### Eddleman Home Robbed Again

The Randall Eddleman home on Highway 286 northwest of Silvertown was burglarized Thursday evening for the second time this year while the family attended the barbecue and rodeo in town.

Taken were their black and white television set, a radio, iron, typewriter, vacuum cleaner, bedspreads, meat out of the freezer in the refrigerator, wrenches and a case of oil out of the pickup.

Similarities between the two robberies were that in both cases the bedspreads were taken off the beds and in both cases the picture of Blaine Eddleman was removed from the top of the TV and set on the floor.

In the first burglary, the thieves took the family's color television and apparently took the bedspread to wrap it in. At that time, they did not take the old black and white set—the one stolen Thursday—which was in another part of the house, having being kept when the new set was purchased.

Last week, the thieves made themselves at home for a while, and completely ransacked the house, pulling things out of drawers and closets. The vacuum cleaner was taken out of a closet, and the typewriter was discovered on top of a high cabinet.

### Long-Time Residents Attend Anniversary Events Here Last Week

Sixty persons, many of whom were born here, all of whom came to Briscoe County at least fifty years ago, registered during the 75th Anniversary celebration held in Silvertown last week.

Not all of those registering have lived here continuously since the dates listed, but Fulton Gregg, who came to the Quitaque area in 1890, and Cass McClendon Fowler, who was born in the Silvertown townsection area in 1892, were declared to be the citizens present at the barbecue who had lived in Briscoe County for the longest continuous period. Both have lived almost their entire lives in this county, and they now reside within two blocks of one another in Silvertown.

### Boys Ranch Rodeo Is September 3-4

The 348 boys at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch are expecting a new attendance record to be set at their 23rd annual rodeo this year, and additional seats have been installed to accommodate the crowds over the Labor Day Weekend.

Last year, nearly 9,000 attended the two-day event, and an additional 500 seats have been erected at the north end of the rodeo arena. Dates for the rodeo are Sunday, September 3, and Monday, September 4, at 2:30 p.m.

All of the 348 boys will have a part in the rodeo with nearly 100 riding for awards and honors. Ranchers who do not ride will be serving as ushers, helping in the parking area, working at concession stands, or helping around the chutes.

Giant-size barbecue beef sandwiches will be prepared and served by Ranchers who are learning meat cutting and cooking as their vocation.

The climax of the rodeo, the largest Labor Day event in the Texas Panhandle, will be the naming of the Junior and Senior All-Around Cowboys, two of the highest honors that can be earned by the boys. Professional rodeo stock will be used in the bull riding and bare-back bronc events, and a special stick-horse race will be featured for the four- to six-year-olds.

Tickets for either performance are available in advance from the Boys Ranch office, Box 1890, Amarillo. Reserved box seats are \$2.50, general admission is \$1.50, and servicemen's and children's tickets are 75c. All proceeds will be used for future expansion of the Ranch.

### Barley Not In New Diversion Program

Barley will not be in the feed grain diversion program next season. Consequently no diversion from the barley base acreage will be required of wheat producers requesting the establishment of a barley base for the purpose of growing wheat on such acreage.

All barley producers will be eligible for barley price support regardless of acreage planted, however. The level of loan pre-support will be announced later.

Major operating provisions of the 1968 wheat program were announced in July. The barley provisions are being made known at this time so winter wheat producers can have ample time to make cropping plans. About half of the U. S. barley acreage is fall-seeded. Use of the substitution provisions between barley and wheat cropland will result in increased flexibility for grain growers.

Producers requesting establishment of a barley base (or an oats/rye base as previously announced for the wheat program) will need to participate in the 1968 feed grain program if there is a corn or a sorghum base established for the farm.

### Seven Injured In Two-Car Accident East Of Silvertown Sunday

Eight persons were involved in a two-car collision three miles east of Silvertown at 2:05 p.m. Sunday.

Louis Griffin, 49, of Lubbock was driving east on Highway 86 and was turning onto Highway 256 at the Y-intersection enroute to Shamrock when his car was involved in a collision with five Friona teenagers who were traveling west on Highway 86.

Passengers in the Griffin car were his mother-in-law, Mrs. Valje Whitehead, 74, of Slaton, and his daughter, Lesa Griffin, 9. Both Griffin and Mrs. Whitehead are listed in fair condition at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock where they were transferred after receiving first-aid at nearby hospitals. Mrs. Whitehead underwent surgery Sunday night. Lesa Griffin escaped without serious injury.

Briscoe County Sheriff Vinson Smith said that it was impossible to determine which of the boys was driving the Friona car at the scene of the accident, but it was later determined that it was being driven by Gary Murphee, 19. He and a friend, Johnny Marrs, 19, were critically injured, and were transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, where they remain in critical condition in the intensive care unit. Charlie Bishop, 18, was reported to be in satisfactory condition in Lockney General Hospital. The other two Friona boys, Mike Reithmayor, 18, and Eddie Barker, 17, were treated at Swisher Memorial Hospital and released.

The Friona boys were returning home after attending the Greenbelt Bowl game at Childress Saturday night. Another car, in which friends and relatives of the teenagers were traveling, was a short distance behind them.

Ambulances from Quitaque and Silvertown answered the call to take the injured to hospitals in Tulsa and Lockney.

### Emergency Loans Available In Swisher County

Swisher County has been designated eligible for Emergency Loans, according to Donald B. Cruce, County Supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration in Tulsa.

