There ust be some activities a person an opportunity for some and desirable pouring ut of emotions. If they are botup and not allowed to "come out" then that person will become rotic and will display abnornal mental and social traits.

Athletics and play provide peraps one of the better means of lowing the expression of emoby school-age children. hrough play and games boys and irls run the gamut of expresons from tension to relaxation, ace to exultation and from tears laughter. There is no greater pportunity to train the emotions, while at the same time allowing em to be expressed than in athetics and play. The emotions, if llowed complete freedom withut proper guidance, will not alrays be directed in the right fashon. The ability to control emons is best guided on the playng field under the proper direcon of a coach or teacher.

The geologist stated that the City should be able to develop a strong four-inch well which would pump 250 gallons a minute at the City Hall test location.

In further discussion, it was noted that at the present time, the City is pumping 350 gallons of water a minute. The new well would help ease the water situation some, but would not produce enough to relieve shortage problems. The City would still need another source of water.

Mr. Sherman ran electric logs and analyzed the findings in each of the tests, and this material will be kept on file for future refer-






