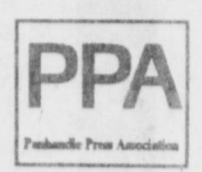

Three local graduations May 23-24

Seniors from three area high schools will be graduating May 23-24.

Muleshoe High School will hold commencement exercises 7 p.m. Thursday in the Bailey County Civic Center. Despite the large number of graduates, seating is unlimited. Doors will open at 6:30.

Stacy Connor, pastor of First Baptist Church of Muleshoe, is the featured speaker.

Eight Three Way High School seniors will graduate at 7 p.m. Friday in the high school cafeteria. Don Parker, retired Three Way superintendent, is the guest speaker. Seating is unlimited.

Twenty-six Lazbuddie seniors will graduate at 8 p.m. Friday in the Lazbuddie auditorium. Jim Watson, pastor of First Baptist Church in Lazbuddie, is the featured speaker.

Texas House Speaker Pete Laney will also be present to present the Innovative Public School Award to Lazbuddie High School. The award will be presented to recognize

Council rejects Keepers of Legend funding proposal

Silence echoed in the City Council chambers Tuesday as Muleshoe Mayor Robert Montgomery asked councilmen to second a motion to approve the funding of \$10,000 toward a Mule-Plex Productions sound system.

The motion died for lack of a second among the other four council members.

The funding, which would come from the City Hotel/Motel Tax fund, would be for a sound system used primarily by the "Keepers of the Legend" production.

The proposal, submitted by "Keepers of the Legend" producer Alan Finney, asked the city council for \$10,000 toward a new state-of-the-art sound system. The total price of the system was \$20,000, with Mule-Plex and the Commission of the Arts contributing \$5,000 each.

Finney assured council members that the system would be self-contained, mobile, easy

to use, and would be housed in the Bailey County Civic Center, where it could be accessed by all non-profit organizations.

Several councilmen expressed appreciation for the production, and stressed that it enhances the quality of life in Muleshoe. However, they also expressed concern over funding for the sound system.

Councilman Cliff Black discussed the recent purchase of portable bleachers for \$8,000 that would be used by the "Keepers of the Legend" production as well as other organizations in the community. Black said that city funds are limited, and should be utilized for the good of the whole community. He added that he felt the city had made its commitment for the year in the purchase of the bleachers, and thought the proposal should be re-considered next year.

The motion had been tabled at a May 13 meeting, after council members expressed

More than 200 students received recognition Monday during Muleshoe High School's annual awards program at the high school auditorium.

The awards ranged from excellence in one subject to overall academic excellence, from being friendliest to showing the perseverance to stay in school.

Administrators and teachers handed out the respective awards.

Caswell, Hutton, Puckett and Stewart also received the University Interscholastic League Award, given to seniors in the top 10% of their class and have participated in at least one UIL activity.

Seniors Alfredo Gonzales and Michelle Williams were named Mr. and Miss MHS. Juniors Cari Faver and Jarrod Redwine were selected friendliest students.

Hutton received the Academic Athlete Award for displaying leadership qualities coupled with academic excellence.

Stewart and Heather Hooten were named Best Girl Citizens and Redwine was named Best Boy Citizen.

