High court also upheld the jury award of \$75,000 to owners of property condemned by city of San Marcos to expand Southwest Texas State College.

Third Court of Civil Appeals affirmed a ruling that the 1963 law limiting state-licensed lenders to 60 offices is constitutional and denied the request of a Midlandbased finance company for license of its 61st Texas office. Court said the firm is in poor position to attack constitutionality of an act which permits "the privilege of making loans at rates of interest which would be and are usurious and illegal to lenders not licensed.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES Attorney General Martin has held that the state comptroller GLADIOLA cannot make payments on state building contracts which exceed appropriated funds and must certify sufficient money is available to cover project.

In other recent opinions, Martin held that:

* State depository board may accept both guaranteed "preliminary loan notes issued by public housing authorities" and "participation certificates" of Federal National Mortgage Association as collateral for state deposits.

* Second or alternate retirement program may be established for state supported college and

university employees. L. C. B. MAKES NEW RULES Texas Liquor Control Board issued new rules for its agents, including a bar against LCB agents bidding for purchase of confiscated cars or trucks. A Dallas LCB agent's purchase of a confiscated truck was one of the incidents that kicked off the Board's current self-examination.

New rules warn agents against revealing any details of investigations, and tighten accounting procedures for keeping track of illicit alcohol that has been seized. RETARDED CHILDREN WORK

High Plains Research Foundation News

A yield of over 8,000 pounds of grain sorghum on one summer irrigation in West Texas seems almost impossible. However, this was the case at the High Plains Research Foundation in the limited irrigation variety performance test in 1967. Yields ranged from 5,587 pounds to 8,006 pounds per acre on twenty-eight different grain sorghum hybrids. These abnormal yields were brought about by a total of 17.34 inches of rainfall between May and October, with much of this rain falling at very appropriate times.

The test, conducted by Loyd Langford, Associate Agronomist, was planted May 18 at a five pound per acre seeding rate and was harvested on October 12, 1967. Each variety received 125 pounds of Ammonium Phosphate (11-48-0) at planting time and 50 pounds of Nitrogen from an application of Anhyrous Ammonia when the plants were approximately 18 inches tall. A pre-plant irrigation and a summer irrigation of 4.83 inches on July 26th were applied to all varieties. Protein percentage of the grain ranged from 8.91 to 11 per cent.

The later maturing hybrids performed better in the 1967 test, but in the two previous years the early maturing varieties were superior. It is thought that the difference in rainfall was responsible for this reaction.

This test should be of particular interest to those farmers who have limited underground water or who might be interested in water conservation practices on their farm. 

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

These orphans have been affectionately called "Our Gang." They are, as orphans all over the world, small, lonely and loveable. They, like "Pig Pen" in the cartoon strip, "Peanuts," have a tendency to be constantly dirty, and it is this condition we are attempting to correct.

"We are, therefore, asking for your support in this matter. Soap, wash cloths and towels would be greatly appreciated, along with any items of clothing you might care to give.

"Won't you help us do our small part to help these hapless little ones? The men of the 5th Battalion, 2d Artillery, would deeply appreciate your contribution, and "Our Gang" would be come the 'cleanest Kids in the East.' Thank you for your support!"

It has been emphasized to Mrs Mercer and Mrs. Lavy that donations of money won't do this project any good, because the items they need can't be bought in Vietnam where the need is. Mrs. Mercer has been sending dried pinto beans, which Sgt. Odom has been using to feed a great many of the children.


