/or drought injury, says County Agent Ken Cook.

A common damage observed this spring has been from freeze injury to new growth. Periods of warm weather followed by cold weather and late freeze has caused browning and death of new growth. This will set plant growth back some but will not permanently harm established evergreens, advises the county agent.

Though evergreens are dormant during the winter months, they are still alive and continue to lose water from the foliage. Rapid changes in temperature plus drying winds and full sunlight can result in water loss from plants faster than it can be replaced by the roots. This is especially likely under drought conditions and it was dry last winter,

The International truck was purchased the following morning at a cost of \$3,000, and the pump and tank will cost \$1,500, according to Silverton Mayor Jimmie House.

Quitaque Man Has Surgery Following Freak Accident

A 36-year-old Quitaque man has undergone open heart surgery in a Dallas hospital following a freak accident at his home June 13.

Ray Doyle Ramsey, manager of a Quitaque farm supply, is said to be out of danger. A power mower flung a 1 1/2" long piece of baling wire into his heart while he was mowing the lawn at his home.

Ramsey, father of two, was taken to Lockney Hospital for emergency treatment before being transferred to Lubbock, where he underwent emergency surgery to remove pressure from internal bleeding.

The rotary mower blade picked up a piece of baling wire, wrapping more than a foot of it around the blade and apparently shearing off the small length and propelling it into Ramsey's chest.

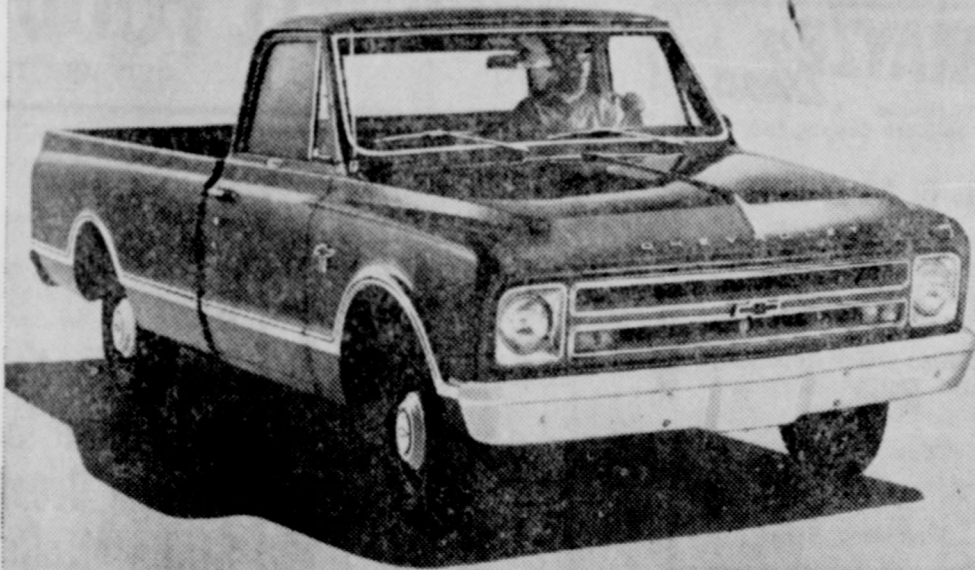

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Home Notes

Permanent press garments look their best when dried in a dryer and should be removed immediately at the end of the drying cycle. If they remain in the dryer and become wrinkled, simply reset it for 10 or 15 minutes longer. Remove from the dryer, place on hangers, and don't worry about ironing.

Home-canned vegetables should be brought to a rolling boil for ten minutes when cooked, according to nutrition specialists. This will destroy botulism bacteria which may be present in home-canned foods.

Take precautions when washing fiberglass curtains in the washer. Articles washed next in the machine will pick up the glass particles left behind from the fiberglass fabric. The particles are so tiny they can't be removed. When the articles come in contact with the skin, the small fragments of glass will work into the skin and are impossible to be located even by a doctor.

To pack shoe polish for travel, wrap in plastic or enclose in a small plastic bag. Be sure the cap is tight. Heat and pressure can cause leaking of even the tightest packages.

Adding fertilizer to soil without having a soil sample analyzed is like prescribing medicine for a sick man without first determining his illness. Many farmers, ranchers and home gardeners in Briscoe County have come to realize the importance of using fertilizer to replace nutrients in depleted soil or to build up initially poor soil. An increasing number are realizing that soil testing, the analyzing of soil samples, will help them make a wiser choice in the type and amount of fertilizer.

This practice also will prevent wasting time and money, according to Kenneth Cook, County Agent.