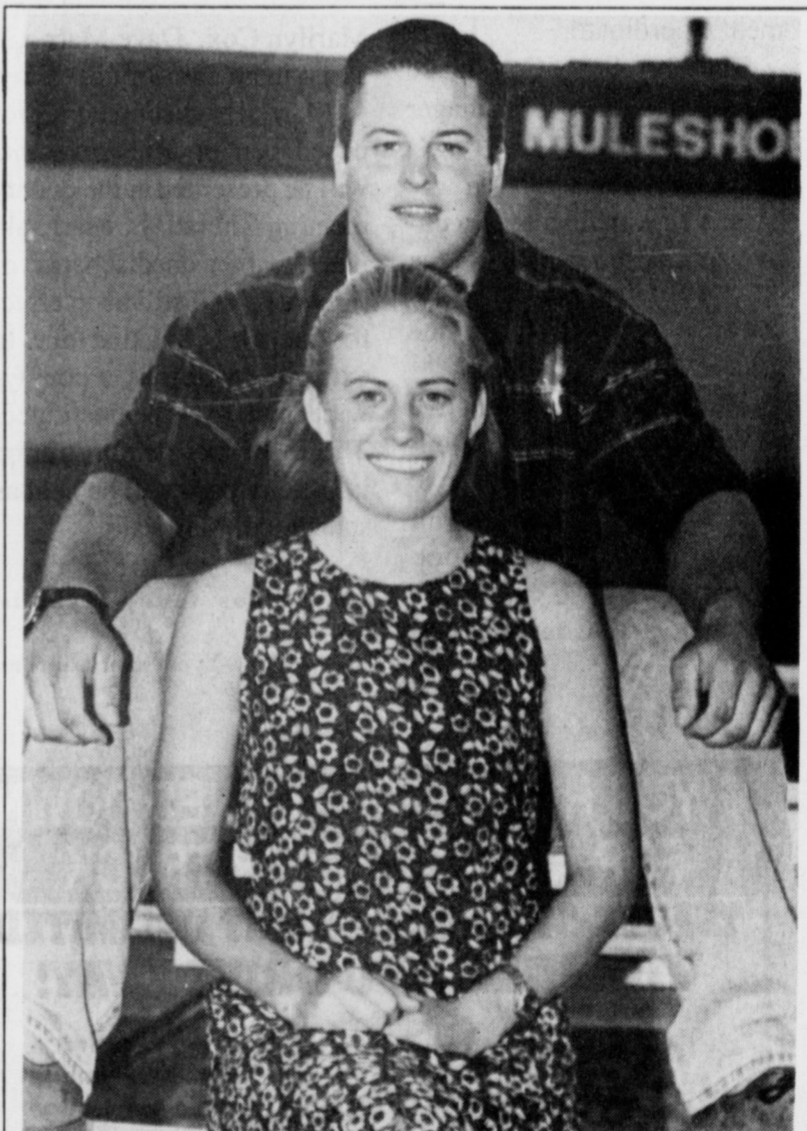

South Plains College to host Junior High band camp

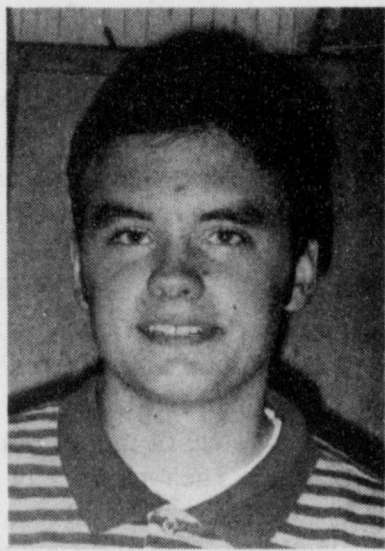

concern about Finney and writer of the play, Paula Paul, receiving ten percent of the gate generated by the production.

Montgomery, the only council member in favor of the motion, expressed disappointment that the proposal did not win the approval of the other members. Montgomery said he felt the city has the resources to fund a project that greatly benefits the community.

According to City Manager Dave Marr, the Hotel/Motel Tax Fund has a balance of \$42,595.

"The funds are there to do it," Montgomery said. "I am remorseful that it did not pass, but I am a team player," he said in a phone interview.

The Hotel/Motel tax generates approximately \$30,000 per year.

In other business, council members heard a proposal from Chamber of Commerce President J.B. Douglas, to create a joint Chamber of Commerce Manager/Economic Develop-

ment Coordinator.

The Chamber of Commerce has been without a manager since June 1995.

An unopposed motion was passed to establish an executive committee to develop the criteria for the position and to continue consideration of the proposal.

Members of the executive committee will include Douglas, Montgomery, Economic Development Chairman Phil Kent, Industrial Foundation representative Charles Bratcher, and County Judge

Marilyn Cox. Dave Marr will assist in an advisory capacity.