Any established farmer or rancher in a designated area is eligible if he (1) is a citizen of the United States, (2) is unable to obtain from other lenders the credit required to continue his normal operations, (3) has reasonable prospects for success with the assistance of a loan, and (4) possesses the legal capacity to contract for the loan.

Loans may be made for the purchase of feed, seed, fertilizer, replacement equipment and livestock; for other essential farm and home operating expenses; and for the replacement or repair of buildings or fences on individual farms that were damaged or destroyed by disaster.

### From The County Agent's Desk

The Briscoe County 4-H club members are to be commended for their efforts in the parade at this year's rodeo. Their float was original as well as being appropriate at the time.

Briscoe County cattle producers, due to the current grazing conditions, are advised to check the diets of livestock on pasture to make sure they are getting a sufficient supply of minerals.

Minerals are not "cure-alls," but are essential along with proteins, carbohydrates, fats and vitamins for good animal nutrition.

Cattle in Texas under normal grazing conditions require sodium, calcium, phosphorus, chlorine and additional trace minerals. Trace minerals are supplied in adequate amounts from natural forage and water.

Sodium and chlorine are obtained from ordinary salt. Cattle should have free access to salt, preferably granular, at all times.

Calcium and phosphorus are obtained in natural conditions from green grazing foliage. However, such forages are often deficient and must be supplemented.

Phosphorus is usually more deficient than calcium in most regions of Texas, and results in loss of appetite and weight, decline in milk production, poor calf crop and failure to breed. Prolonged phosphorus deficiency causes the cows to become lame and stiff in the joints.

Should this condition occur, you may add phosphorus directly to the drinking water.

The time is once again approaching to consider plans for fertilizing wheat to be planted this fall.

Since most soils vary in their ability to supply plant nutrients, the most logical starting point for determining fertilizer needs is the soil test.

By sampling early, the report will be received in time for making the final decision as to what kind and how much fertilizer to apply.

Nitrogen is the fertilizer element likely to be in shortest supply. Organic matter as measured by soil tests is one of the guides for determining how much nitrogen will be needed. However, such factors as the amount and stage of decomposition of previous crop residue, physical condition of the

soil, ability to irrigate adequately and intended grazing practices will all influence the nitrogen need of the crop.

Data at the South Plains Research and Extension Center clearly indicates that where wheat is grown on Pullman soils for grain only, the time of nitrogen applications is of little importance. However, when wheat is to be grazed, all or part of the nitrogen should be applied preplant to stimulate early growth. Adequately fertilized wheat forage can contain 20 per cent protein or 3 per cent nitrogen on a dry basis.

Insufficient phosphorus can also limit wheat production. Profitable response has long been evident on many of the sandy and mixed land soils. Yield increases have also been noted on Pullman soils shown to be deficient by soil testing.

Since phosphorus does not move appreciably with soil moisture, it must be placed in the soil where it will be within reach of the permanent roots. Therefore, preplant application is recommended. Wheat plants utilize much of the phosphorus when they are young.

All wheat growers are urged to send in soil samples as soon as possible. Complete information on sample collection and mailing is available at the County Agent's office.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor, for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired term of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half per cent (4 1/2%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price therefor, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing hereof shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys so attributable shall include but shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with such proceeds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys attributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds to comply with his bid and accept and pay for such bonds or for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any lands comprising a part of said Fund to comply with his bid and accept and pay for any such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys. The principal and interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund hereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor, for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired term of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half per cent (4 1/2%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price therefor, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing hereof shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys so attributable shall include but shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with such proceeds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys attributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds to comply with his bid and accept and pay for such bonds or for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any lands comprising a part of said Fund to comply with his bid and accept and pay for any such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys. The principal and interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund hereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

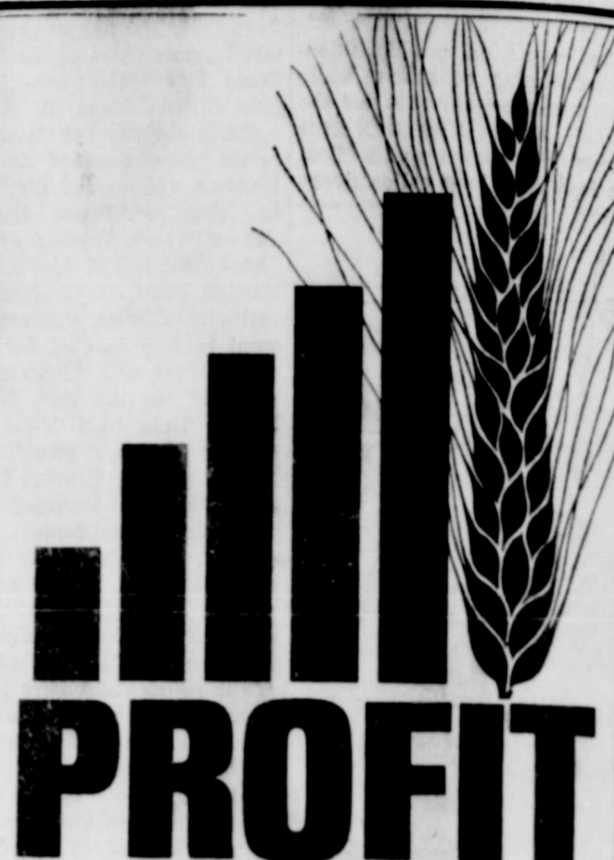
