Grain Sorghum Yield Sets New Record

Last week attention was focused on Briscoe County agriculture when grain sorghum harvested from a 23.76-acre plot for Oscar Weaks averaged 10,099 pounds per acre overall and more than 11,000 pounds on several acres in the field located three miles south and a half mile west of Rock Creek.

Weaks, who now lives in Tulia, discovered a yield of 19,260 pounds in a check harvest of 1.88 acres and estimated that the plot would average 11,000 pounds.

The crop was seeded on regular 40-inch beds with 10-inch row spacings. "After five days, we thought we had planted the seeds too dry and went back and seeded the furrows," Weaks said.

After "watering-up" the furrow plantings, the seeded beds began to grow, he added. "We knew in June we would have a high-yielding crop after the plants had reached uniform growth," he stated. The crop emerged in rows of about 13-inch spacings.

A pound and a half of propazine was applied pre-emergence for weed control and the crop was sprayed once for spider mites. This was the only machine work done until the harvest.

Weaks' yield on the plot topped last year's area record yield of 9,521 pounds per acre by Billy Lytal of Dimmitt. Lytal's top yield came on a test plot drilled on eight-inch rows using eighteen pounds of DeKalb 45 seed per acre.

The high yield was attributed to several conditions. "The ground was in good shape following a poor cotton crop," Weaks explained. "We used good seed and had timely summer showers. We pre-watered, watered the plants up and applied three additional waterings. This could explain the yield differences."

The former Briscoe County resident praised an employee, Melvin Williams, "who did a good job taking care of the crop." A farmer in this area since 1945, Weaks estimated that he would average 8,600 pounds of sorghum per acre on the 154-acre he farms south of Rock Creek.

Though the record yield may be due in part to accidents, Weaks indicated that he would try the same type of plantings next year. "Next time it won't be by accident," he said.

Owls Host McLean, Crown Football Queen

The Owls will host the McLean Tigers Friday night in the second conference game of the season.

The team needs the support of as many fans as will brave the wintry night to cheer them on. They do not need those who voice criticisms of the team and/or coaches, because the Owls have troubles enough without this. We thought at one time that Silverton supported a losing team better than could be hoped for, but when you compare last week's gathering with the crowd of wet and muddy fans who sat in the stands during the Kress game, it is pretty sad.

Some fans haven't been seen at the games since the first loss. Apparently they suffer the same defeatist attitude that could be plaguing the team now.

Coach Richard Eddleman's Tigers from Groom invaded Owl Field last week with a strong desire to win a ballgame after having been winless all season in spite of playing several close games against teams in higher classifications.

The Groom team was fired up and ready to play ball, and their fans were likewise ready to cheer them to victory. There was quite a lot of "Happy beat them bad, and we beat Happy" attitude on the Silverton side of the field and this might have carried over into the attitude of the team, lowering spirit enough to set them up for a loss—a big one—30-14.

The Owls looked good at times during the game—they held the Groom eleven on their own six-yard line in the first quarter, halting a drive that anyone might have expected to result in a score. Though the offense was having troubles, they held a scoreless quarter—and they looked good.

In the second quarter, the Tigers opened the scoring when Denny Babcock, an offensive standout, carried the touchdown from the Owl three-yard line and also carried the P.A.T.

The Owl pass defense, which had looked better this year than in previous seasons, was one of the deciding factors in the ballgame. The second Groom tally came after a long third-down and four pass set the stage inside the Silverton-10. The Owl defense held

and held, but on fourth down, a quarterback sneak picked up that one foot they needed for a score. The conversion pass failed.

The Owls bounced right back, and scored on a pass from Lannie Arnold to Lynn Frizzell. Arnold had made a nice run-back to near mid-field on the after-TD kickoff, and Bill Strange got most of the remaining distance on three big carries and assistance from Cletus Grady, jr. and Tim Mattheus.

The pass-play covered 24 yards and Strange carried the conversion.

When the Owls kicked off to Groom, they proved they were in strong contention by holding the Tiger offense. On fourth down, they punted, and Arnold carried 76 yards for another score with 16 seconds remaining in the first half. The try for extra points failed, and the halftime score was tied 14-14.

In the third period, the Owl defense made trouble for the Tigers, and when they punted to the Owls on fourth down, Silverton fumbled, Groom recovered on the Silverton-30, and on the next play, Groom passed for the six pointer and ran for the P.A.T. to lead 22-14—still not bad, not insurmountable.

BUT, the fact remains that a long about this time, the Owl offense stalled out. The Owls ran only about 18 plays following this score by Groom, and didn't score another first down until the final seconds of the game. Groom scored only once more—in the fourth quarter on a six-yard pass play and added the conversion with another pass.

Quarterback Arnold was injured about the same time as the Owl problems began compounding, and though he is expected to be able to play this week, he was retained on the bench for most of the fourth quarter, and the Owls weren't quite prepared for this situation even though Roy Dale Wood and Mike Tate alternated at calling signals and were getting into the stride of things before the game ended.