Marr also discussed a proposed ban on fireworks that will be presented at the county meeting Thursday. Marr said that the ban on discharge of fireworks will still be in effect for the city, but that due to extreme conditions, a county-wide ban may be instituted. The fireworks demonstration in the city park will be held as scheduled, Marr said.

Corn, cotton farmers ponder options on conservation acres

LUBBOCK—An early termination program for farm acreage enrolled in the federal Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) is being offered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and is drawing keen interest across the state. Additional incentives included in the 1996 federal farm bill make it important that farmers look carefully at this "early out" option before May 31, say economists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The decision is especially critical for High Plains farmers who have in the CRP some 45,000 acres of land with a history of high yielding corn production, says Dr. Jackie Smith, professor and Extension Service agricultural economist.

"The most complicating factor in deciding whether to use the early out is uncertainty about the future of the CRP program," Smith said.

Producers who terminate their CRP contracts under this early out program can also sign up for and receive a transition payment under the 1996 Farm Bill, the extension economist noted. But to receive the transition payment for 1996, a producer must file by May 31 the request to terminate the CRP contract.

All landowners with a CRP contract that has a crop acreage base will be eligible to sign

a production flexibility contract and receive transition payments for 1996.

"This means that for 1996 only, those who request the early out by May 31 will, if approved for termination, receive most of their 1996 CRP payment as well as their transition payment under the new Farm Bill," Smith said.

"The incentive of receiving both payments makes it necessary to look carefully at the early out option before May

31."

To be eligible for the CRP early out option, the land must have been in the CRP for at least five years, have an erodibility index of 15 or less, and meet certain other requirements. County offices of the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service will determine which land qualifies. An application to terminate a CRP contract on eligible acres is filed at the local office of the USDA Farm Service Agency.

