



Screwworms In Texas

With screwworm cases on the upswing, livestock producers are now in a critical period.

This year the first case in Texas was confirmed on March 26, and more cases are being reported. One of the major causes for this early infestation was the movement of cattle from the interior of Mexico into the northern barrier zone for better pastures. Warm weather, humimidy, and a large number of wildflowers, weeds and grasses are also adding to the possibility of more worms moving into Texas. This year, the potential for screwworm cases is greater than it has been in a number of years.

All livestock owners are urged to check their animals on a dayto-day basis. They should examine and treat all wounds on their livestock. Injuries can be kept to a minimum by checking fences, pens, and chutes for protruding nails, wires or splinters. Navel wounds of newborn animals should be treated and rechecked frequently. It is also important to control

external parasites by spraying or dipping the animals with a recommended insecticide. For further information, producers can pick up a copy of "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites on Livestock and Poultry," (Leaflet

Worms taken from wounds should be sent to the Mission Screwworm Laboratory for identification. Livestock owners who need vials for the larval samples or instructions on collecting the samples should contact the county agent's office.