Groom gained 124 yards on passes, about 100 yards of which was in the second half, completing seven out of ten passes with little defensive maneuvering on the part of the Owls. Silverton completed one pass of nine for 24

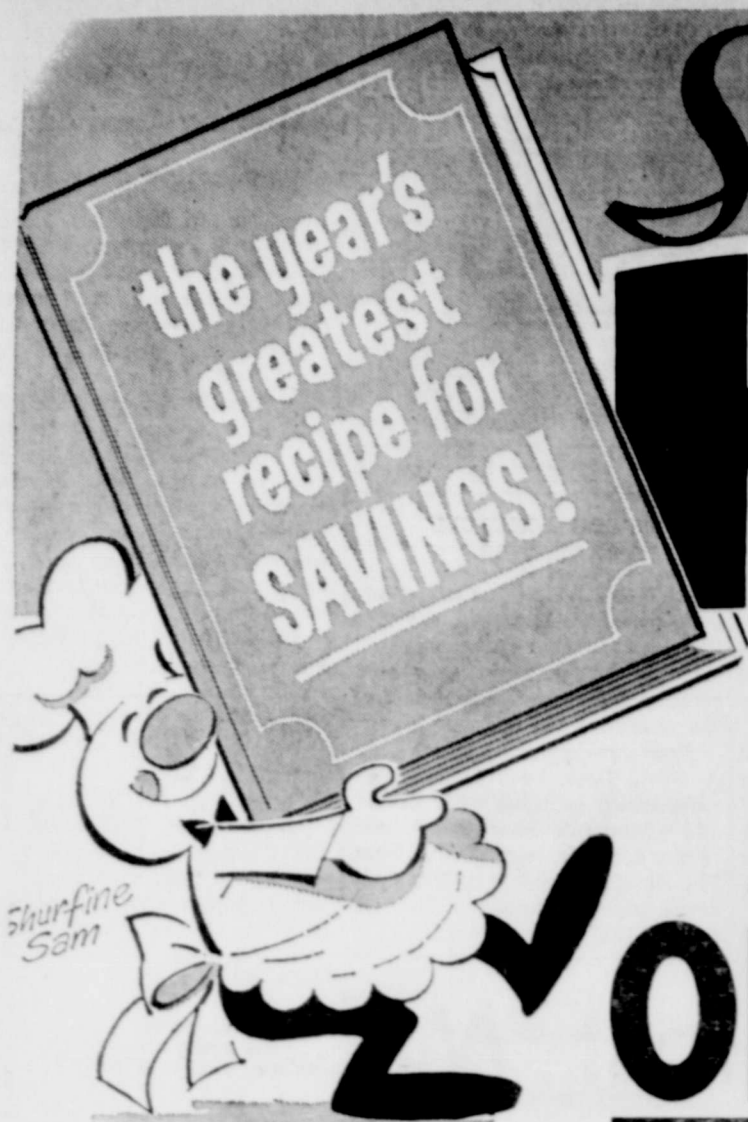

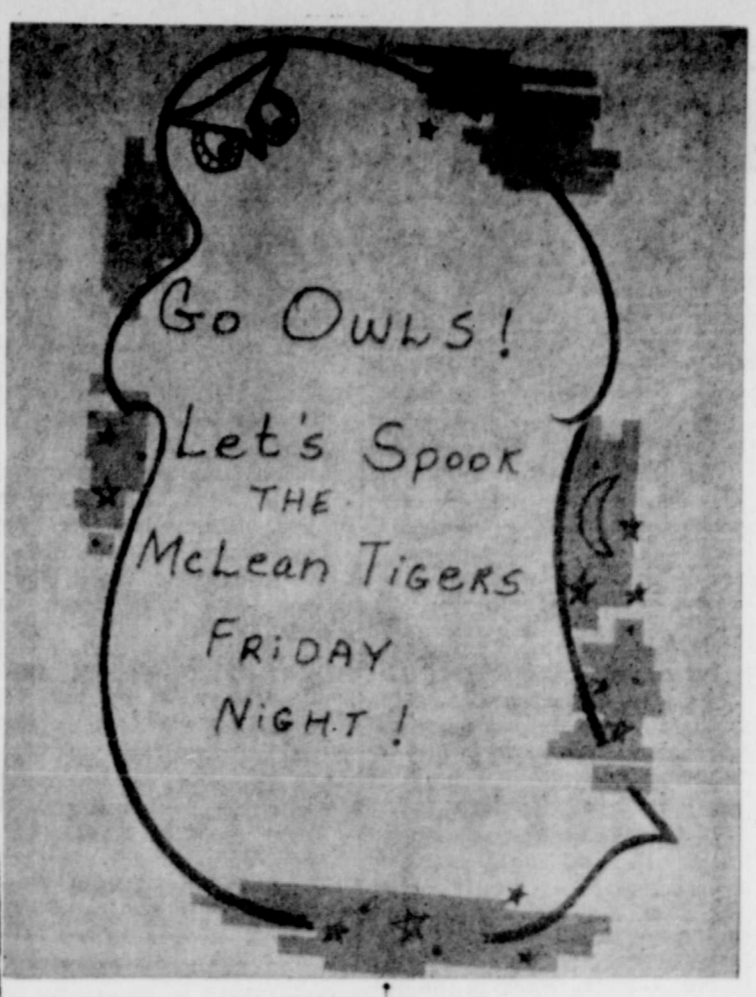
