# Lockney, Floydada Agree On Aquaduct

Meeting in a joint session last Thursday night, the Lockney and Floydada City Councils authorized the drawing up of contracts in connection with construction of an aquaduct from the proposed Mackenzie Municipal Reservoir.

The contracts, being drawn in Dallas, will allow for the cities to join together in an effort to finance water lines from the proposed water treatment plant at the dam site in Briscoe County.

Each city will agree in the contracts that after January 1, 1977, if one town decides it needs the water line, both towns must comply, according to the announcement by Lon Davis, jr. of Floydada, president of the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority. Before January 1, 1977, the line can be built on mutual agreement.

Davis said the water authority will call another bond election this summer, for the purpose of determining whether the voters in the cities to be served by the reservoir, Tulia, Floydada, Lockney and Silvertown, will approve the proposition to build a partial project.

An election last October which proposed to build the dam, aquaducts, treatment plant and providing that the four member cities would begin buying water from the Authority immediately, was defeated by Tulia and Floydada.

The new proposition, if approved by the voters, would provide for the City of Silvertown to begin using water as soon as the project can be finished and sufficient water impounded.

# Giant Mammoth Tusk Found On Ranch

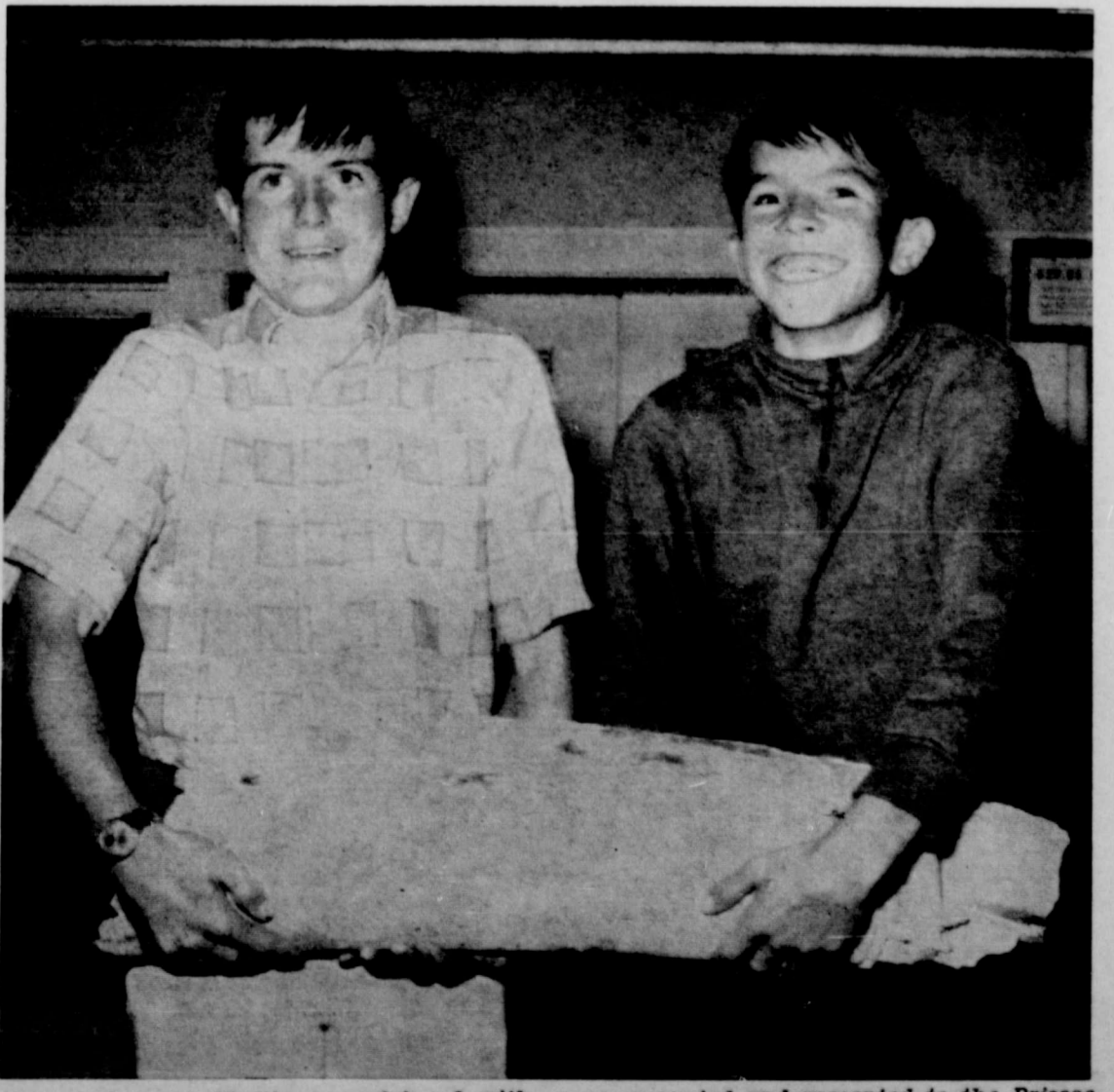
A giant mammoth tusk was recently unearthed on the George Martin ranch west of Silvertown.

The giant petrified ivory tusk of the now-extinct hairy mammoth was found about two years ago by cousins, Gary and Dana Martin, sons of George and Datis Martin. It was dug up and presented to the Briscoe County Museum last week by Wayland Fitzgerald.

When found the tusk was about eight feet long and weighed about 100 pounds. It had been covered by about 30 feet of soil and was discovered protruding from the bank of what had once been a river bed.

The mammoth was a member of the elephant family, and according to World Book Encyclopedia, these huge mammoths lived during the ice age and became extinct about 10,000 years ago.

Fitzgerald took the find to Canyon, where it was identified at the Panhandle Plains Historical Museum. The museum asked to keep the tusk, according to Fitzgerald, but he choose to have it placed in the local museum.

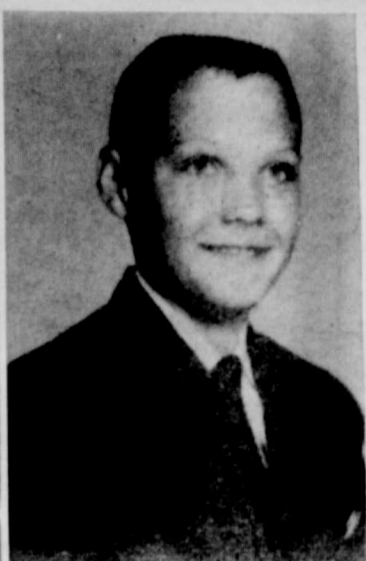
Contest Finalist

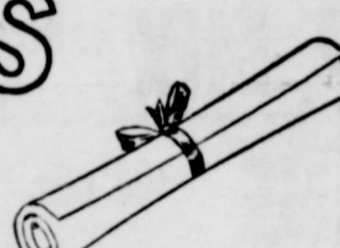