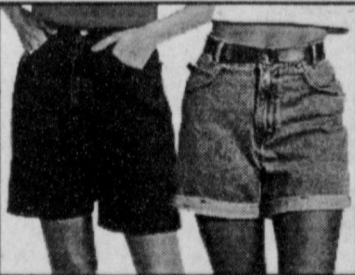

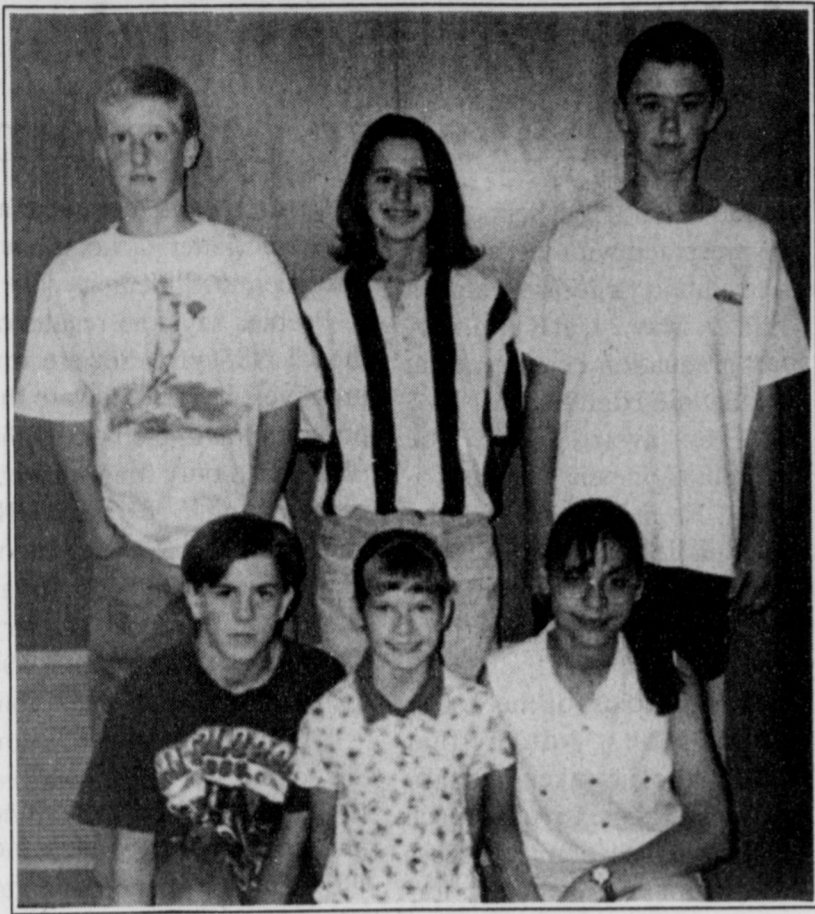

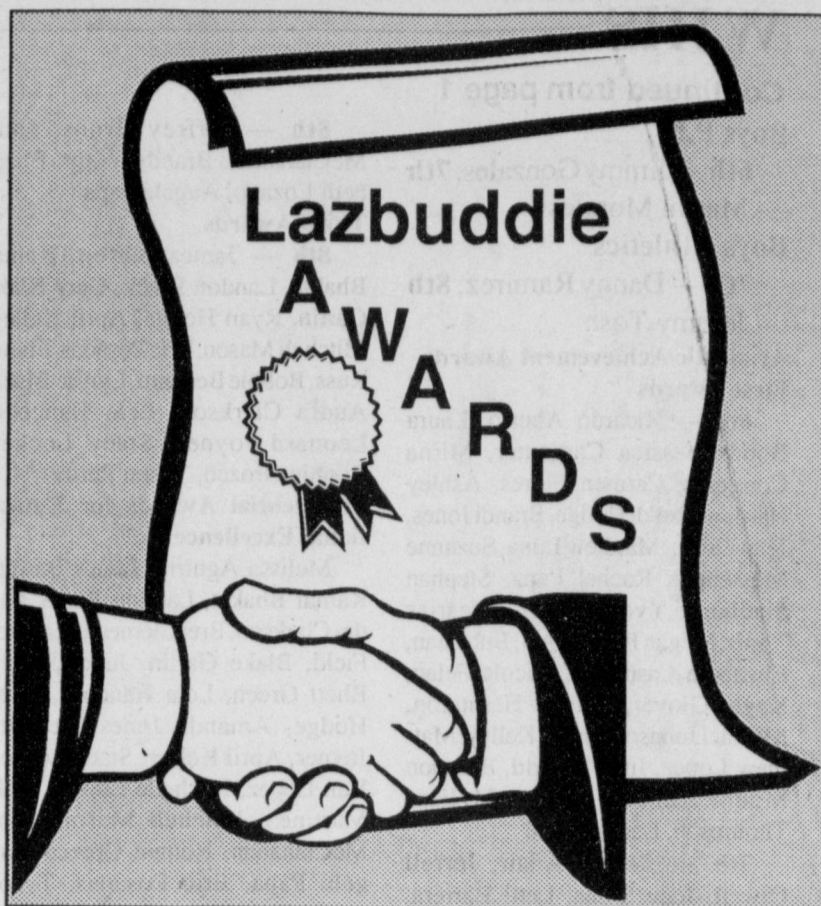

Lazbuddie High School will be presented with the Innovative Public School Award on Friday, May 24, at 8 p.m. during graduation ceremonies at Lazbuddie High School.

The award will be presented on behalf of the Today Foundation to the Lazbuddie Character, Leader, Attitude, Sportsmanship and Scholarship (CLASS) program.

Rob Peebles, of the Today Foundation, noted that Lazbuddie has taken an innovative and aggressive approach to making academic success the school's number one priority.

According to Peebles, the CLASS program has initiated junior high and senior high academic banquets, which recognize outstanding students and places them alongside outstanding athletes, while emphasizing to the athlete the importance of academic success. Students are invited to the banquets on the basis of grades.

Other incentives, such as academic letter jackets, have also been instituted.

Peebles says the results of the CLASS program are impressive. In 1990, before the program was implemented, the school had only four students participating in academic UIL competition. After one year of the program, the school was named the Regional Literary Champion, and by 1993 was the runner-up state champion.

As a result of the program, the school has been home to the state champion accounting and computer science teams the past three years. Calculus courses were offered for the first time last year, and students have earned more than \$165,000 in scholarships in the last two years, and \$127,000 this year alone.

