I've often wondered what sort of injury might result from the seat belt in a serious auto accident. My suspicions were confirmed by an article that appeared in the Fort Worth Star Telegram yesterday. It dealt with injuries to pregnant women, but also contained information on the correct way to fasten your seat belt.

Pregnant women who wear auto safety belts that cross the abdomen are running a serious risk of uterine rupture and loss of the baby in the event of an accident. Expectant mothers should use a belt that crosses the thighs and a shoulder harness that runs diagonally from the backrest to the bottom of the seat.

An article in a recent medical journal said that while safety belts have unquestionably saved many lives, their misuse has also caused many avoidable injuries. In one case, the five-month-old fetus was not only killed by the belt's impact, but surgeons later had to remove the mother's ovaries and oviducts, as well as the severely ruptured uterus.

Most people simply don't wear their safety belts properly—for most often they have a tendency to strap the belt across the abdomen, rather than across the pelvic area.

It was explained that the lower edge of the belt should be on top of the thighs and the buckle at the side so that any impact would be placed on the somewhat more durable pelvic structure.

Junior Club To Host Swim Party

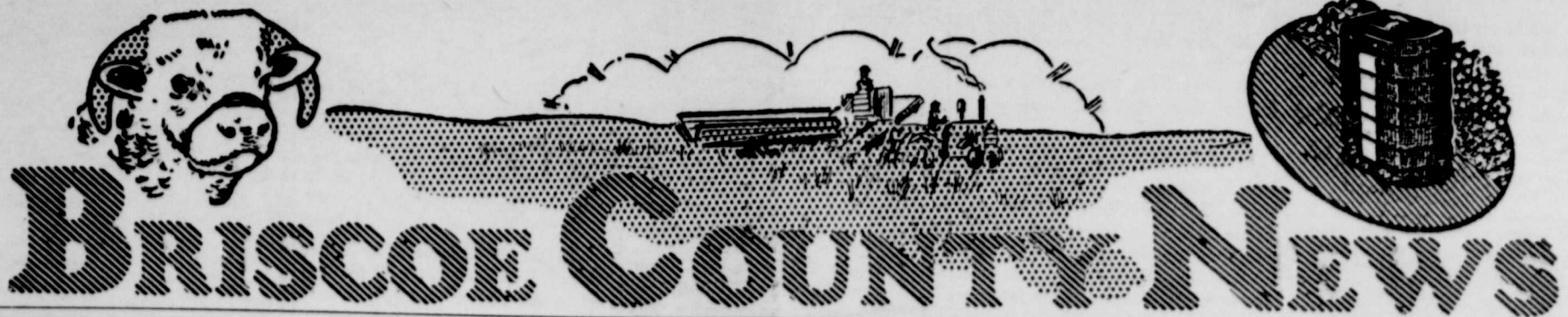
Members of L. O. A. Junior Study Club will host a swimming party at the Silverton Pool from 8:00 until 10:00 p.m. Friday, July 26.

Treat all wounds, and collect larvae from the wounds—being sure that you obtain a representative sample of all sizes of worms in the wound—then submit the sample to the Screwworm Eradication Laboratory, P. O. Box 969, Mission, Texas 78572, for diagnosis.

Texas has already recorded 823 cases this year (696 as of July 1), compared to only 54 cases for the first six months of last year. Although Briscoe County reports are naught at this date, the chances of having screwworm cases are ever present.

From The Files

Do You Remember?

Do you remember when Buster and Goose carried the Silverton colors to the Lubbock Golden Gloves Tournament in 1938, and "Goose let them drag clear down in the dirt and Buster let them sag pretty bad"? According to the account in the Briscoe County News, "Buster had his man whipped but when he went over to the ropes to spit out a tooth and a tonsil the referee stopped the fight. And the bird he was fighting gets to go to Fort Worth!"

A full - page advertisement in that same issue of the BCN contained a prayerful plea for rain or snow for the county. The petition of 48 local residents and businessmen was: "Whereas, Briscoe County and almost its entire population are dependent upon agricultural products for their sustenance, and such products are dependant upon natural snow or rainfall for their successful growth, and Whereas, we are firm believers in the power of concentrated thought and action, and of newspaper advertising, and Whereas, we recognize the power of Providence to provide for all our needs, Therefore, we the undersigned, humbly ask that the County of Briscoe and surrounding territory be granted the favor of a bountiful amount of rainfall." Editor Roy Hahn added the notation at the bottom of the advertisement that in case the total amount of moisture received during the following week was less

than one inch, the total expense of the ad would be paid by himself. The following week's issue carried the following tally of results. "Wednesday night - I'm losing ground on this rain gauge business. Monday night it read .18 inches. Tuesday morning I had gained a little and it was .22. This morning it went a strong .24 and lo, and behold, after misting all day, with a couple of pretty good showers, I measured it tonight and it said .20. I'm going to sit up all night and watch it. "Thursday morning - Aha, I gained on you. It read .40 this morning and the gauge is cheating for I stood and watched those little sleet balls and half of them bounced out. I spread a sheet on the ground to catch them and by the time I dump it all together again I might have something.

"40 down and .60 to go. It lacks quite a bit of the desired inch but we can get that easy enough after this paper goes to bed about four this afternoon. Never say die is my motto, so keep that four bits handy. I might be around after it Friday morning.

"The hole card I had from having the gauge in my back yard didn't turn out so good. The boys at the country agent's office say they are going to have the water in the gauge analyzed."

On Thursday of the following week snow started falling on Briscoe County and blanketed the area with five inches or more - do you remember? "The snow, a very wet one, began early Thursday morning and is still falling as the Briscoe County News goes to press. Every bit of the moisture is going into the ground and will do the maximum of good for the crops. No drifting.

"Two weeks ago Briscoe County held about the bluest bunch of farmers to be found anywhere. Gloom has changed to joy. Frowns to grins. Something near an inch and a half of moisture has been received here since it started a week ago Monday. Roads are bad - who cares?

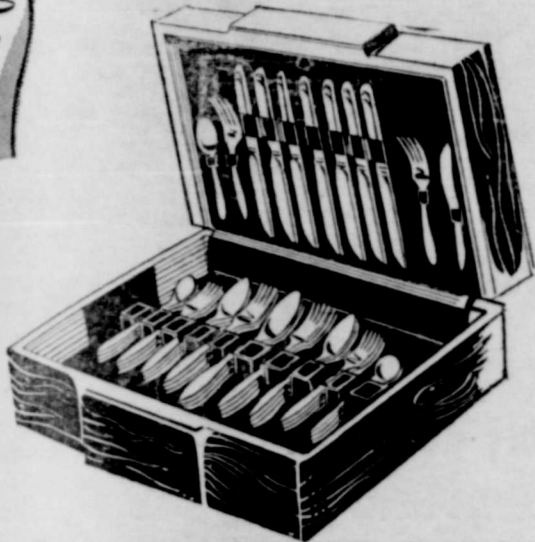
