The checking station will be at the roadside park on Highway 256 north of Haynes Boy Scout Camp. Hunters must check their sheep in at the checking station within 24 hours after it has been taken.

The Parks and Wildlife Department asks that each hunter save the stomach contents, female sex organs and blood samples. This information is needed to determine several important factors concerning Aoudad sheep.

This year is expected to be a good season for hunting the Aoudad, according to Cook, and much excitement will stem forth at the checking station when these trophies are brought in.



Holy Land Birthplace Of Three Of World's Great Religions

It is questionable whether many people realize the geographical area that comprised the world around which Christianity grew. It is also more amazing to contemplate the world today and the influence Christianity has had upon civilization, when it is reflected that all the events the Bible records occurred in a area no more than 80 miles wide and 400 miles long!

The area known as the Holy Land is small indeed. The historical events hower, which have taken place in this tiny piece of and, have almost literally taken civilization by its heels and shaken it into a realization of the difference between good and evil, even though in some parts of the world this realization is not openly acknowledged.

Within these small boundesolateness of the Negev

desert is well known. Within a distance of 15 miles one can travel from heights of 2600 feet above sea level to 1297 feet below sea level.

The oldest inhabited city in the world is in the Holy Land. It is Damascus, which has been continuously inhabited from the earliest recordings of Biblical times to the present. The old wall around Damascus still stands and is so thick in places that many families have carved out homes from its massiveness.

The oldest city in terms of founding dates is Jericho. It is said to be 10,000 years old. However, it has not always been inhabited. There have been four Jerichos at various times, each not more than two miles from the previous sites.


Also in this fabulous land is the River Jordan. It now is a muddy stream not more than 50 feet wide that's deep in the springtime and dry during the hot summer months.


Many people are under the false impression that the Sea of Galilee is really a sea. It is not. It is a lake 13 miles long and 8 miles wide.

There is one place in the Holy Land that is more famous than any other --Jerusalem. Even today, it is a walled city, that has been besieged and razed more than thirty times, rebuilt at least six times, and is little more than 80 acres in area. Outside the wall of Jerusalem is the famous Garden of Gethsemane and the Mount of Olives.


Nazareth, the city from which Joseph and Mary started on their trip to Bethlehem, is now a barren small town.

The Holy Land is the birthplace of three of the world's great religions: Christianity, Judaism and Mohammedanism. Still a land of controversy and conflict, it is prayed one day the teachings of Him who said, "Peace on Earth, Good Will Toward Men," will be heeded.

However, the greatest contributors to our customs at the Yuletide have been England, Germany, Italy, Holland, Switzerland and Bavaria. But the "borrowing" Americans have done from their neighbors of the world underwent changes indigenous to our country. with some of the trimmings not picked up at all.

ENGLAND

In England, they have a Boxing Day, and why it is called "Boxing" is not Imown. Some theorists ascribe the name to the fact that the day after Christmas, gifts are left for the postman. This has spread to include the milkman and others who have performed services for the household.

SWISS

The business of the sleigh and six reindeer has been borrowed from the Swiss. But instead of our version of Santa Claus directing his team across the sky, they have an angel in the driver's seat, who comes bearing gifts.

BAVARIA

Candles in the window at Christmas Eve comes from Bavaria, where the custom dictates the tradition of lighting the way for Kristkind, messenger for the Infant Jesus.

THE YULE LOG

From England and Italy - though many miles apart - comes the custom of the burning of the Yule log. The more romantic Italians dress up their ceremony by having their children stand blindfolded before the burning log and recite a poem. When the children are finished reciting. the blindfolds are removed and at

ingenious devices for hiding the gifts including the imbedding of them in sausages. The fun of course, is not only in the finding of the presents but also in guessing what they might be.

GERMANY The Germans have a similar game but with a dif-

ferent twist. They wrap a gift and put a person's name on it. Then they wrap it again with still another person's name on it. This goes on until the package is quite large. Then when it comes to the unwrapping ceremony, each person expectantly unwraps, until finally there are no more "addressees" and the gift reaches its intended destination.

MEXICO

Mexican children do not hang stockings at fireplaces, as there are few in this tropical country. Thus the giving of gifts and goodies for children is surrounded by the custom of breaking the pinata (pronounced pinyata). The pinata is a large earthenware pot, around which paper figures of birds, animals and even boats are created. The pot is then filled with gifts, cakes, candy and other good things. The filled pinata is hung by a rope from a rafter, and the children gather beneath it blindfolded. At a signal the children, armed with sticks, strike out at where they think the pinata is, break it and the goodles come tumbling down; at which point the scrabble begins.

THE PHILIPPINES

The Philippines, predominately Catholic, start their Christmas on December 16th and climax eight days of Mass worship at 3 a.m. with midnight services held

THE URN OF FATE

Another quaint custom prevails in Italy and Spain - in regards to the giving of gifts. In these two countries all gifts are placed in a large bowl called the "Urn of Fate." In it are dumped presents for all, none of them marked. Then each person draws a gift, examines it and trades among the members of the family until each receives a suitable present.







the life of Christ. Ronald S. Ligon, director of Christus Gardens, which is non-denominational, explains that the appeal of the Nativity scene is demonstrated by the fact that while visitors to the gardens are relatively few during the month of December, there is always a substantial increase during Christmas week

The scene, he points out, was designed to portray the biblical story of the First Christmas in the way most familiar to all, and consequently it has a few inten consistencies. Joseph and Mary are shown at the manger, while four shepherds and three wise men stand and kneel nearby in the stable area. Three sheep - real ones, incidentally, mounted by a taxidermist - stand nearby, and a tiny lamb lies next to the manger. Real straw covers the floor, real wooden beams form the roof structure and claytype walls carry through the realism of the setting. The staffs in the hands of the shepherds are actual shepherds' crooks. Bluish light predominates, and rays from above shine through a window down upon the manger, as if from the Star in the East. Hanging over the side of the manger is a garment representthe swaddling clothes in which the baby Jesus was at Vanderbilt University.

Bethlehem soon enough to be included in the Christmas scene, but the familiar portrayal shows the three there, with gifts of gold, myrrh and frank-incense. Their presence, he said, is illustrative of the sacrifice each has made to give up his worldly possessions and travel a great distance to worship the new King.

The shepherds, in fields closer to Bethlehem, made what was for them an equally great sacrifice in leaving their cks to go to the stable where Christ was born. The four figures in the scene represent all the shepherds who may have made this journey.

success of this representation of the Nativity is the fact that young children immediately recognize it. The figures in the scene were crafted by the world-famous

Gems, Ltd., of London, producer of waxworks for three quarters of a century, and the scene was designed by Deroy Displays of Canada. Costumes for the figures were made by the eminent London firm of B. J. Simmons, from fabric woven in the lands where the figures wearing the costumes were supposed to have lived.

Complementing the Nativity scene is appropriate music the familiar carol "Silent Night," sung by the Christus Gardens Choir, under the di-rection of Dr. Cyrus Daniel, head of the Music Department
