





# DPS Reports Crime **Jump In 1967**

Crime in Texas during 1967 jumped 11.8 per cent over the previous year to set a new all-time high for criminal offenses, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the DPS, said today that an FLOYD COUNTY (Incumbent) estimated 332,986 major crimes were committed during 1967, compared to the 297,810 offenses estimated in 1966.

All major categories of crime showed increases of over 10 per cent during 1967. Murder and homicide rose 12.4 per cent, rape was up 12.8 per cent, robbery BRISCOE climbed 19.0 per cent, burglary was up 11.4 per cent, aggravated assault rose 12.8 per cent, theft increased 11.4 per cent and auto theft was up 14.1 per cent.

Garrison said that only 27 per cent of known offenses were cleared by arrests during the year, compared to a 29 per cent clearance rate during 1966. The national figure for crimes cleared by arrest during 1966 was 24.3 per
