School To Open On September 2

The Silverton Schools will open Monday, September 2, according to an announcement by Superintendent J. S. Hinds. Registration for high school classes will follow this schedule: Freshmen: 9-12, Thursday, Aug. 29; Sophomores: 1-3, Aug. 29; Juniors: 9-12, Friday, August 30; Seniors: 1:30-2:30, Friday, Aug. 30. At 3:00 p.m. Friday, August 30, there will be a faculty meeting in the school lunchroom.

The elementary and junior high school students will complete their registration and attend regular classes on Monday, September 2. The buses will run and the lunchroom will be in operation that day.

Superintendent Hinds also made the announcement of the hiring of Jerry Patton as the school tax assessor and collector. Verlin Towe will serve as the school's business manager.

Do you remember when the Silvertown All-Stars were taking basketball by storm?

Paced by hustling, sharp-shooting Elliott Lee, Silvertown mowed down Turkey 47-29. Aulton Durham, who played only three quarters, hit the hoop for 14 points to crowd Lee, who scored 16 points.

Lem Weaver scored 20 points to set the pace as Silvertown defeated Floydada 40-15.

Do you remember this front page story in February 1939?

The worst dust storm in over three years, to the certain knowledge of this writer, struck here in full force at about six o'clock tonight (Thursday). Traffic is halted, and all cars are warned to stop driving!

Today (Thursday) has been dusty all day, but no warning came of the dirt storm in its full blast. It is thought that perhaps Silvertown is being hit worse because of fields west of the city.

The Briscoe County News has half its papers off the press. Too much dust on belts stopped the press... a tube of belt dressing is gone... the paper must go... dust or no dust. —R. H.

Do you remember "Fun With Divorce" from a 1939 issue?

Kind reader, here's your chance to get a divorce. These long suffering inmates of matrimony were rendered divorcees for practically nothing. Look them over and take your choice of facts.

The thing that finally exhausted the patience of a long-suffering Massachusetts husband was his wife's odd habit of wearing overshoes in bed.

A deaf and dumb couple in Missouri were divorced on the husband's plea that the wife nagged him in sign language.

Having already presented her husband with eight children of their own, a faithful wife in Pleasantville New York, ceased to be pleasant and filed suit on the grounds that he insisted on adopting 24 more.

In Chicago a wife got her freedom on the grounds that her husband insisted on keeping a pet bear in their bedroom—then she married the owner of a flea circus.

Harrassed beyond endurance one very unhappy wife got her divorce because her husband put itching powders inside her girdle.

I guess he really got some action. Lem said, "I don't care if it was a bull snake; they all look alike to me, and I'd trust one snake as far as another."

Comes Charles Cowart with a Believe-It-Or-Not. He says that a fellow living below the cap rock had some trouble with a well. Cattle and everything else that drank of the water were affected in a very peculiar manner. Finally the fellow sent in a sample of the water for analysis and they found that it contained a large percentage of Epsom Salts... Now that is Charlie's story, not mine.

A Floydada salesman came up the other day to sell Thurman Graham some pickups. The deal went through—only in reverse. Thurman didn't buy the pickups, BUT the Floydada man did buy one of the Hoeme Cultivators. Wednesday at noon a little part

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day in December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote

of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

"TEXAS" Season Nearing Finish

"TEXAS" has passed the halfway mark in performances for the 1968 season and to mark this date, Raymond Raillard, the executive vice-president who manages the "TEXAS" company is releasing an analysis of four surveys taken during the first four weeks of this season. These surveys were made by young business men and women of Canyon and were designed to show a profile of the "TEXAS" audiences. Information was gathered in the parking lot as the patrons drove in. About a thousand heads of parties answered the questions.

3 1/2% were from Canyon 18 1/2% were from Amarillo 5 1/2% were from Lubbock 26 1/2% were from the area within 100 miles 23 1/2% were from Texas out of the area 21% were from out of state 1 1/2% were from foreign countries

These percentages are very similar to the ones obtained last year, except that those attending from Amarillo this year form a slightly higher proportion.

