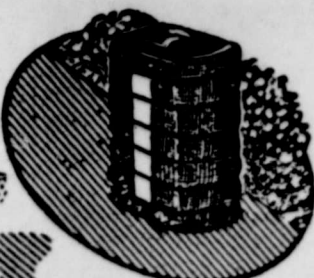
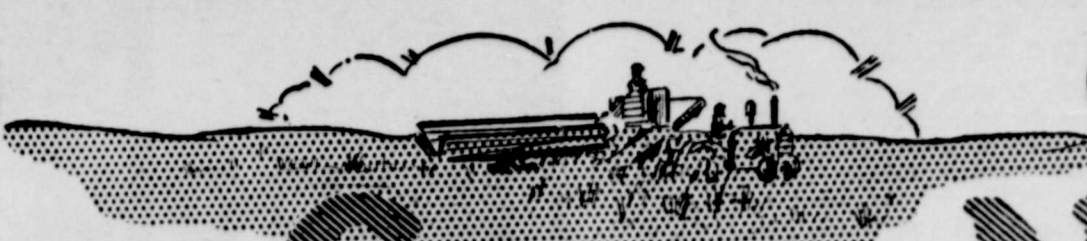

## Investigation Continuing In Local Shooting Death

According to District Attorney John Stapleton, investigation is continuing in the shooting death of a Vernon man, Leroy Allen, 38, at the Silvertown Hotel last Thursday night.

The grand jury has been called to consider the matter Monday morning.

Allen was shot to death as the reported climax of an argument, according to investigating officers. The victim was supposedly trying

to break into a car parked in front of the hotel and was shot through the window of the car.

The argument started in the hotel lobby. The adversary, according to Dyrle Maples, deputy sheriff, left the building and "got in his car, locked the doors and rolled up the windows."

Maples said Allen apparently followed the man to his car, and tried to "get at him."

Two shots were fired and Allen ran inside to the dining room, where he died, Maples said.

Maples said the suspect told officers that he was "scared to death of Allen and couldn't remember firing any shots."

The deputy said the argument apparently stemmed from a disagreement which had existed for some time. The men were workers on an oil well that is being drilled northeast of town.

The Texas Federation of Cooperatives is a trade association whose membership is composed of 450 processing, marketing, purchasing and service cooperatives owned and operated by Texas farmers. The past year these cooperatives had a volume of business amounting to \$776 million, and have a membership of approximately 75,000 farm families.

The Texas Cooperative Ginners Association is an association of the 319 farmer-owned cotton gins in Texas that gin 40% of the cotton produced in Texas.

The Houston Bank for Cooperatives is a lending agency in the Farm Credit System. It presently has loans outstanding in excess of \$115 million to Texas cooperative corporations.

The comments applied to the local area for the most part, with some of them being water problems; school problems, brought about by "growing pains" and the lack of support of the teachers by so many parents; the need for voting in school and city elections and taking part in the nominations meetings; the problem of recreational facilities; need for medical facilities; and the problems of noise, drugs, narrow-mindedness and indifference, and drugs. She also stated that civil unrest in the country is a problem. She closed by saying "It's better to light one little candle than to curse the darkness. What I can do may be ever so small, but if each one of us did his part, just think how easily these problems could be affected!"

Mrs. Allard closed the meeting with this quotation from Daniel Webster: "Let our object be our country, our whole country and nothing but our country. And, by the blessing of God, may that country itself become a vast and splendid monument, not of oppression and terror, but of wisdom, of peace and of liberty, upon

which the world may gaze with admiration forever."

1967 HOG PRICES

First, a look at 1967 hog prices. Average monthly prices received by Texas producers in 1967 varied only 4 to 5 cents in Texas. The United States commercial hog slaughter in 1967 was about 10% larger than in 1966 and prices were much lower over Texas. Average prices from January through April ranged around \$18.20. Then a sharp increase came about and prices jumped to \$21.00 May through August. In September and on through the winter months hog prices declined to a \$17.00 average.