Texas House Speaker Pete Laney will present the award to LISD. The Today Foundation is a Dallas-based organization concerned with crime, education, and tax policy.

Lazbuddie wins state accounting title 4th-straight time

For the fourth consecutive year, members of the computer science and accounting teams claimed top honors at the state level of the University Interscholastic League academic competition May 3 at the University of Texas in Austin.

Also attending the state competition was Julie

McDonald, who competed in ready writing. Julie was only the second from Lazbuddie to advance to state in ready writing. She was coached by Rebecca Williams. McDonald placed first at the district level

and claimed the third spot at regionals. She placed fifth in the state contest.

Lazbuddie High School placed fourth overall in the Class 1A division of the contest.

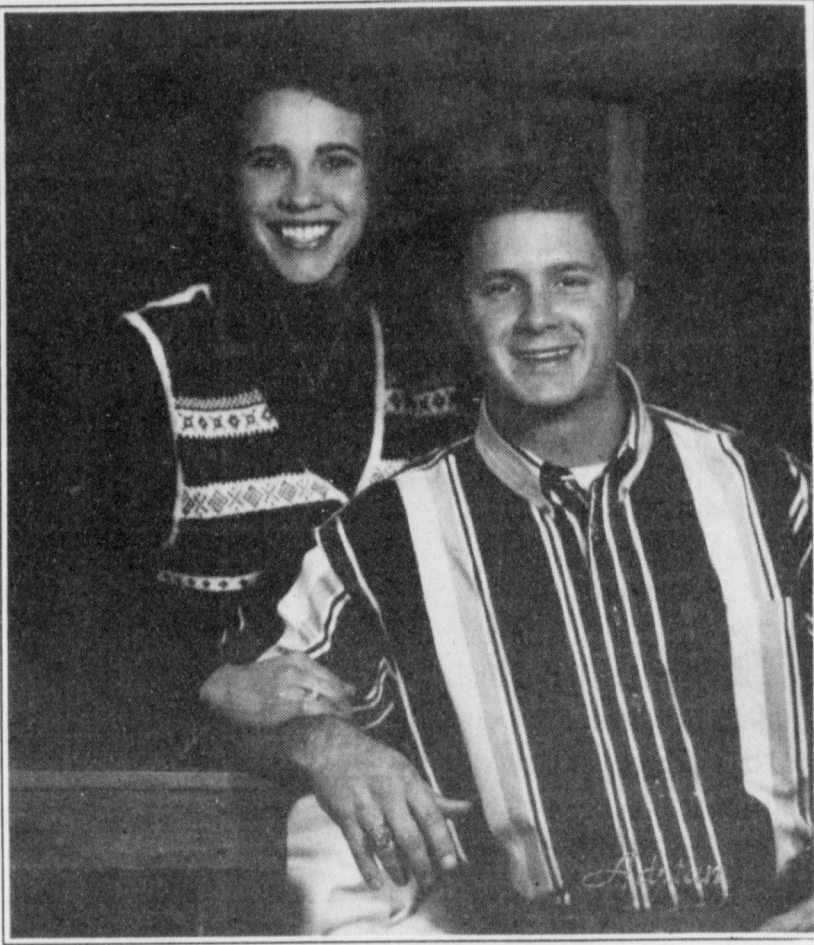
Molly Davis and Alma Robertson were chosen as captains for the point system contest. This contest gets underway at the next meeting.

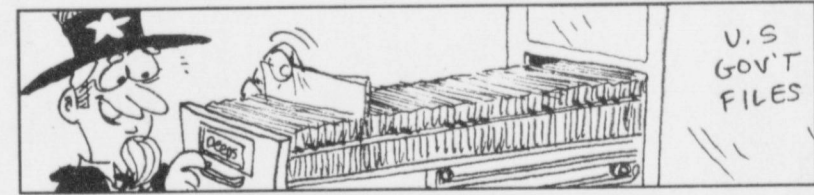

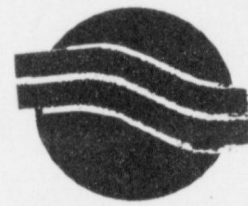