The average size of the party was 4.3 persons. Sizes ranged from one person to 19. In reply to this question: "How did you hear of 'TEXAS'?", 68% said "by word of mouth;" 12% mentioned newspapers; 10% radio; 3% TV; and the rest learned about the show from tourist guides. It was interesting that most Amarillo families mentioned "word of mouth" and no other source, whereas the area people indicated that newspapers, radio and TV had aroused their interest.

Parties have come by bus to see "TEXAS" from all over Texas, New Orleans, New York and Oklahoma.

"TEXAS" plays nightly except Tuesdays in the beautiful Palo Duro Canyon State Park. It tells the story of the carving of ranches and farms from the great western distances and is told in song, drama, dance and sweeping light and sound; a moving story in a magnificent place.

Some construction has recently been completed at the Pioneer Amphitheatre which reduced backstage motion and enabled the cast and crew of "TEXAS" to shorten the production a little by making faster scene changes. Sidewalks leading to all the stage en-

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trances were just finished, and now people and scenery can move smoothly and directly to their usual entrances even in bad weather. Two other changes made earlier have also helped: construction of emergency dressing rooms just behind the wings, and a long cement tunnel below the stage at the edge of the gully which acts as a cross over.

Cutting each scene shorter is difficult because this changes many other things in the show. For example, a rehearsal of one cut involved the following people and actions. The dancers had to dress more quickly between numbers. New crew men were assigned to put the make up on the backs of some of the Indians. Some actors had to run instead of walk through the cross over to be in

place on the other side in time. New people had to take the responsibility for certain props. A different cowboy had to hold the horse for the surrty. The musicians had to take a new route. And finally, some crew members had to cross over an extra time to stage left because only women in party dresses were available to move the ranch house. Each cut made set a similar chain of action in motion.

With the changes, closing time has moved very close to 11:30 p.m.

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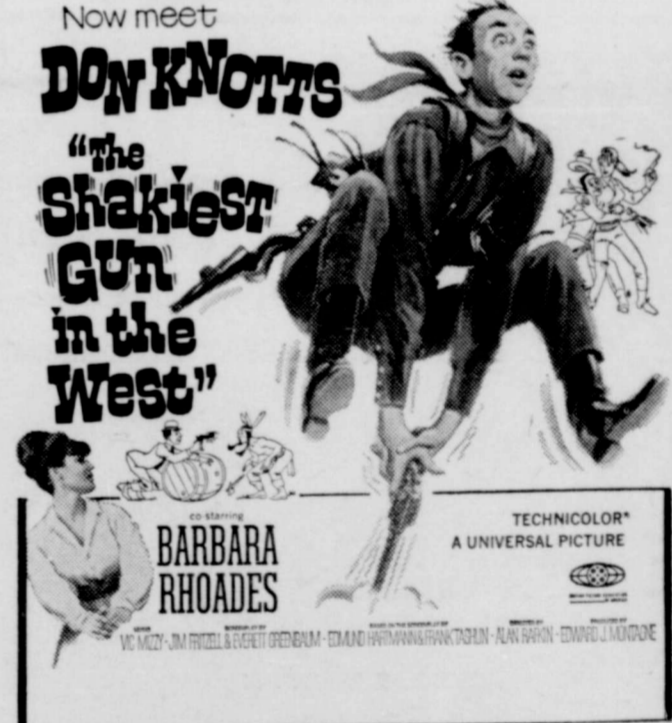

