Directors of Swisher Electric Cooperative and Hall Electric Cooperative have voted to consider merger of the two cooperatives, and have called a special election to vote on the proposal. Swisher Electric members will vote on August 16 and Hall Electric on August 19.

Community meetings will be held prior to the elections to explain the proposal to the members.

If the merger is approved, all employees would be integrated and branch offices would be maintained at Memphis and Turkey, with headquarters in Tulia.

One advantage of the merger. proponents said, would be the diversification of the area covered. For example, if drouths, crop failures or storms inflicted losses on crops and lines in one area, "in all probability other parts of the area would not be affected and the organization would be in a better position to absorb the losses."