PRICES IN 1968

Hog prices may well average near, but under a year earlier in the first half of 1968. The 1967 fall pig crop was up a little and hogs will likely be fed to heavier weights in the first half of 1968.

The level of hog prices in the summer and fall of 1968, will depend largely on the size of the 1968 spring pig crop. As stated earlier, farmers have reported intentions to farrow one percent fewer sows. This remains to be seen.

Any significant increase in the 1968 spring pig crop over that of 1967 probably would result in prices in the fall of 1968 averaging well below those received in the fall of 1967.

The situation is right for a sizeable increase in meat production in 1968.

Early in December 1967, Secretary Freeman reviewed the situation with farm leaders. He urged them to resist the temptation to expand production of beef, swine, poultry, lambs and dairy products because of low feed prices.

Secretary Freeman pointed out that if production is kept in line with demand, farmers can look forward to favorable livestock prices. If production expansion occurs, a further substantial decline in livestock and livestock products prices is certain to occur.

It appears that when pork production goes up, down goes hog prices. When pork production goes down, up go hog prices. Yes, it's an old custom and not likely to change.

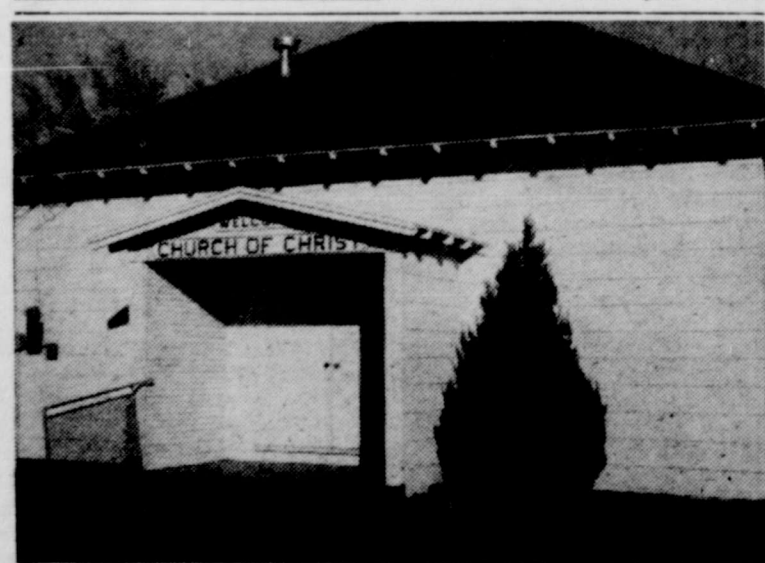

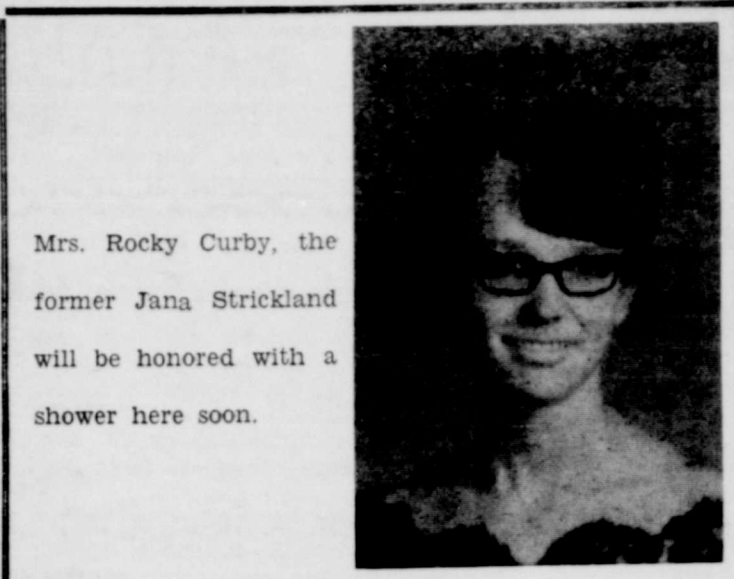