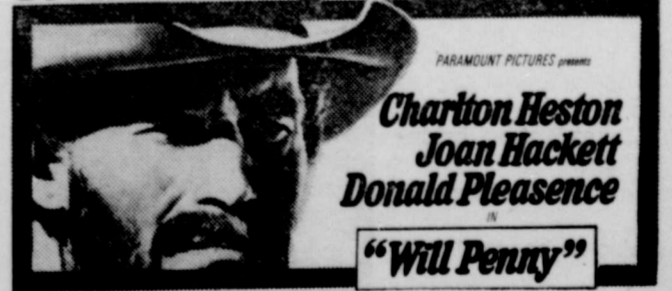

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PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR16)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 1-f, to read as follows:

"Section 1-f. All merchandise, products, goods or wares in the temporary custody of a public warehouseman, who has no financial connection other than as bailee for hire with the owner, shipper, or consignee of the merchandise, products, goods, or wares, are exempt from ad valorem taxation if they are shipped to or from the warehouse by regulated or bona fide private carrier, are held by the warehouseman not longer than six (6) months, and have a predetermined out-of-state destination at point of origin. The books and records relating to herby of such public warehouseman shall be available for reasonable inspection by

the proper taxing authorities. This amendment shall not act as a validation of any present statute or law, but only those passed specifically pursuant hereto; provided, however, that enabling legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

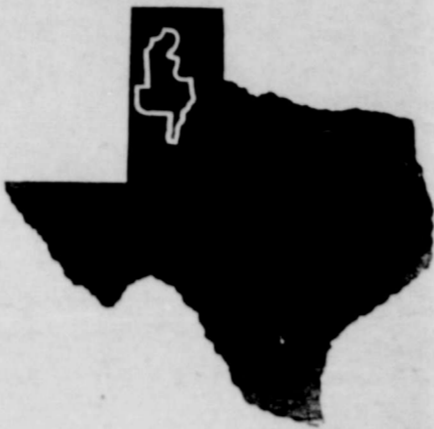
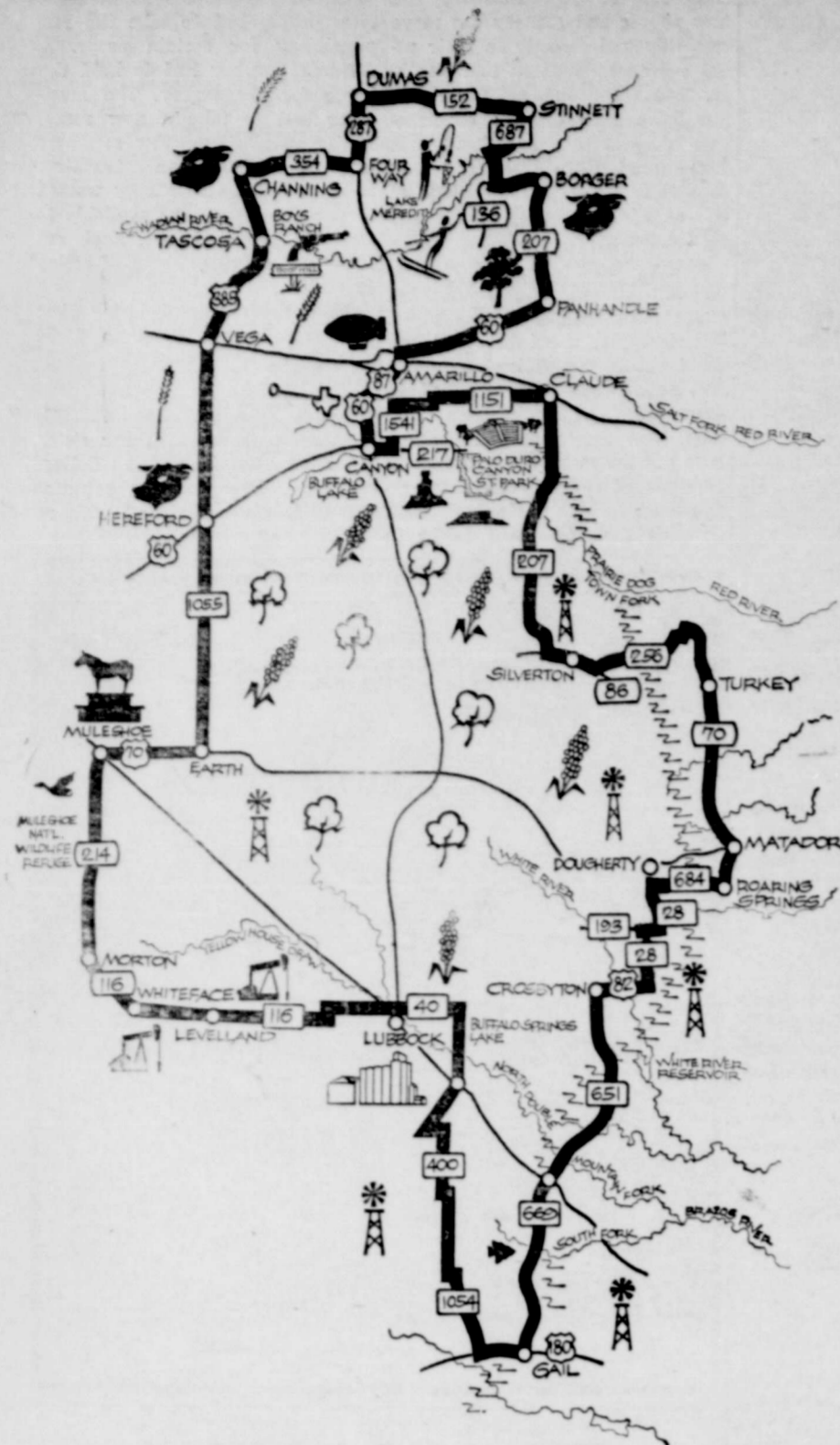

Silverton Area Is Included In Plains Trail Of Texas

The 739-mile Texas Plains Trail, County was organized.

one of 10 trails designated in the state by Governor John Connally's Travel Trails Committee, includes Silverton, established as the county seat in 1892 when Briscoe

Silverton is a center for a large surrounding farming - ranching area. A landmark is the old Briscoe County Jail, a two-story structure on the northeast corner of the courthouse square. It was built of hand-hewn stone hauled from Tule Canyon by wagon in 1894. A small, but growing museum featuring early ranch, farm and home items is located in the basement of the county courthouse and is open on Tuesdays from 2:00 until 5:00 p.m.

Between Silverton and Turkey the Texas Plains Trail undergoes some dramatic changes. Those

flat areas of farming and ranching country appear so vast it seems they will continue forever, but they don't.

About nine miles east of Silverton a small canyon suddenly appears. This is the jagged edge of the High Plains, or as the area residents say, the edge of the scenic red caprock. To Briscoe County citizens this part of the cap country is familiarly known as Schott cap.

On the north side of the highway is a spectacularly situated roadside park where the colorful panorama can be viewed. Nego-

tiating the edge, the highway winds and spirals, offering a feast of exceptional views.

For awhile the road spans brush canyon country, and along here is a side trip to Burson Lakes. The lakes offer swimming, camping and hunting facilities, several cabins, a bait shop-general store, and small cafe. Several small, deep, man-made lakes situated in a beautiful canyon provide year-around fishing for bass and catfish. Quail and white-tailed deer are very plentiful to be hunted during designated seasons. Burson Lakes are about two miles from the highway via a bladed earth road. It is occasionally rough and quite steep during its last few hundred yards.

The Texas Trails program was designed to focus attention on the diverse regions of Texas and to lure tourists onto less-traveled routes.

The Texas Plains Trail is to be dedicated sometime in the fall or winter.

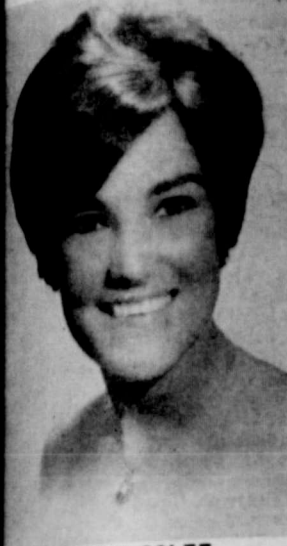

Wheat Varieties Discussed For Fall Seeding

Wheat producers will soon be selecting varieties to plant this fall and the choice can be very important in obtaining a satisfactory yield.

The choice of variety should depend on the producer's needs, explains Ken Cook, county agricultural agent. Factors influencing this choice include whether the crop is to be seeded on dryland or irrigated or in low or high fertility conditions and whether the crop is to be used for grazing or grain production or a combination of the two.

Disease and insect reaction, lodging and shattering are also important considerations in selecting a variety. Finally, quality of the grain is of utmost importance.

Texas has built up an enviable reputation for good quality wheat in recent years. For the High and Rolling Plains, the varieties Tascosa, Caddo, Scout, Warrior and Sturdy are first choice because of their yielding ability, high quality and good storm resistance. Kaw is a good quality variety but

has weak straw, so it is recommended only for dryland production.

Second choice because of weaker gluten are the Triumph strains, Crockett, Concho and Wichita. Under dryland production, they often have good milling and baking quality but are weaker than desired under irrigation. Agronomically, they are less desirable because of weak straw or tendency to shatter.

Sturdy is the new short stature wheat especially recommended for growing under irrigation on highly fertile soils where lodging is a problem. It is not recommended for dryland wheat production as it may be too short to cut satisfactorily. Under dryland conditions, Sturdy sometimes yields less and has a lower test weight than Tascosa, Caddo and Scout.

These varieties are all satisfactory for winter grazing under most High Plains conditions. However, grazing of the early varieties should be discontinued earlier in the spring than later varieties. This practice avoids yield reduction caused by damage to heads which are beginning to form.

Disabled Veterans Should File For Compensation

Veterans retired from the Armed Forces for disability who have not filed a claim for compensation from the Veterans Administration were reminded by the VA today that they may be losing money.

Many retired disabled veterans do not file claims for VA disability compensation because they mistakenly believe that they will lose all military retirement bene-

fits if they do.

This is not the case according to Jack Coker, manager of the VA Regional Office in Waco.

Even though retirement pay and compensation cannot be paid at the same time, the veteran has the right to elect whichever benefit is greater and may switch from one benefit to the other whenever it is to his advantage to do so. If he waives his retirement pay and elects to receive VA disability compensation, he is still eligible for all basic retirement benefits such as commissary privileges and dependent medical care.

Severely disabled enlisted men generally will receive greater financial benefit by electing VA compensation rather than retirement pay, Coker said.

There are other benefits which retired disabled veterans who have not filed for VA compensation should consider, he pointed

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR20)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11a, Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas may invest the Permanent University Fund in securities, bonds or other obligations issued, insured, or guaranteed in any manner by the United States Government, or any of its agencies, and in such bonds, debentures, or obligations, and preferred and common stocks issued by corporations, associations, or other institutions as the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System may deem to be proper investments for said funds; provided, however, that not more than one per cent (1%) of said fund shall be invested in the securities of any one (1) corporation nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; provided, further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for five (5) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors.

"In making each and all of such investments said Board of Regents shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs."

in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as the probable safety of their capital.

"The interest, dividends and other income accruing from the investments of the Permanent University Fund, except the portion thereof which is appropriated by the operation of Section 13 of Article VII for the payment of principal and interest on bonds or notes issued thereunder, shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purposes declared in Section 10 of Article VII of this Constitution.

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing for investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas in certain types of securities within the prudent man rule."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing for investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas in certain types of securities within the prudent man rule."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR4)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for contributions on the basis of the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System; providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the people at an election and for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the state and/or school districts; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund.

"Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as

may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other state pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other state pension or retirement fund, contributed by the state, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this Section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

"AGAINST the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the state constitution and be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR39)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 39 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the state, so as to create an agency of the State of Texas the Employees Retirement System of Texas, vesting the general administration and responsibility of the proper operation of said system in a state board of trustees to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, authorizing said Board to invest assets of said system in various obligations and subjects of investment, subject to certain restrictions stated therein and such other restrictions as may hereafter be provided by law; providing that contributions of members and the state shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state; providing that such Amendment shall be self-enacting; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication; and declaring legislative intent that the adoption of this Joint Resolution shall constitute repeal of Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, previously adopted by this the 60th Legislature, so that the proposition as set forth in this Resolution may be submitted to the voters of this state in lieu of the proposition contained in Senate Joint Resolution No. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the state, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this state, as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the state who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the state, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classification of officers and employees of judicial districts of this state as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection; and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the state to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state.

"There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas the Employees Retirement System of Texas, the rights of membership in which, the retirement privileges and benefits thereunder, and the management and operations of which shall be governed by the provisions herein contained and by present or hereafter enacted Acts of the Legislature not inconsistent herewith. The general administration and responsibility for the proper operation of said system are hereby vested in a State Board of Trustees, to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, which Board shall be constituted and shall serve as may now or hereafter be provided by the Legislature. Said Board shall exercise such powers as are herein provided together with such other powers and duties not inconsistent herewith as may be prescribed by the Legislature. All moneys from whatever source coming into the Fund and all other securities, moneys, and assets of such system shall be managed, acquired, held, managed, purchased, sold, assigned, traded, transferred, and disposed of any securities, evidences of debt, and other investments in which said securities, moneys, and assets have been or may hereafter be invested by said Board. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to invest and reinvest any of said moneys, securities, and assets, as well as the proceeds of any such investments, in bonds, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued, or assumed or guaranteed in whole or in part, by the United States or any agency of the United States, or by the State of Texas, or by any county, city, school district, municipal corporation, or other political subdivision of

the State of Texas, both general and special obligations; or in home office facilities to be used in administering the Employees Retirement System including land, equipment, and office building; or in such corporation bonds, notes, other evidences of indebtedness, and corporation stocks, including common and preferred stocks, of any corporation created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any of the states of the United States, as said Board may deem to be proper investments; provided that in making each and all of such investments said Board shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as probable safety of their capital; and further provided that sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may now or hereafter be provided by law. Unless investments authorized herein are hereafter further restricted by an Act of the Legislature, no more than one per cent (1%) of the book value of the total assets of the Employees Retirement System shall be invested in the stock of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid cash dividends for ten (10) consecutive years prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its

successors; and provided further, that not less than twenty-five per cent (25%) at any one time of the book value of investments of said Fund shall be invested in Government and Municipal Securities as enumerated above; this Amendment shall be self-enacting and shall become effective immediately upon its adoption without any enabling legislation."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 5, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-j to read as follows: "Section 1-j. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 1 of this article, the Legislature may provide for the refund of the tax paid on the first sale of cigars and tobacco products in this state which are subsequently sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texarkana."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on

the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the refund of the tax on cigars and tobacco products sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texarkana."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the refund of the tax on cigars and tobacco products sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texarkana."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR41)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services for:

(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years;

(2) Needy individuals who are citizens of the United States who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday and who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

(3) Needy blind persons who are citizens of the United States and who are over the age of eighteen (18) years;

(4) Needy children who are citizens of the United States and who are under the age of twenty-one (21) years, and to the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may define

the residence requirements, if any, for participation in these programs.

"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, and in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care and to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds or on behalf of any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments and/or medical assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate Federal Statutes as they now are or as they may be amended, to the extent that Federal matching money is not available to the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such Federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy

persons; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended per fiscal year out of state funds for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, and to the Blind, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children shall never exceed Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000).

"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer or to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for Public Assistance payments only to Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for Public Assistance payments only to Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."

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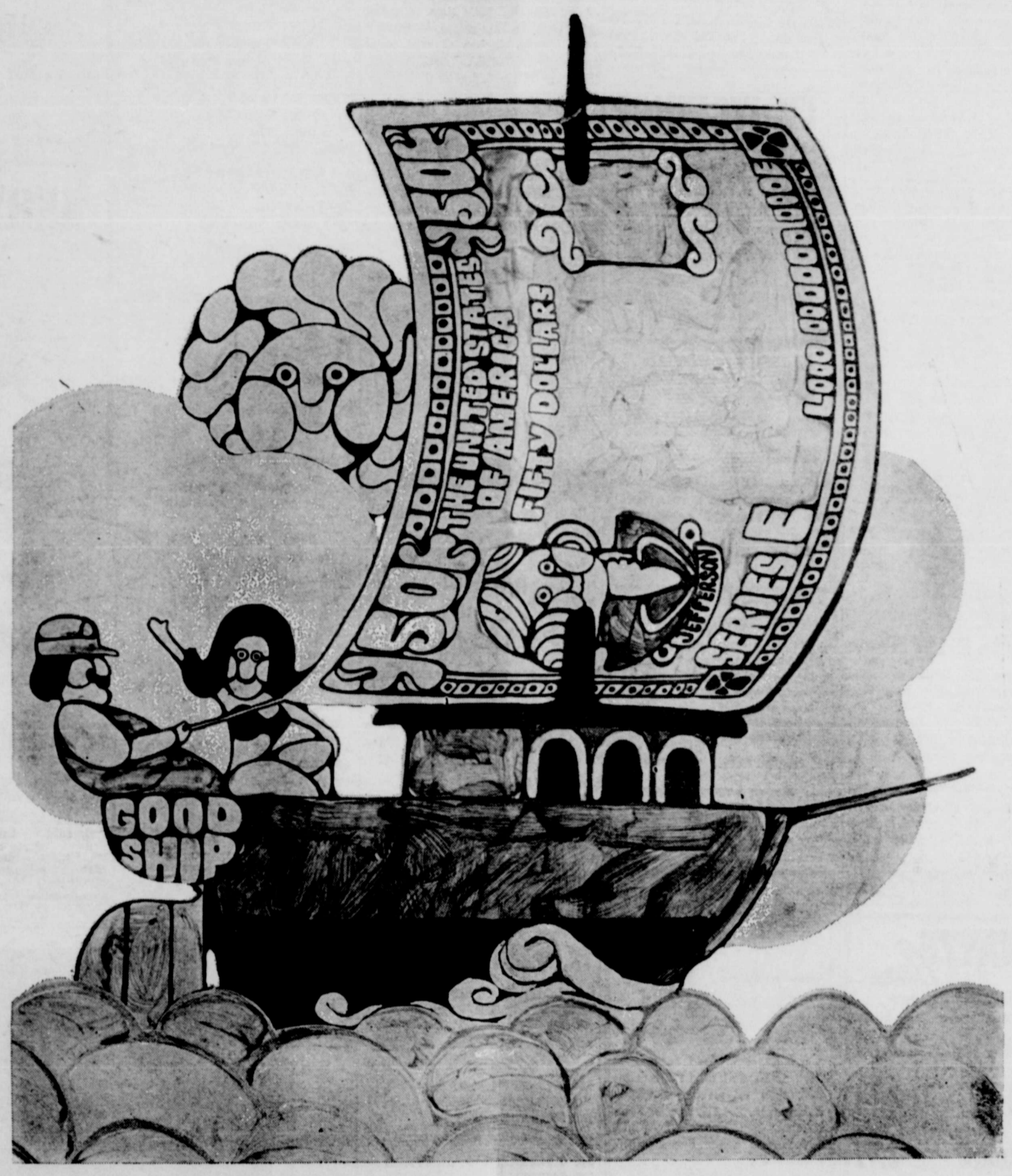
